Initial access will be prioritized to health care practitioners and critical infrastructure workers.


Additional spaces will then be available to first responders (firefighters and police officers) and others in essential services.



Since the 1960s, various groups have lobbied to have Nose Hill preserved as a natural park. In 1972, a group representing eight communities pursued the matter. The result was the Nose Hill Design Brief, a City plan to set aside 1,600 hectares.

In 1976, however, the City rezoned part of the land for housing. In response to public discontent, the City reviewed the zoning issue, and in 1980, approved the Nose Hill Park Master Plan, which aimed to preserve 1,096 hectares as a park.

In 1981, the Nose Hill Park Communities Board was formed to provide public input into implementation of this plan. Twelve community associations were represented on the board, and it kept the issue in the public eye. The City finally reached a deal with remaining landowners in 1989 and the 1,052 hectare Nose Hill Park became a reality.

The remarkable Glenbow Library and Archive, a collection that documents the history of Western Canada, is now housed at the University of Calgary as the Glenbow Western Research Centre. The Nose Hill Park Communities Board files contain historical information: briefs, plans, proposals, reports, submissions, legal papers, maps, and drawings.

PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT REPORT

Only a few new development applications have been received during the past month. One of them is for a 2-storey 6-plex to be built at 3520 Centre Street NE. The plans show two units to be developed on each floor and in the basement, with each unit containing two bedrooms, two bathrooms, living, and kitchen areas. The file reference for this development permit application is DP2023-00451.

There is a development permit application for a semidetached with basement suites at 224 34 Avenue NE. Comments on this are due by March 3. The file reference is DP2023-00165.

The following DP applications are still under review: DP2022-08058 for a rowhouse at 3424 Centre B St NW. We are pleased to report that, in response to comments the Community Association filed, the developer has agreed to move one of the second-floor bedroom windows to face east towards the laneway rather than face south. In addition, the second-floor bathroom windows are to be frosted glass. Both these changes will reduce the units overlooking the backyards to the south and help maintain the privacy of residents of the adjoining properties. We are also pleased that the developer considered our suggestions for better placement of waste and recycling bins, to provide more convenience to future residents.

DP2022-07590 for a rowhouse without suites at 404 33 Ave NW.

Development Permit application DP2022-04064 for a rowhouse at 3306 1 Street NE has just been approved. There will be a three-week appeal period once the approval has been advertised.

With respect to LOC2022-0112 for H-GO land use at 453 and 457 35 Avenue NW, the public hearing at Council on this land use change is scheduled for March 7. Anyone who wishes to submit comments or to speak at Council should watch for information regarding how and when to submit their letter or request to speak. It should be kept in mind that land use is judged separately from building development plans. Land use allows for a variety of building forms and site layouts within the rules of that particular land use designation. Where the "rubber meets the road" is in the Development Permit stage.

The DP application pertaining to this property is still under review. The amended plans (v3) can be downloaded from the development map (look under the About tab). The file reference is DP2022-05441.

A new Planning communication/information tool was recently implemented by the City. It can be found at www.calgary.ca/planningmatters. This website provides access to online notifications of public hearings, links to Council agenda, and links to information on how to submit letters or present to Council. You can also sign up for email delivery of planning news items.

As always, we encourage Highland Park residents to keep informed of redevelopment activities in the community through the use of the City's development map.

The Good Food Box

The Good Food Box program is run by Calgary's Community Kitchen Program, and the Highland Park Community Association and its volunteers host an ordering and pickup depot. As always, we offer in-person ordering between 6:00 and 7:00 pm at our hall on the order date with our Good Food Box volunteer, Ellen, set up in the lobby. Order pick-up is also at our hall between 6:00 and 7:00 pm on the pick-up dates. We are still also providing an e-transfer ordering option. To do that, you can e-transfer me for your order by no later than 4:30 pm on the order date; send it to AnneNaumann@shaw.ca and I will ensure your order gets tallied and payment gets submitted.

There are three different sizes of GFB boxes, small for \$25. medium for \$30, and large for \$35. HPCA doesn't make any money on this program; it is merely offered as a service to our residents and other Calgarians in our area. For last month, the small box I ordered included: one head icebera lettuce, one large turnip, one head cauliflower, two red peppers, three bananas, three lbs. onions, three gala apples, three naval oranges, one avocado, one head garlic, two lbs. carrots, one-pint grape tomatoes, five lbs. potatoes, and a recipe for carrot, ginger, coconut milk soup. I haven't tried that recipe yet, but it sounds delicious! With the cauliflower, I made two dishes using half of the head each time, one was something my mum used to make that I haven't had in ages: steamed cauliflower with cheese sauce. The other recipe is below, I hope you like it. Note: I cut the amounts of the ingredients in half to use up the ½ head of cauliflower. You can vary or substitute the amounts as you like.

