## News from the Friends of Nose Hill

The City Nature Challenge is a global community citizen science event wherein community groups, experts, and residents collaborate to find all types of nature around them. In the Calgary Metropolitan Region, the top 150 users in 2024 surpassed 10,000 observations. By then, they had uploaded a total of nearly 40,000 observations of Calgary's local flora and fauna. The year marked the tenth anniversary of both iNaturalist and the City Nature Challenge. For the Calgary Area, in 2025, there were 15,923 observations, 28,462 identifications, 891 species, 659 identifiers, and 356 observers. In 2026, the eighth annual Calgary City Nature Challenge focused on data quality for plants, insects, fungi, and wildlife. All information on Calgary's natural areas posted on iNaturalist can be used to revise and update the 1980 Calgary "Green Book" by 2030. Although you do not need an expert to lead a nature walk, John McFaul of Nature Calgary, in cooperation with Bird Friendly Alberta, guided field trips on Nose Hill. The group met near the 64 Ave and 14 Street NW parking lot. Much of their trip was off paved trails and on unlevel ground. A previous walk started at the Berkley Gate and 14 Street NW entrance. Calgary was one of the first certified Nature Canada Bird Friendly Cities. Injured birds can be rescued, in early morning and at night, but, of course, prevention is preferred. The aim is to identify and reduce threats since, in an urban environment, city lights and reflections cause collisions. Window treatments can help. Also turning off unnecessary lights. During fall and spring migrations, downtown is unsafe due to tall buildings, especially at night. Wildlife cameras examine how birds travel and weather radar is used to predict flight directions to support conservation and research. Learn more at <https://birdcast.org/>.

# Backyard Play Safety

Emergency Health Services (EHS) Alberta would like to encourage parents and caregivers to ensure that their backyard play area(s) is made safe for children. Although direct supervision is the best method to reduce the chance of injury, always ensure play equipment in your yard is in good repair and is suited to the age and skill of the children using it. Check the equipment often; replace or repair any worn or broken parts.

### Lawn and Garden Tools

- Keep young children away from outdoor power equipment.
- Serious burns may result from touching hot engine surfaces.
- Ensure that all sharp tools, fuel, chemicals, and other hazardous substances are stored in a secure, locked area. A simple latch may not be sufficient.

### Water Hazards

- Drowning contributes to unintentional injury-related death among young children.

- Children can drown in just a few centimetres of water if it covers their mouth and nose.
- Ensure all backyard swimming pools are fenced. The fence must be at least 1.8 metres high and have a self-latching, self-closing, and lockable gate.

### Insect Bites and Stings

- Minimize the risk of attracting insects by not wearing strong perfumes or scented lotions.
- Avoid wearing brightly coloured clothing outdoors.
- Consider destroying or relocating hives and nests situated near your home.
- To avoid injury through inadvertently stepping on a stinging insect, always wear footwear outdoors.
- If your child has received an 'EpiPen Junior' prescription from your physician (for anaphylactic reactions) ensure they understand when and how to use it.
- If your child experiences a severe reaction to an insect sting, or other environmental cause, seek medical attention or call 9-1-1.

# Divorce: Who Gets the House?

The decision of “should we or should we not” get a divorce is not easy. It is a process that involves asking yourself a lot of questions about the future. A common question people ask themselves is “If we get a divorce, who will get the house?”

Many divorcing couples own a home together. There are a lot of emotions and memories attached to the home: A child’s first steps, family dinners, family movie nights, the list goes on.

Most often, the question of “who gets the house” arises from another important question: “What is best for the kids?” Children who grew up in the house likely attend schools nearby. Their friends may live in the neighbourhood.

### 50/50 Roadblock

One major roadblock to one parent owning the house is this: the law (in most cases) says the house is a 50/50 split after a divorce. This means that each spouse is entitled to 50% of the value of the home.

In cases such as this, there are options to avoid this 50/50 roadblock. As part of the divorce process, most couples can negotiate with each other and agree how property and other assets will be split between them. This can be seen from the following example:

- Mr. and Mrs. Lahey own a home worth \$1 million dollars. They also have investments in stocks worth \$1 million dollars.
- Mrs. Lahey wants to stay in the home with the kids. Her aging mom also lives with them. The children attend school near the house.
- Mr. Lahey is okay with moving out, but he does not want to lose out on the money tied up in the house.

**Solution:** they can agree that Mr. Lahey gets the \$1 million dollars in stock investments, and in turn, Mrs. Lahey becomes sole owner of the family home that is also worth \$1 million dollars.

