About Us

The Eau Claire Community Association (ECCA) was founded in 1992 as a non-profit organization dedicated to maintaining and enhancing the quality of living in Eau Claire. It is recognized by the City of Calgary as the official voice of the Eau Claire community. The ECCA bylaws define the purpose and direction of the ECCA and are registered under the Societies Act of Alberta. The bylaws are available at www.eauclaireca.com/about.

The community of Eau Claire is located adjacent to the downtown commercial core, bounded by Prince's Island and the Bow River on the north and centre of 4 Avenue on the south, extending from the centre of 2 Street SW to the centre of 9 Street SW.

Mission

The Eau Claire Community Association strives to create a vibrant connected community. Our approach to planning and development is to enhance the quality of life for our residents.

Vision

Eau Claire is a safe, clean and liveable residential community proud of its natural environment. We are supportive of social and recreational gathering places and relevant businesses that support the community.





Membership

Membership in the ECCA is open to all residents. The annual fee is \$6 per household. The majority of Eau Claire condominium complexes (and therefore their residents) hold a membership, paid for by the condo corporation. Business memberships are also available. Strong membership empowers the ECCA to protect the interests of our community. Issues of key interest are planning, transportation and safety. The ECCA's role is to provide a voice for Eau Claire residents, to help ensure that community interests are being considered and that development is in keeping with the Area Redevelopment Plan.

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The 8 Street Revitalization Project starts in Eau Claire with North Anchor Park and extends to 17 Avenue: RiverWalk West starts in Eau Claire and extends to 14 Street. ECCA is concerned that these two projects, and any future decision on Lot 6, are being designed without any reference to each other or residents of Eau Claire. We encourage all residents to engage with the City at any opportunity and help us make the point that this is our Western Gateway and we want the intersection at Eau Claire to be viewed holistically.

The 8 Street Revitalization Project has already held public engagements and North Anchor Park is presented as entirely separate from anything else in Eau Claire. "The key directions to improve this space include bringing in features to animate the park, creating a variety of playful seating options, and introducing lighting to create a special ambiance, welcoming character, and improved sense of safety. The rendering above demonstrates how these design moves can enhance the park to become both a destination and work with 8 Street SW to improve the overall pedestrian experience."

Lot 6 is an underutilized parking lot that's been activated for the past two summers for pop-up events. There isn't any engagement yet on Calgary.ca but given its location it needs to be discussed in concert with the other two projects.

RiverWalk West is undergoing a juried selection process and most of the five designs currently being considered

do reference the land that's currently Lot 6 and/or the space the other team is calling North Anchor Park. "RiverWalk West presents an opportunity to create a unique identity and continuous public promenade connecting Fort Calgary to the west end of downtown. The redevelopment will continue the work to harmonize flood mitigation, increase stormwater improvements and upgrade the public realm required to support the growing demands for safe recreational and alternative commuter uses."

Ironically, one of the mandates from the Greater Downtown Plan for RiverWalk West is to "consolidate and review land use for fragmented City-owned parcels." But we haven't found any evidence they're considering the portion of the project in Eau Claire with either of the other two projects.

This heritage project includes a second part which will be available on our webpage within a few months. This project will commemorate many more points in our history, from the initial use by local First Nations communities onwards.

















RESIDENT PERSPECTIVES

The Sun: Our Friend and **Sometimes Foe**

Astronomers had been aware of dark spots on the Sun since the early 1600s, but it wasn't until 1755 they discovered the number of sunspots increased and decreased in cycles spanning 11 years.

On September 1, 1859, an English astronomer named Richard Carrington was keenly aware the number of sunspots was on the rise. While sketching a particularly large cluster, he witnessed an explosion of light lasting about five minutes. The flare was a coronal mass ejection (CME), a burst of magnetized plasma from the Sun's upper atmosphere. Normally, a CME takes several days to reach Earth. In this case, it took only 17.6 hours.

That night, the Earth experienced unprecedented electrical chaos. Telegraph poles and substations (precursor to the telephone) started catching fire and

northern and southern auroral displays, normally confined to the polar regions, were now visible as far south as Hawaii and as far north as Australia.

Carrington realized the flare he'd seen was almost certainly the cause of this massive geomagnetic disturbance. This connection had never previously been made. In his honour, the 1859 incident is now known as the Carrington Event.


It was the most powerful solar eruption in recorded history; causing wide-reaching communication failures as the telegraph system was simply unable to withstand the tremendous amount of electricity surging through the wires.

In 1989, a CME knocked out power to the province of Quebec, leaving 6 million people in the dark for nine hours. It also damaged transformers as far away as New Jersey and nearly took down the U.S. power grid from the Eastern Seaboard to the Pacific Northwest. On July 23, 2012, a CME equivalent to the Carrington Event narrowly missed Earth. Had it hit us, our technology dependent world would have suffered catastrophic damage.

HERITAGE STORIES

Calgary's Portuguese Heritage

Portugal's era of seafaring exploration is tied to Canada's history. Portuguese ships were in the waters near Newfoundland by the 1450s. In 1498, João Fernandes o Lavrador reached the coast of North America, with many expeditions following.

A major influx of Portuguese people to Canada occurred in the 1950s and 1960s. Many were from the Azores, a group of volcanic islands about 1500 km off the European coast. They are tropical outposts in the middle of the Atlantic Ocean, with rich soils and mild weather. Before the

rise of the services economy and tourism, agriculture and fishing were the main economic drivers.

Ottawa's official sponsorship of Portuguese immigration began in 1953. Canadian government officials on the islands actively recruited and assessed Azoreans to fill labour shortages on farms and the railways. With their skills in the trades and agriculture, Alberta was a natural destination for many, including my grandparents. Whereas immigration to Canada had previously taken place by boat, many from the Azores used a newer technology: the airplane.

For 17 years, my grandmother, and mother for a summer, worked at Pinecrest (later under the Lilydale brand) poultry plant in Ramsay. It opened in 1943 with community permission when the neighbourhood (formerly called Grandview) was a mix of residential and industrial activity, particularly since it was also a stockyard for the railway. The City acquired the land in 2022 and the plant will be demolished to make way for Green Line LRT construction and new developments. A modern and efficient poultry plant now operates in Dufferin North Industrial Park.

Two organizations in Calgary celebrate Portuguese heritage. Our Lady of Fatima Church began in 1970, with Father Raymond Vozza of Holy Trinity Parish offering monthly Mass for Calgary's Portuguese Catholics. Other services were held at host churches until Fatima Church was constructed in 1996.

At the Portuguese Society of Calgary, my grandfather played the tuba in the Filármonica Portuguêsa de Calgary, and dances are performed by the Portuguese Folk Group, established in 1983. Whether through culture or work, Portuguese people continue to add to Calgary's vibrancy and prosperity.

CRIME STATISTICS

The Eau Claire community experienced 5 crimes in September 2023, in comparison to 8 crimes the previous month, and 7 crimes in September one year ago. Eau Claire experiences an average of 4.8 crimes per month. On an annual basis, Eau Claire experienced a total of 58 crimes as of September 2023, which is down 12% in comparison to 66 crimes as of September 2022. 
