

# **Keeping Your Bikes Safe with Bike Index**

This is a reprint from 2022 with some important information for cyclists.

Constable Prajoux, our community resource officer with the Calgary Police Service has shared with our board members a useful website to assist with finding stolen bicycles. The website is called Bike Index Registration – www.bikeindex.org.

#### Here's How It Works:

- 1. Visit www.bikeindex.org and register your name, bike manufacturer, serial number, and component information for each of your bikes.
- 2. If your bike is lost or stolen simply go to the website and report your bike as stolen. The Bike Index community, including the City of Calgary Police will be notified through the website.
- 3. If a Bike Index community member or partner (including CPS) find your bike, they will go onto Bike Index to identify your bike and contact you so that you can recover your bike.

Often the police cannot find the owner of stolen bikes that are recovered, and the registry goes a long way in bringing the bike and its rider back together again. Check it out if you are an avid cyclist in our community! A reminder as well to always lock your bike with a suitable lock to a bike rack to avoid thefts in the first place.

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# **Exploring the Outdoors Near Springbank Hill**

Spring is upon us, and with warmer weather upcoming many of us are going to be looking to get outside and enjoy nature. Here are a couple ideas for anyone looking to explore new areas nearby to our community.



### Griffith Woods Park – Approximately 5 Minutes' Drive from Our Community

Just across Stoney Trail from our neighbourhood is Griffith Woods Park. This gorgeous 93-hectare park is tucked away next to the community of Discovery Ridge and bordering the Tsuut'ina Nation. It is a natural environment park with both paved trails and unpaved trails and is very popular for dogwalkers, families, and those looking to escape the noise of the city without needing to drive out of it. This is an environmentally significant park as well as the conditions are perfect for White Spruce to grow, making it one of the only places in the city to host a mature forest of those trees. For those who are interested in birdwatching, it is a

great place to spot Northern Flickers, Grey Jays, and Red-breasted Nuthatches.

Griffith Woods is accessible year-round, just note that in the shadier areas of the forest it can stay a bit snowy and icy into the spring, so prepare accordingly. Keep an eye out for habitat restoration occurring in some of the areas off the main or side trails. These are fenced off areas allowing for certain plants to regrow undisturbed by human activity and contribute to a healthy ecosystem within the park.

### Kiyooka Ohe Arts Centre – Approximately 10 Minutes' Drive from Our Community

Not too much further away, off of Springbank Road you can find the Kiyooka Ohe Arts Centre (KOAC). The arts centre was founded in 2007 by Harry Kiyooka and Kate Ohe with a mission dedicated to the research, exhibition, education, and documentation of contemporary visual arts. Currently the arts centre is the home of studio and gallery spaces, a research library, and a significant collection of artwork from the past several decades.

Outdoors and accessible to the visiting public is a beautiful nature sanctuary and sculpture garden. Across 20 acres of landscaped areas and woodlands, visitors can walk through and discover abstract sculptures from Canadian and European artists and spend time viewing how the art both compliments and contrasts the surrounding nature. The nature sanctuary includes a botanical garden with a wetland as well as a protected Aspen, Birch, and first growth forest.

The sculpture park is accessible year-round for self-guided tours from Thursdays to Sundays, 10:00 am until 6:00 pm, admission is by donation. There will also be ticketed guided tours on Saturdays in the summertime, more information will be available on the KOAC website closer to that time. The sculpture park does have accessible gravel pathways; however, dogs are not allowed due to the conservation efforts in the area. The Government of Alberta has announced funding for organizations working to stop human trafficking and empower survivors. A total of \$5.5 million has been allocated to 19 organizations. The provincial government recognizes the need to address trafficking and provide supports for those who have been victimized.

I believe strongly that this funding will empower community-based organizations to provide specialized services that will protect vulnerable individuals and disrupt the cycle of exploitation. With these community grants, we are ensuring that traffickers are held accountable, and survivors have the support they need from organizations such as The Albert Centre to rebuild their lives.

During the First Session of the 31 Legislature in Alberta legislature, the government plans to introduce 20 bills, including the following:

The Public Safety and Emergency Services Statutes Amendment Act will improve accountability and protections of freedoms during emergencies. This will enable government agencies to better handle complex disasters and crises. This will enhance community resilience and will ensure that the government has the right tools to protect Albertans.

The Compassionate Intervention Act is a central part of the Alberta Recovery Model. Alberta will build two involuntary treatment centres for addictions in Edmonton and Calgary. \$180 million over three years will be spent to build these two centres which will each have 150 beds.

Fentanyl continues to endanger the lives of Albertans and is devastating to families and communities. By aligning the efforts of community peace officers and local police, we are ensuring a coordinated, team response to combat the illicit drug trade to improve public safety. When community peace officers and local police work together in integrated street patrols, we create a visible and unified front against crime.

May you and your loved ones enjoy the spring season and a very happy Easter!

For those who may not know, our councillor Richard Pootmans retired from city council this past November. As there is an election coming up in the fall, there has been no need for a by-election, instead Ward 6 will be looked after by other councillors until a new representative is elected in the fall.

With experience in both business and municipal government, she brings a practical, results-driven approach to City Council. Before running for office, she worked at the City of Calgary, helping businesses navigate regulations, and also owned a small business, giving her firsthand knowledge of the challenges Calgarians face.

She is committed to ensuring tax dollars are spent wisely, cutting red tape, and making Calgary a place where families and businesses can succeed. In addition to her work in Ward 1, she is currently representing parts of Ward 6, including Springbank Hill, to ensure residents continue to have strong representation at City Hall. She looks forward to engaging with the community and working on the issues that matter most to residents."

### Use Your Water Meter to Check Your Home for Leaks

Did you know that 40 percent of homes have some water fixture leakage? Using your water meter to check for leaks, inside and outside the home, is one way you can do your part to use water wisely.

Using your meter to check your home for leaks is easy:

- 1. Turn off all taps and water-using appliances inside and outside your home.
- 2. Watch the flow register on the face of the meter. The register could look like a gear or a needle depending on the model of meter you have.
- 3. If it keeps turning, you have a leak somewhere in your house.
- 4. Check all water devices, such as your toilet, taps, humidifier, hot water heater, and water softener. To learn more about common sources of household water leaks, including some helpful repair tips, visit calgary.ca/waterquide.