Cauliflower "Fried Rice"

Prep Time: About 20 minutes; makes four to six servings **Kitchen Supplies Needed:** Sharp knife, large bowl, small bowl, medium to large frying pan, blender or food processor

Ingredients:

- *Amounts don't need to be exact
- 1 head of cauliflower, about 4 to 5 cups chopped into chunks
- 2 tablespoons (30 ml) of soy sauce or gluten-free Tamari sauce
- 1 tablespoon (15 ml) of sesame oil (can use canola or olive oil, but the sesame oil gives a great flavour)
- 1 tablespoon (15 ml) freshly grated ginger root (or jarred minced ginger)
- 1/4 teaspoon (1.25 ml) pepper

- 2 tablespoons (30 ml) of vegetable oil, divided into 2 portions, for 2 separate batches of frying
- 2 large eggs, beaten
- 2 cloves garlic, minced (or jarred minced garlic)
- 1 white or red onion, diced
- 1 ½ cups (375 ml) broccoli florets, chopped can omit, or substitute another crunchy vegetable such as chopped celery or canned bamboo shoots
- 2 carrots, peeled and grated
- 1 cup of frozen vegetables (any one of or a combination of corn, carrots, peas, beans)
- 2 green onions, thinly sliced (optional)
- ½ teaspoon (2.5 ml) sesame seeds can omit, or can add more if no sesame oil used

Directions:

- In batches, put chunks of cauliflower into blender or food processor and pulse until it resembles rice, about 2 to 3 minutes per batch. Set aside in a large bowl.
- In a small bowl, mix together the soy sauce, sesame oil, grated ginger, and pepper and set aside.
- Heat 1 tablespoon of vegetable oil in a frying pan over low heat; add beaten eggs and cook without stirring until cooked through, about 2 to 3 minutes, flipping once. Remove from pan and set aside to cool, then cut into small pieces.
- Heat remaining tablespoon of oil in the frying pan over medium heat. Add garlic and onion; cook and stir until onions have become transparent, about 3 to 4 minutes. Add all other vegetables except cauliflower and green onions and cook until vegetables are tender. About 3 to 4 minutes.
- Stir in riced cauliflower, chopped eggs, green onions, and soy sauce mixture. Cook and stir until heated through and cauliflower is tender, about 3 to 4 minutes. Serve and garnish with sesame seeds.

Getting All Your Benefits

Canada generous system of benefits has expanded to include the new Canada Dental Benefit and a top-up to the Canada Housing Benefit.

The Canada Dental Benefit provides financial support for eligible families earning less than \$90,000 per year. Parents and guardians with children under 12 years-old may be eligible to receive up-front, direct payments totaling up to \$1,300 per child (up to \$650 per year) if they obtain dental care for which the parent has out of pocket costs and no access to a private dental insurance plan.

The one-time top-up to the Canada Housing Benefit provides a \$500 payment to low-income renters facing housing affordability challenges. It is available to renters who had an adjusted net income for 2021 of \$35,000 or less for families, or \$20,000 or less for individuals, and pay at least 30% of their adjusted net income on rent for their own principal residence in Canada.

While some benefits are automatic, many benefits require that Canadians submit an application in order to receive them. The Government of Canada has a very useful online tool available that makes sure you are aware of these benefits. Visit www.canadabenefits.gc.ca and use the online 'Benefits Finder' which generates personalized results based on a few simple multiple-choice questions.

I would encourage you to try this tool even if you do not think you may be entitled to any benefits. Very often life circumstances change, and you may qualify for a program that you previously did not.

Most assistance programs require up-to-date tax filings, so it is also very important that those looking to access benefits keep up to date on their taxes. The Canada Revenue Agency has thousands of volunteers who can also assist with this task. Learn more at www.canada.ca/taxes.

Green Line's stations are designed to promote accessible, safe, and secure transit use for all Calgarians.

Stations will feature plenty of signage, info displays, and wayfinding details to help riders navigate the area. A tactile strip will also inform visually impaired riders of the platform's edge.

Station platforms will also be lower, meaning Calgarians will move through less ramps to reach a platform from street level. Our underground stations will feature convenient elevator access from ground level and will likewise take advantage of CCTV cameras and help phones to promote security.

Where possible, our stations will feature weather protection, including transparent and heated passenger shelters; well-lit, open spaces with plenty of CCTV cameras for added security; and help phones that offer immediate assistance.

Our new Urbos 100 Light Rail Vehicle (LRV) also makes use of accessibility- and safety-conscious low-floor technology. Lowered floors remove the need for steps during boarding and integrate more easily with existing city infrastructure and communities. As well, the LRV's eight entrances dock level with station platforms, providing a safe, accessible, and convenient boarding experience for riders.

In addition, the Urbos offers three designated, roomy areas for people with mobility aids. Each of these designated areas is flanked by two entryways that allow immediate boarding and exiting for people with mobility aids. The Urbos also includes an easy to navigate, spacious interior with plenty of hand grips.
