

Orange Vegetables Are Healthy and Delicious

Canada's Food Guide Plate encourages Canadians to make half their plate vegetables or fruit. One recommendation is to have orange vegetables a few times a week.

Orange vegetables contain carotenoids. These are plant compounds that that convert into Vitamin A in your body. Vitamin A helps promote healthy vision and helps your eyesight in dark lighting. It also promotes the growth and health of cells in your body, and it helps regulate your immune system.

Orange vegetables that grow in Alberta are carrots, peppers, pumpkins, squash, and even sweet potatoes.

Here are a few ways to add orange vegetables to your meals:

- Choose sweet potato instead of regular potatoes.
- Serve roasted butternut squash.
- Serve sliced carrots or peppers as a snack.
- Roast carrots or peppers as a side dish.
- · Add pureed pumpkin to regular mashed potatoes, soups, and sauces. Or add it into muffin or cookie batter when baking. For a fall treat, try it in a smoothie with cinnamon and nutmeg.

DRCA Wildlife and Human Cohabitation Committee Update

We, as a community, share a responsibility to protect ourselves, our neighbours, as well as local wildlife. Tragically, a family of four bears were euthanized after becoming used to feeding on food in neighbourhood garbage and compost bins. Additionally, a bear family was relocated earlier in the fall for the same reason.

Real world experience points to garbage (including compost) as the most significant contributor to humanbear conflicts and supports a strategy of reducing bear access to garbage. In fact, it has been documented that putting garbage and compost out only on the morning of pick up cuts the chances of a bear visit from 70% to 2%! Garbage and compost should be stored securely until it is disposed of.

Please do your part to ensure your bins are not outside. We suggest using the final winter months to organize your garage to make space for your black, blue, and green bins. We urge everyone to put bins out after 5:00 am on the morning of pick up from April 1 to October 31, when bears are the most active. These bins are a potential safety risk to all when they are out as they encourage local wildlife to scour them for food. If we limit the amount of time that the bins are outside, it will be much better for our local wildlife and therefore our community.

Don't like the smell from bins? Consider one of the many companies in Calgary that offer bin cleaning services. Thank you!

Homeowners' Association News

Happy March to all! Spring is just around the corner and as the winter season enters its final months, the NDHA's main activity continues to be snow clearing of the community walkways. The clean up of lost brush bristles will ramp up as the snow recedes. We endeavor to make our paths and sidewalks as safe as possible, but Mother Nature gives us all manner of weather and temperatures at this time of the year and ice can form unexpectedly overnight. Please be vigilant when walking outside: consider wearing ice treads over your shoes. Use caution and do not hesitate to contact us if you find an area that needs attention.

Snow Clearing Differences

Homeowners, condo associations, and commercial property managers are responsible for clearing snow and ice from public sidewalks directly adjacent to their property. All other snow clearing responsibility in the community is divided between The City of Calgary and the NDHA under separate contracts with ULS. The NDHA requires ULS to clear more frequently than the City does, and that is why you often see some walkways cleared while others are not. See FAQ #22 on our website for maps and more detailed information on this issue.

2023 Fees

By now, you should have received your annual NDHA invoice. Please contact us if you have not. Your invoice package included information explaining why your membership fee was raised by \$18 to \$325. For most homeowners, your invoice was sent to the email address registered on your membership account portal. If there is no email address on file, your paper invoice was sent via Canada Post. Payments can be made online at our website, ndha.ca, or by cheque to our mailing address.

If you are unsure of your invoice or payment status, please access your membership portal on our website. If you require help accessing the membership portal, you may contact our membership director at NDHAmembership@ndha.ca. Important: some people own multiple residences in Discovery Ridge; please indicate your full name and the address of the property in question in your email enquiry. Thank you in advance for your timely payment!

New Homeowner?

If you have moved to Discovery Ridge in the past year, welcome! Our news articles and the FAQ section on our website has a plethora of great information for all homeowners and residents. If you have not yet done so, please set up your membership portal for contact information and fee payment access. If you are unfamiliar with how to set up and access your membership portal, or have difficulty doing so, please reach out to us at NDHAmembership@ndha.ca._We would really appreciate you taking a moment to do this; it is important that we

record the correct owner information for your property in our files. It will also make a big difference in how much time our volunteers spend tracking down changes of ownership. Lawyers sometimes do not contact us regarding ownership changes or status of fees. This should be sorted upon sale and is the responsibility of the parties involved to correctly pro-rate paid (or outstanding) fees upon the sale of each property. Please note that the annual fee is not optional; it is secured by the NDHA encumbrance registered on your property title. Fee enquiries should be emailed to the NDHA treasurer at accounts@ndha.ca.

