Buckle Up for a Bumpy Spring and Summer

As most Calgarians know, spring and summer mean construction, and this will be more so in Bridgeland in 2024. With a number of construction projects within the community and just outside of it, we will be dealing with temporary delays all through the neighbourhood. Projects that will be starting, continuing, or finishing in 2024 include:

- 4 Avenue Flyover remediation
- Completion of McDougall Road mobility lanes including 9 St Corridor
- Continuation of 1 Ave Main Streets with mobility corridor on 2 Ave and 9 St Corridor
- Completion of Edmonton Trail Main Streets
- Launch of Bridgeland Riverside Continuing Care Campus construction including the streetscape on Centre Ave

You may ask why I have included the 4th Ave Flyover in the list, but most of us know that when there has been a closure on this connection to downtown previously, we have strongly felt the effects on our local streets with traffic volumes (and sometimes speeds) doubling during those periods.


We are working with the City to manage all these changes happening at once to alert drivers on Memorial Drive that they will be trading one construction zone for another, which will hopefully minimize cut-through traffic that puts pedestrians and active travel users in Bridgeland at an increased risk.



Bicycle Helmet Safety

Head injuries are the leading cause of serious injury and death to kids on wheels*. Most injuries occur when a cyclist suffers a fall, strikes a stationary object, or collides with another cyclist/pedestrian. Remember – it's the law in Alberta that cyclists under the age of 18 must wear a helmet (and highly recommended for all ages). Helmets should be CSA approved and worn during recreational activities such as skateboarding, in-line skating, and cycling.

Getting Informed


- Wearing a helmet while cycling can prevent a serious injury, or even save a life
- Brain injuries can cause permanent disability or death
- Reduce your risk by always wearing your helmet
- Replace any helmet that has been involved in a crash, even if it appears undamaged

Getting Started

- Allow children to assist when buying their helmet.
 Cyclists who choose their own helmet are more likely to wear them
- Start the habit early. Young children learning to ride tricycles need to wear helmets
- Parents must lead by example always wear a helmet when cycling

Getting the Right Fit

- Take the time to properly fit and adjust your helmet to ensure maximum protection in case of a crash
- When worn properly, helmets should fit level, not tilted up, or down over the forehead
- Helmets should feel snug, but not too tight. To test the fit, the helmet should not fall off when you shake your head from side-to-side while the straps are unfastened
- Adjust the chin straps to form a "Y" below and slightly forward from the ears
- Only one finger should be able to fit under the chin strap when it is fastened
- Do not forget to use the sizing pads included with the helmet. They will help improve the overall fit, comfort, and safety.

Volunteers Were Essential at the General Hospital

It all started with volunteers. Calgary General Hospital Number One came into being in 1890 due to the efforts of volunteer Jean Drever Pinkham, wife of the Anglican Bishop of Calgary. She and others recognized the desperate need for hospital care in frontier Calgary and used their connections with Calgary's influential people to raise the money to get things started.

This first successful initiative became the Women's Hospital Aid Society. As part of early Calgary's social scene, the Society raised money by holding suppers and dances. All the cleaning and cooking was done by these dedicated volunteers. Such efforts enabled them in 1895 to completely furnish the brand new 35 bed CGH Number Two. This included a fully equipped operating room with an official and expensive operating room table.

Over the ensuing years, the work of the Society contributed significantly to raising funds for CGH Number Three that opened in 1910 in Bridgeland. They continued to plan social events and raise funds and expanded their efforts to provide friendly visiting to patients in the hospital. Their efforts filled the gaps and enhanced the patient experience.

There was no end of need in 'the General' especially after the Second World War, with the return of soldiers and the influx of immigrants to Calgary. Changing their name to Ladies Auxiliary of CGH, they grew to 50 members by 1947. Funds were raised to purchase items such as stretchers, kidney machines and incubators.

After the opening of the much larger CGH Number Four in 1953, more space was available, and the Ladies Auxiliary opened two businesses: a gift/smoke shop and a beauty salon. Mobile gift carts were created, and volunteers regularly visited each patient care area to provide items for purchase by the patients. Reading materials were soon added. To manage their growing range of activities a coordinator was hired to assist.

By 1984, it was more common for women to be employed outside the home and fewer women were available to volunteer, so a name change was needed. The CGH Volunteer Association began to accept men, students, and young people to fill their ranks. Some volunteers focused their energy on knitting items that were sold in the gift shop and given to babies born in the hospital. The Candy Striper program opened the door for girls 14 to17 years of age, letting them try out the experience of hospital care. They helped patients with their meals and with personal care and filling out their menus. No doubt some Candy Stripers went on to careers in healthcare. Other hands-on experiences for volunteers included greeting patients and escorting them to tests and their hospital rooms.

In 1990, the CGH celebrated 100 years of volunteerism. Made up of paid staff and 600 women, men, college students, and young people, they served at both CGH Bow Valley site and Peter Lougheed Centre. Fifty programs for patients and 78,000 hours were contributed that year. Volunteers were recognized as an essential part of the hospital.

Over the years, volunteers raised hundreds of thousands of dollars for needed equipment and other items at the hospital as well as immeasurable hours of service. All of these significant accomplishments and pictures were featured in a celebratory publication "100 years of Volunteers" that has made this article possible.
