I am thrilled to be able to share news that our community hall restoration is now back in community hands, and we have a new volunteer board in place to help guide community activities and programs going forward.

We have been shut down since the sewage flood of January 2021, but now, 30 months later, the doors are open for you to use. Just about every piece of wire, plumbing pipe, tin, and drywall has been replaced. We have a modern kitchen with a double wall oven, an induction cooktop, two refrigerators, and a high temperature dishwasher and sanitizing stations. We have a new accessible washroom with a private diaper change station. Our boardroom is defined by a folding wall that opens up to create a grand foyer for larger events. Our fire and security systems have been upgraded and our hall and children's classroom have heat and air conditioning. On the outside, you will notice new automatic double doors, with a wonderful rock sitting area.

Glendale got a sneak peek of the work during our Stampede Breakfast in July where community volunteers served almost 2,000 people. We already have bookings this year for a family's Christmas dinner, birthday parties, and a wedding, along with being able to welcome back Guides and a martial arts user group to our space.

The real joy for our new board will be when Glendale residents start coming back to the hall on a regular basis. Are you a young parent who would like to lead a regular children's play time? Let the kids play in the hall while you share a coffee or tea with your neighbours in a cozy kitchen party. We have bags full of great games and toys for you to use. Connect with us and we'll help you make it happen.

Are you interested in coordinating regular family movie nights? There's a 110-inch screen with projector to host movie nights or to view the next big Stampeders or Flames game. New JBL speakers fill the hall with quality audio that hall users can control through Bluetooth on their own phones.

MONIKA'S GROVE

Add This to Your Garden!

What I've learned to love is just leaving my grove alone and seeing what happens. So, this year my plants didn't look as "good" as last year, aesthetically speaking, but it was an honest growing as a result of the wild weather and yes, smoke, which isn't particularly good for any living thing.

Fortunately, a few plants ignored the difficult conditions! While the common sunflower (Helianthus annuus) bloomed and went, the smooth aster (Symphyotrichum laeve) came back. Harebells (Campanula alaskana) are defiant. Astonishingly, an old wood rose hybrid (pink double flowers) has put on a fall display with a remarkable rose scent that reminds me of Damascene rose scent used for perfume. A lot of blooming plants seemed to be going into winter mode in mid-September.

I do want my native plants to "work" hard. I want colour, scent, interesting and varied leaf and stalk shapes, long blooming, no summer break, intolerant of weeds, look nice in winter, and pollinator-friendly. Not much to ask for. Fortunately, many native plants check boxes.

Time to bring praise to a prairie stalwart, our yellow coneflower (Ratibida columnifera) also known as the prairie coneflower, and as the cylindrical centre disks somewhat resemble the crown of a slender sombrero, it's also known as the Mexican hat in southern regions. It is promoted in seed collections here and for water-wise gardens. Toss a seed, get a plant. It can reach 60 cm tall and grows in clumps. It shows off during the summer months with continuous blooms and nice foliage. It is a sun plant, so place accordingly.

The native coneflower is a hardy perennial at Zone 3 all the way to 10. Note that plants from seeds might need another year to flower. I have a patch that grew through fireweed (Chamaenerion angustifolium) and it's looking quite stunning in there. At my mom's place, they rose above a serious infestation of weeds and pretty much conquered them.

It will grow in dry and rocky soil, loam, sandy loam, and clay loam soils, and is tolerant to weakly acidic to moderately alkaline and weak saline soils. It has low to

moderate water requirements, growing in areas that have annual precipitation of 10 to 30 inches. Sounds like Calgary! It has a deep taproot, which gives it an advantage over short roots and keeps it blooming over summer. Prairie coneflower is found on dry plains, prairies, waste ground, and along roadsides, and railroads and can be added to parks, recreational areas, and prairie restoration.

Pollinators are attracted: from honeybees to our native and solitary bees, to some moth species, flies, and wasps. Birds even come for seed and nectar. This is a plant that can be used in fresh and dry bouquets. Leave the stalks in winter as it's distinctive and looks good.

Tea was made from the leaves and flower heads and aboriginal peoples had quite the medicine cabinet from this one plant. Definitely a plant to consider for next year!

So Long, Cobra Chicken

I was biking home from work this week and noticed that there were none of the usual Yellow Warbler chirps coming from the bushes. They have all left, headed to Latin America for the warmer weather and the multitudes of insects that



come with it. I have yet to see the large 'V' of geese flying south, but I'm sure I will, and when I do, I will breathe a sigh of relief. The Canada Geese have left, we can go about our business more freely.

The internet has nicknamed them the 'cobra chicken' for their snake-like neck and hissing I suppose. They can be very mean! If you have ever been on the receiving end of its hissing beak, outstretched wings, and beady little eyes you know it's true. At the zoo my friend witnessed a child chasing one and it turned around and chased him, as he ran screaming it got in a peck on his posterior. They are not to be trifled with!

Its dapper appearance, with its chin-strapped, sleek black head and two-toned outfit makes its bad manners all the more disappointing. How did such a rude animal get the name 'Canada' when Canadians are known for being polite? There is a rumour that the goose is actually named after an ornithologist named John Canada. However, apparently that is unfounded, probably made up by some embarrassed Canadians trying to lay blame elsewhere. It's possible that the Canada goose was often seen flying north, toward its namesake country. Oh, and don't call them a 'Canadian Goose', there are lots of Canadian geese, as in a goose from Canada. I bet they don't want to be lumped in with the Canada Goose.

It's so hard to believe that at one time in the early 1900s the Canada Goose numbers were 'decimated' according to Audubon. Nowadays there are many articles about how places are overrun with them. They are ruining athletic fields, eating just-planted fields of food, and degrading water quality. Plus, they attack people. Efforts to save the Canada Geese populations actually introduced geese in areas where they weren't before. They especially took to urban locations and often stayed all year, since they were never shown how to migrate. In an urban environment they have no natural predators and endless grass parks to

hang out in. This spring I can recall a huge population in Prince's Island Park. There seemed to be acres of juvenile geese with a few adult geese. This is called a 'gang brood', when there is a large group of goslings, overseen by a couple adult geese who got the short straw. Weaving through them on the bike path was a bit frightening.



They do have some positive traits though, for example the Canada Goose chooses a partner at about two and then stays with that partner for life; isn't that sweet. Their little goslings are very cute when they paddle behind the parents, all yellow and fluffy.


The adult Canada Goose is one of our largest waterfowl, and should we ever have to revert to subsistence living, they are very plentiful.