Black Knot Tree Fungus - Please Prune It Out!

If you look at your trees right now and you see a dark, lumpy mass clinging to any of the branches, you probably have a tree infested with black knot fungus. Black knot is endemic to Calgary and spreads via spores from within the lumpy mass. This fungus affects Mayday, Chokecherry (including the red Schubert's prevalent in our community), and other stone fruit trees. For the survival of your infected tree, it is recommended to prune it out while the tree is dormant (no leaves) and the mass is easy to see. Specific procedures must be followed when pruning to reduce further contamination.

The City of Calgary prunes black knot fungus from trees on public property within our community; please help to control this scourge and potentially save your own tree(s) by doing the same. Consider your safety; hiring a professional certified arborist may be the best plan but they book up quickly. You will want to make contact soon to reserve your appointment. More information on black knot can be found on the City or Province's websites under "Black Knot Fungus."



Choosing a Meal Delivery Service

from the Better Business Bureau

Meal delivery services give consumers a more convenient way to make home-cooked dinners by delivering fresh, pre-measured ingredients and easy-to-follow recipes to your doorstep. But just like any other service, each company is different.

Pricing, ingredients, and preparation requirements vary greatly between services. You'll need to do some homework to pick the one that best meets your family's needs. If the appeal of a meal delivery subscription is learning new recipes and experimenting with ingredients, you might choose one company. But if your main interest is speed and simplicity, another may be a better fit.

The following tips will help select an ideal meal delivery service for your household:

- · Research the delivery service. Ask friends and family, read reviews, and check BBB.org to learn about past customers' experiences.
- Set a budget and check the fine print. Pricing can vary from one company to the next. Make certain the service aligns with your budget. In addition, not all meal delivery services include shipping fees in their pricing – read the fine print.
- Know your skill level. Before committing to a plan, research what kind of cooking techniques you'll need to know. If a company's recipes require searing, roasting, and braising, do you know how? If not, make sure you have the time to learn new techniques.
- · Consider ingredient quality. Not all companies offer organic, non-GMO, or free-range meal ingredients. If these are must-haves for your family, make sure the company offers them.
- · Determine how much prep work you want. Some companies do more chopping and sauce-making than others. This seemingly small difference can make a big difference in how long each meal takes to make.
- Consider the customer service. If there is ever a problem - a missing recipe card or ingredient, for

- example you want to know that you can count on customer service. Make sure there are clear, easy ways to contact the company, even late in the evening. Read the company's reviews and keep an eye out for any indication that customer service is lacking.
- · Check the cancellation policy. Before making a decision to subscribe to meal delivery, understand the cancellation policy. Each company is different and some may have very strict policies.
- Be careful with personal information. Most food delivery services process payments online. Make sure the company is legitimate before offering up personal information such as financial information and address.
- Review BBB tips for shopping online. Since meal delivery services don't usually have brick and mortar storefronts, consider BBB's tips for smart shopping online.



SAFE & SOUND

Burns and Scalds

from Alberta Health Services

Each year Emergency Medical Services respond to emergencies involving young children who have sustained severe burns or scalds. These incidents often occur inside the child's own home. Common causes include a child accidentally tipping hot liquids onto themselves, touching hot surfaces such as stoves, or making contact with electrical outlets. Fortunately, incidents such as these can be avoided by taking preventative measures.

Degrees of Burn

- 1°: Affects only the top layers of the skin; appears red like a sun burn; discomfort is generally tolerable.
- 2°: Deeper and much more painful than 1°burns; broken skin or blisters commonly develop.
- 3°: Severe: The deepest layers of skin and tissue are injured; may appear charred or leathery.

First Aid for Burns

- Skin may continue to burn if not cooled. Immediately douse burns with large amounts of cold water.
- Cover the burn with a sterile dressing, or at least clean material to protect infection.
- Over the counter medications may be used for pain. Adhere to directions given on the label.
- Seek further medical attention, as required.

Prevention of Burns

- · Check the temperature of your hot water tank. Temperatures as high as 60°C / 140°F will scald a child in just seconds.
- Use placemats instead of tablecloths. Tablecloths can be yanked downward causing hot drinks or food to spill on a child.
- Turn pot handles to the back of the stove and ensure cords from kettles, slow cookers, and other electrical appliances cannot be reached.
- Avoid picking up a child while holding any hot liquids.
- Ensure electrical outlets are made secure by installing commercially available safety devices which prohibit
- Keep children away from areas where appliances are in use (kettles, irons, hot stoves).

If you require immediate medical attention, call 911.
