Off The Bookshelf

In the Settlers Book Club, we read Jesse Thistle's second book *Scars and Stars*. This collection of prose poems is a very accessible and moving read.

Scars reference the damage Jesse did to his Achilles heel in an incident described in his previous book. He still experiences physical and emotional pain and states that for him poetry serves as a healing tool. He views it as an "Achilles shield" through which he can "create the world anew." Stars, on the other hand, represent "moments of beauty that can illuminate the scars."

He divides the book into thematic sections with evocative titles: A Private War, Show Me Your Scars, Love Letters from Rehab, Forgotten Tobacco, and Someone's Ancestors. Each section starts with an introduction explaining what the section is about and in the process shares aspects of his life not included in his first book.

He dedicates each section to different people in his life: family, street workers, neighbours, rehab staff, and recovering addicts. Some of the poems which stood out for me included "The Suit," referring to the often threadbare and out of fashion suits that released prisoners wear upon re-entering life outside prison; and "The Convict's Braid." At first, I thought the braid referred to hair, but he was talking about convicts braiding sheets into ropes. Then there's "Passport," describing how drug dealers spot undercover cops by the lack of scars on the bottoms of their feet. Very poignant was "Please Remember My Name," referring to the silencing of identity while in prison. "St. Stella" is about the paramedic who recognized him when he was on the street and took him home for a shower and a meal and offered a roof over his head for the night.

Sometimes it was single lines of poetry that stood out for me. In "Christopher" he describes looking into the eyes of someone with "black, vacant pupils right down to the ocean floor. "Labour of Love" tenderly expresses his very deep feelings for his wife "Lucie."

One phrase that struck several of us in the book club was: "What matters is the quality of the heart, rather

than quality of the mind." In "Reciprocal Onion" he recounts wisdom shared by his auntie Maria Campbell.

In the last section, Someone's Ancestors, Thistle ends with poems about domestic life and parenthood.

In the video we watched, Thistle said that his first book, From the Ashes, was written based on the senses; that it was empirical in approach. In contrast, he wrote the poems in Scars and Stars from the heart. Jesse has a very generous one: besides teaching as an associate professor in the Department of Humanities at York University in Toronto, he advocates for the unhoused.







60 Years in Brentwood – Part Two

If you had an opportunity to read "60 Years in Brentwood – Part One," which appeared in the May edition of the Bugle, you will recall that I interviewed ten long-time Brentwood residents. They told me of an early Brentwood with no trees, lots of dust, and cows and horses – the former roaming loose.

My "experts"—now joined by two more residents, Sandy and Len—also told me that both the Public and Separate school boards built elementary, junior high, and high schools in the Brentwood area "just as our children needed them," said Susanne.

Over the years, along came amenities such as Sir Winston Churchill Swimming Pool (now upgraded to a Rec Centre), the Nose Hill Library, and the Brentwood Sportsplex. Sandy, who moved here a "mere 46 years ago" recalls that the Sportsplex had "just been completed and all we newcomers were asked to donate was \$100 – what a bargain!"

Though Calgary Transit had long served Brentwood, Alice recalls the fare being 10 cents, with Brisebois being the westernmost stop. The arrival of the LRT shortly prior to our 1988 Olympics made access to downtown that much guicker.

And who remembers the Air Raid Siren which used to be behind the service station at the corner of Brisebois and Northmount? My historians do not recall exactly when the siren was installed nor when it came down, but nearby resident Len recalls a day in the early 60s when the siren just kept blaring and blaring and blaring. Len's mother was convinced that Canada was under attack!

Over the years, a number of churches were built in Brentwood. And have I mentioned our proximity to the two buildings which in 1963 changed from being the University of Alberta in Calgary (UAC) to the University of Calgary (U of C)? Those two original buildings are now well dwarfed by the many newer, taller buildings. Charlene is pleased that "my kids all attended U of C and could easily walk from Brentwood."

When asked why they have remained almost 60 years in Brentwood, Margaret and Bruce told me because, "It's all here." Walt commented that "With the trees all grown. Brentwood is such a pretty area of the city." Others referred to "easy access to malls and medical clinics" plus "easy access to the mountains." Many referred to programs offered by the Brentwood Community Association for school age children in the areas of soccer, hockey, figure skating, and lacrosse. Charlene enjoyed coordinating and refereeing soccer when her children were in that program. She is proof of Sandy's belief that "Brentwood loves volunteerism." Claire and Ernie observed that, "All of these amenities have encouraged many young people who grew up here to now live in their parents' home as the parents downsized or passed away." Thus, another generation will raise their children in Brentwood.

I extend my thanks to all of the long-time Brentwoodians who shared their memories with me. I would certainly add that another "plus" to Brentwood is the friendly and helpful people such as Joyce, Walt, Margaret, Bruce, Alice, Charlene, Maureen, Susanne, Claire, Ernie, Sandy, and Len who so generously shared their memories for *The Bugle*.

Spring brought renewal and awakening of Mother Earth in April. There was a three-hour interpretive walk to connect with cultural landscapes through the ages in Nose Hill Park where attendees could be closer to the stars.

The group at the John Laurie Blvd parking lot began the 2.2 km route on pathway and gravel trail. The leaders were Crystal Many Fingers, a Blackfoot member of the Kainai First Nation of Treaty 7, and Laureen Bryant, a professional archaeologist who focused on human occupation.

Legends and sharing stories are an integral part of an oral culture. The importance of Nose Hill to pre-contact indigenous people is highlighted by sites such as the buffalo rubbing stone for ceremonies, vision questing, and fasting.