### If Spouses Can’t Agree, a Judge Can Step In

If a couple cannot agree on who stays in the house, there are times when an Alberta judge will step in



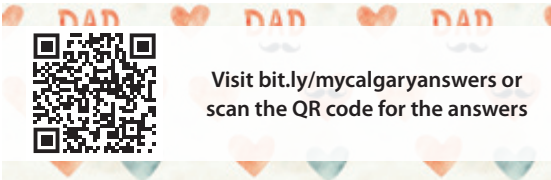
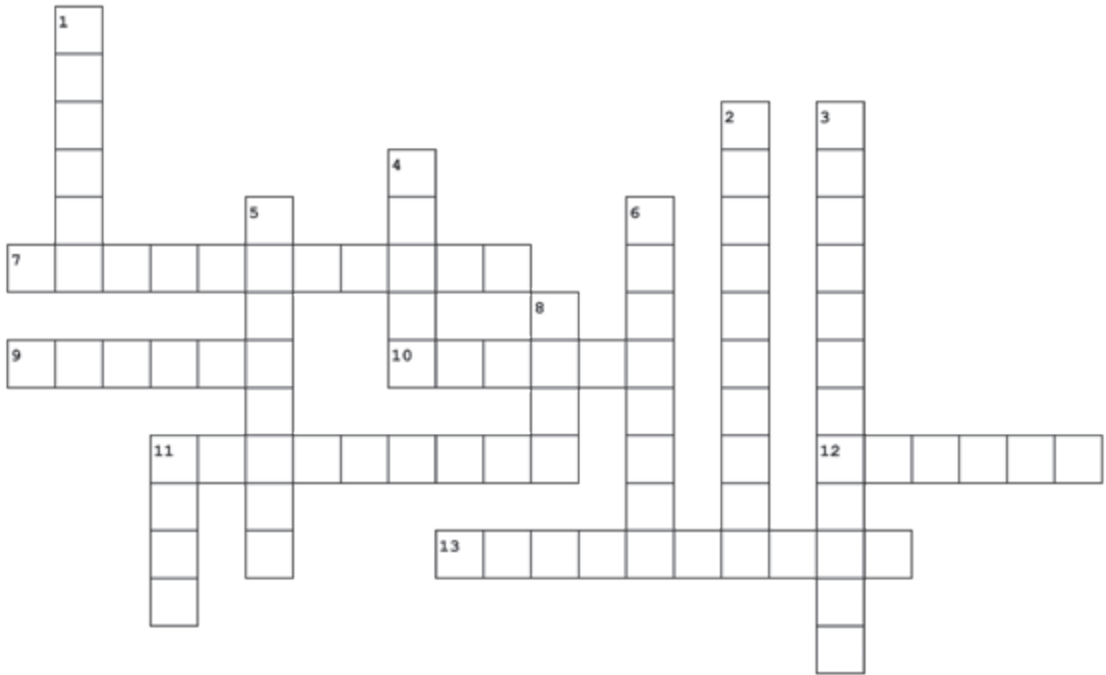
and make this decision for them. Sometimes, a judge will order the house to be sold, and the proceeds split between the couple.

However, in other cases, a judge can issue something called an “exclusive possession order.” This is a legal directive that says, “Who lives in the house, and who does not.”

The following are circumstances where a judge might order that one spouse can live in the home:

- There is an economic imbalance – example: a stay-at-home mom has no income, and dad earns \$300,000 per year.
- The children need the home for stability – Here, educational needs, health, or extra-curricular activities may require a child to continue living in the home with one parent.

When deciding what to do with the house, it is always best if a couple can agree on something fair for each of them. However, when that is not possible, one spouse may have to go to Court and ask a judge for help.

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Calgary is a city that builds, competes, volunteers, and shows up. That is why I was pleased to see the Spring Economic Update include \$755 million in sports funding. This investment will help more kids and families become active, support community programs and facilities, and back the world-class athletes who make Canadians proud.

Sport is community-building. It is where youth learn teamwork, where families connect, and where local organizations create belonging — on fields, rinks, courts, and tracks.

The update also includes measures that matter for affordable housing in Calgary. There is also support for workers and young people, including Team Canada Strong, which will help train and hire the skilled trades we need for housing, infrastructure, and major projects. The update builds on 175,000 employment and work-integrated learning opportunities through Canada Summer Jobs, the Youth Employment and Skills Strategy, and the Student Work Placement Program.

For Calgary, these measures mean stronger communities, more affordable homes, more opportunities for youth, and better pathways into skilled trades. As your MP, my focus is making sure federal policy keeps delivering to build a Calgary, Alberta, and Canada strong for all of us.
