New Heritage Guidelines

This past fall, the City of Calgary introduced heritage guidelines to preserve the character of streets with significant historical houses. In Tuxedo Park, you'll recognize these as the 20 Ave West with the small cottages and the 19 Ave with a mix of pre-WWII houses.

The guidelines aren't meant to preserve individual houses; there are separate tools to do so, but it does encourage the retention of existing character with appropriate massing and architectural elements. Similarly, it doesn't restrict new development, but makes sure that the development is appropriate to the area, avoiding the conflict of a modernist house next to a cottage bungalow. The Calgary Naturalists' Club was started in the late 1940s. Its activities included plant, bird, and star study groups. After the Calgary Bird Club was formed, the Calgary Naturalists' Club was discontinued, due to lack of support, since so many of its members had transferred their membership. The Calgary Bird Club evolved and became the Calgary Field Naturalists' Society, an advocate for the ongoing protection of parks and other natural areas by letters and through engagement with city officials.

According to the Provincial Archives of Alberta, when the first meeting of the Federation of Alberta Naturalists was held, it was attended by representatives from six regional naturalist clubs: the Calgary Field Naturalists' Society (now known as Nature Calgary), the Edmonton Bird Club, the Edmonton Natural History Club, the Lethbridge Natural History Society, the Alberta Natural History Society (of Red Deer), and the Bow Valley Naturalists. Membership in the Federation has since grown to include over 40 clubs, representing thousands of individuals.

The Federation (now known as Nature Alberta) was registered under the Societies Act to increase knowledge of natural history and understanding of ecological processes; to promote the exchange of information and views among natural history clubs and societies; and to foster and assist in the formation of additional natural history clubs and societies in Alberta. The aims are to promote new natural areas and nature reserves; to conserve and protect species, communities, or other features of interest; as well as to organize or coordinate conferences, field meetings, nature camps, research, and other activities. The group offers naturalists a forum in which questions relating to the conservation of the natural environment may be discussed, united positions are developed, and the means of translating these positions are put into action.

Find Your History

If spending time with your family over the holidays has sparked an interest in your family history, the Government of Canada has resources for you to explore your genealogy.

Through Libraries and Archives Canada online you can access census, immigration, citizenship and naturalization, employment, and First World War Personnel records to gain insight into your family history. Some of these records are digitized and others available to order.

Starting in 1851, census records included the names of residents, their country or province of birth, age, and many other details. Library and Archives Canada holds an extensive collection of Canadian census records from 1640 to 1926, and for Newfoundland from 1671 to 1945. Starting in 1901, most census records indicated the year of arrival for immigrants.

Library and Archives Canada holds citizenship records including naturalization lists from 1915 to 1951, Naturalization records in Upper Canada and Canada West from 1828 to 1850, and Citizenship registration records for the Montreal Circuit Court from 1851 to 1945. They also hold many land-related records that paint a picture of the lives of homesteaders in the prairies.

Related to the First World War, Libraries and Archives Canada holds personnel records, Courts Martial files, Navy records, CEF sailing lists, Prisoner of war records, Hospital records. air services records. and other files.

An additional resource is Canadiana Heritage: a free tool for accessing digitized archival collections encompassing nearly 40 million pages of primary-source documents. Chronicling the country and its people from the 1600s to the mid-1900s, this collection represents a vast and unique resource for Canadian historians, students, and genealogists.

These documents are categorized into collections including Genealogy, Aboriginal History, Government Documents, Military History, and Landmark Papers. Canadiana, the sister site of Canadiana Heritage, contains monographs, serials, government publications, and maps.

TUXEDO EATS!

The secret to great health is digestion. There, the secret is out. The health of your digestive tract can be the difference between you feeling sick, well, happy, or sad. It's so important that it affects all other body systems. Let's say you are breaking out into pimples; yes, stress could be the culprit, but you can also bet that your digestive tract is trying to tell you that it ain't working up to standard and that something is probably out of sorts.

Your digestive system is made up of several different organs working together for the common good, which is your health. Think of a hippie commune, but in your body. Yes, there are hippies in your body. Digestion, simply put, is the process in which your body breaks down food into molecules that can be absorbed for nourishment, so if it's out of whack it throws you off completely. Think of it as that one hippie in the commune not pulling their weight; it can throw the whole community off and cause complete chaos among the masses. Like if Lavender's job was to cook, and she fell ill, and no one else knew how to cook...big problems ahead for our love preaching friends.

So many of our health problems can be helped by aiding our digestive system. 90% of your serotonin is in your digestive tract as well as your immune system. This means that your mood and your overall health is directly affected if your digestion isn't working properly. Eat fermented foods and eat your veggies (the real ones that live in the produce section of your grocery store). Now, let's take a brief look at how the whole process of digestion works.

Mouth - Digestion actually all starts before food even hits your mouth. That mouthwatering feeling that you get when you are just looking at that delicious slice of pie is the production of saliva. Saliva contains enzymes that break down food once that pie is in your mouth, and your teeth help you chew your food, making food particles small enough for you to be able to swallow them and for the enzymes to do their thing. Then, there's your tongue: home to tastebuds and a muscle that works with saliva to form a ball that can be swallowed.

Esophagus - Through a series of naturally muscular contractions called peristalsis, food particles (basically the food ball your tongue created) are brought to your stomach via the esophagus expressway; think of it as a rattly sky train ride through a tunnel.

Stomach - A few jobs get done here. First, it acts kind of like a holding sack for food. It also releases stomach acid to break down food even further. It also churns food into an oatmeal like paste. Yum!

Small Intestines - Further breakdown of food as it first enters, and absorption of nutrients through the bloodstream, and liver storage, as it moves further down the intestinal tube.

Large Intestines - The end of the line. Its main role is to absorb all the remaining water from the food and to compact waste into a tight, poop-like bundle. I'm sure you can guess what happens next.

Liver, Gallbladder, Pancreas - The liver produces bile, which is needed for the body to absorb fats. The pancreas secretes enzymes used for digesting proteins, carbs, and fats, and the liver also processes the nutrients that are absorbed from the small intestine.

Here Are a Few Tips for Better Digestion:

- · Chew your food well.
- Eat your bitter foods. They stimulate saliva which has an enzyme that breaks down starches.
- Drink lemon water. Along with increasing digestive juices, lemons also encourage the production of bile and aids digestion.
- Eat fermented foods.
- Be mindful when eating. Stress and other outside disturbances actually slow down and disrupt the digestion process.
- Eat only until you are 3/4 full.