A natural area is a City-owned park with a natural/ native plant community. Our primary role is to preserve the natural significance. Conservation protects these (relatively) undisturbed parcels of land. Damage can be repaired while loss can be restored.

Public engagement and feedback from tourists will contribute to Calgary's 20-year Park Plan. After a draft proposal, there comes a final version by spring 2024, before presentation to City Council. For more information, visit https://engage.calgary.ca/parksplan.

A House or a Home?

If I ask you to picture a "house" in your mind, what do you see? Probably the exterior of a house, maybe a peaked roof or large windows, maybe some flowers and trees? Now, what if I ask you to think of the word "home" instead? Chances are you are focused more on the interior, the furniture, the photos on the wall, or the decorating and the things that we do to make our "house" into a "home."

Everyone needs a home, but that home does not always need to be a "house." It might be a condo, a townhouse, even a trailer or a room in a friend's house. Regardless of the form, housing has become expensive and not everyone has access to good, safe, or affordable housing. If you use the Bow River pathways, it's likely that you have seen tents or shelters in the trees or along the riverbanks. It's not just in downtown areas. Last year there was a shelter in the trees in Brenner Park near Dr. EW Coffin School.

What has changed? At the risk of over-simplifying complex issues, it does seem that changes can be broadly lumped into two categories: social/economic issues and development/building changes.

Certainly, COVID accelerated some trends that were already present. Some users of facilities like the Drop-In Centre didn't feel safe and some organizations had to cut back on the services they were able to provide. Many people lost their jobs as businesses were shut down. The LRT lost much of its ridership and some stations were used as ad hoc temporary shelters or gathering spaces, plus there was an increased presence of drugs like opioids and Fentanyl. Many individuals found themselves in precarious positions or homeless.

But housing itself also changed. When Brentwood was developed 60 years ago, nobody had ever heard of Airbnb and "flipping" houses wasn't jargon that most people knew. In a May Bugle article, Lee Hunt interviewed residents who have lived in Brentwood since the beginning of the community, some for over 60 years! If you are a longtime resident, when you bought your house, you were likely looking primarily for a long-term "home" and not so concerned with the appreciation and valuation of your home as an asset.


Other factors also enter into the picture: work from home (the ability to live anywhere and commute only rarely), short-term rentals and Airbnb, foreign ownership, and even a proliferation of renovation shows on TV that promote quick renovations as a means of rapidly increasing the value of a home. On top of that, rapidly increasing housing prices in places like Vancouver and Toronto provided windfall gains for property owners who could "flip" their properties and make a lot of money for simply holding a property for a short period of time.

In most of those cases, property is viewed primarily as an investment rather than a "home." When a new Canadian law with regards to foreign buyers of residential properties took effect January 1, the statement on Prime Minister Justin Trudeau's website was that "The desirability of Canadian homes is attracting profiteers, wealthy corporations, and foreign investors. This is leading to a real problem of underused and vacant housing, rampant speculation, and skyrocketing prices. Homes are for people, not investors."

"Homes are for people, not investors." Certainly, we need investment in houses, but should it be privately or publicly funded? What role should the City play in creating or supporting more affordable housing options, for example, converting existing office towers into housing? There are no easy or correct answers, but there are many different opinions as to how to begin to tackle the problems.

From a Planning perspective, it might seem that the easiest way to have more options for housing, especially more affordable options, is simply to build a lot more. If there is a glut of housing, prices should come down, right? Except it doesn't seem to be working that way. Many of the newer townhouses and multi-unit buildings are replacing existing old homes: the old ones were cheaper to rent, while the new homes sell or rent for much higher amounts. Newer doesn't necessarily mean affordable. Plus, with increasing numbers of new residents coming to Calgary, the number of new builds cannot outpace the growth.

Herein lies the challenge: according to Statistics Canada, Calgary's population increased by 42,225 between 2021 and 2022. If you were in charge of Planning and Development, where and how would you house that number of people? Part two of this article will continue next month with a look at some facts and figures.

I hope this message finds you well. I want to take a moment to discuss the importance of preserving natural areas in our community. Natural areas are a unique type of park space that play a vital role in supporting the biodiversity of our city. These spaces provide a natural environment for plants, insects, birds, and other wildlife to thrive while also offering a place for the public to access and enjoy.

Unlike manicured parks, natural areas do not require the same level or frequency of management. It may be tempting to mow or trim natural area vegetation near your property line, but doing so can have damaging effects on the natural area. Mowing removes wildlife habitat and alters the local ecological system, diminishing the health and integrity of natural areas and reducing their ability to provide benefits like stormwater storage and filtration, carbon sequestration, and pollinator habitat.

Furthermore, mowing interferes with everyone's ability to enjoy the natural aesthetic of these areas. Therefore, it is crucial to understand that maintenance methods like mowing and weed control are different for natural areas versus manicured parks. By avoiding mowing into natural areas, you can help protect native plants, animals, and the ecological systems that allow them to thrive in our city.

Remember, park space is available for all Calgarians to enjoy. For more information on natural areas and how they are maintained, please visit https://www.calgary.ca/parks/natural-areas or contact 311.

Additionally, I want to bring your attention to the issue of pooled water on streets during heavy rainfalls. If you notice water accumulating around storm drains and it hasn't drained within 90 minutes, take a photo and report it using the 311 app or through an online request at calgary. ca/stormdrains. This will help the City's crews prioritize their response. However, if the water poses an immediate threat to safety or is entering a building, please contact 311 immediately.

Let's work together to preserve our natural areas and keep our community safe during heavy rainfall.
