The program is offered by request. Only about 2% of households use this service.




New fees ensure that the cost of running the service is covered by those who benefit from it.

DEVELOPMENT AND TRAFFIC REPORT

I would just like to highlight what has been happening/ going on behind the scenes this past month, in no particular order:

- 1. The Rutland Park Community Association Annual General Meeting will be held on Tuesday, November 21, 2023, at 7:00 pm in our Skateshack (3130 40 Ave SW Calgary AB T3E 6W9). We hope to see you there!
- 2. We still have no further information with regards to the structural failure of our Hall floor. We are still waiting on the insurance company's structural engineer. The City has sent their own engineering report to the insurance company, and the Hall will remain closed until further notice.
- 3. The rink light project is underway at the time this is being written. We are hoping that it will be completed by the end of November. We will be looking for volunteers to help with the flooding and maintenance of the skating rink over the winter. We hope you can get involved.
- 4. After many, many years of dedicated volunteer service, our rink director, Greg W, will be stepping down to spend more time on his own pursuits. Thank you so much Greq for your hard work over the years! You will be missed.
- 5. Impact of the new Corporate Housing Strategy.

We had expressed concerns with regards to the Corporate Housing Strategy that was recently presented to Council. One of those concerns was the City's intention to make R-CG the minimum land use. This land use allows for 8+ housing units (with the potential for commercial use), maximum four parking stalls (potentially zero), and 60% lot coverage on a regular sized lot. Being an established community, this could have a huge impact on the lowdensity section of our community and on our urban canopy. Changes to the Land Use Bylaw require public engagement. We will continue to keep you updated so that you can stay engaged.

The low-density section of our community has restrictive covenants on our lots. These restrict the lots to one or two dwelling units and prevent commercial use. They are a separate legal instrument that is not related to land use and were set up as a building scheme before we had a Land Use Bylaw. They can be upheld in Court. While the Community Association supports these restrictive covenants as part of our

Development Guidelines, the RPCA is not a landowner and has no legal standing regarding these covenants. The covenants are enforceable by landowners through the Alberta Court system.

6. We have recently found out that the Richmond Green baseball diamonds are up for sale again. The price has dropped to \$12 million, which may make it more attractive to developers. The City is anticipating that almost 300 housing units will be built on the site, plus commercial space. This will have a significant impact on traffic on Sarcee Road. We will continue to ask that the ball diamonds remain as park space, and that the OWC site be used for Cooperative Housing instead.

7. Potential Development at the Sarcee Plaza Car Wash Site.

We have recently been informed that a developer wishes to add 315 housing units in a tower development on the site of the carwash and the paved area behind it on Sarcee Road. This would have a significant impact on the south end of Sarcee Road. Public engagement is required, and we will provide updates when information and sessions are available.

With all the development considerations before us, it is critical that you take the time to stay engaged. Thank you.

RESIDENT PERSPECTIVES

The Sun: Our Friend and Sometimes Foe

Astronomers had been aware of dark spots on the Sun since the early 1600s, but it wasn't until 1755 they discovered the number of sunspots increased and decreased in cycles spanning 11 years.


On September 1, 1859, an English astronomer named Richard Carrington was keenly aware the number of sunspots was on the rise. While sketching a particularly large cluster, he witnessed an explosion of light lasting about five minutes. The flare was a coronal mass ejection (CME), a burst of magnetized plasma from the Sun's upper atmosphere. Normally, a CME takes several days to reach Earth. In this case, it took only 17.6 hours.

That night, the Earth experienced unprecedented electrical chaos. Telegraph poles and substations (precursor to the telephone) started catching fire and northern and southern auroral displays, normally confined to the polar regions, were now visible as far south as Hawaii and as far north as Australia.

Carrington realized the flare he'd seen was almost certainly the cause of this massive geomagnetic disturbance. This connection had never previously been made. In his honour, the 1859 incident is now known as the Carrington Event.

It was the most powerful solar eruption in recorded history; causing wide-reaching communication failures as the telegraph system was simply unable to withstand the tremendous amount of electricity surging through the wires.

In 1989, a CME knocked out power to the province of Quebec, leaving 6 million people in the dark for nine hours. It also damaged transformers as far away as New Jersey and nearly took down the U.S. power grid from the Eastern Seaboard to the Pacific Northwest. On July 23, 2012, a CME equivalent to the Carrington Event narrowly missed Earth. Had it hit us, our technology dependent world would have suffered catastrophic damage.

November is a time for remembrance in tribute to the brave men and women who fought for the peace we enjoy today. It was an honour to join the annual Walk for Veterans back in September, which raised money for the Calgary Military Family Resource Centre situated in Calgary-Currie. I look forward to proudly wearing a poppy in the Legislature and attending several Remembrance Day ceremonies in Calgary.

Following a Throne Speech delivered on October 30, we're now officially back in session! Government hasn't sat in the Legislature since a month prior to the election. We're committed to holding the UCP to account on issues around healthcare, education, energy, and housing affordability. In addition, I will be focused on my Mental Health and Addiction critic portfolio, calling for the evidence and transparency that the government's approach to addiction is in fact saving lives and producing the outcomes our communities deserve.

The conversation around the Alberta Pension Plan is also a top priority. During the election, Danielle Smith told Albertans, "No one is touching anybody's pension." And yet, the government has launched a \$7.5 million campaign to convince you that pulling out of the CPP is a good thing.

The CPP is recognized as one of the best-managed pension plans in the world, made stronger and more resilient because of its size. Albertans are counting on that stability and performance record to provide for them in retirement, and Premier Smith's plan would undermine that. The idea is risky and reckless.

Most Calgary-Currie constituents I've heard from are against pulling out of the CPP. I'm very interested in hearing your opinions on the Alberta Pension Plan proposal. Please send your feedback by email or feel free to give my office a call.
