To the new Ward 9 Councillor, the BRCA looks forward to establishing a strong, productive relationship with you during your first term. Thanks also to those of you who attended the Ward 9 Candidates Open House at the Hall on October 8 to meet the councillor hopefuls.

The campaigns for mayor, councillor, and school board trustee positions highlighted the serious issues facing residents of Calgary. Growth, community safety, affordable housing, transportation, fiscal responsibility, planning/zoning, maintenance of infrastructure, and education funding were all debated during the campaign and will need to be addressed by the new City Council and School Boards. With Calgary's population projected to reach nearly two million by the time of the next municipal election, the need for strong, effective leadership is greater than ever, as is the need for residents to take an interest in the issues that concern us as a community and a city. Hopefully you demonstrated your willingness to make your voice heard by exercising your right to vote on October 20.

Murdoch Park – Footprint of "The General"

After 88 years of service to the city, the Calgary General Hospital was imploded in 1998. Over the next year, truckloads of debris were carted away. Those assigned with planning the next steps for the land sought a way to commemorate the hospital and its important place in Calgary history. One of the ways they chose was to preserve the footprint where the hospital once stood. The area formerly occupied by the hospital, between Centre Avenue and McDougall Road and from 7A to 9 Street, was designated as a park, and called Murdoch Park. The full development, which became known as the Bridges Project, then focused on building multi-family housing surrounding the park, to be constructed over three phases. With the exception of one plot of land, the Bridges Project is now completed.

How Was the Name Chosen for the Park?

The hospital's address had been 841 Centre Avenue, but this road had originally been named Murdoch Road. Evidence of this history can still be seen in the sidewalk stamp at Centre Avenue and 10 Street that shows the Murdoch name. The proximity of Murdoch Road to the former hospital and the importance of George Murdoch to Calgary history were the reasons behind the naming of the park.

Who Was George Murdoch?

George Murdoch was Calgary's first mayor. He was a Scottish-born man who had arrived here in 1883, the same year that the Canadian Pacific Railway reached Calgary. Murdoch was a harness maker who opened a business in the young settlement. In addition to working extensively with the North-West Mounted Police, he also worked with the Blackfoot people, even learning their language. Murdoch was active in civic affairs and was soon elected mayor of the town in the first election in 1884.

A bronze plaque was developed for Murdoch Park and was mounted in the SE corner, near McDougall Road. Unfortunately, the plaque was stolen several years ago. It was replaced with another bronze plaque, only to be stolen again. The base has remained blank to this day.

The name of our community's biggest and much-loved park has been a bit of a mystery for many people. Google Maps has not always been clear or consistent about the name. And without a sign or plaque, there's no visible evidence of the correct name.

An Important, Happening Place

What we can be sure of is the importance of Murdoch Park to the growing number of residents who live here, as well as visitors. The park is busy much of the day. Students from Riverside School play sports and conduct their field studies. Walkers, with and without dogs, stroll along the tree-lined promenades. People can be seen sitting on the benches lining the park, drinking coffee, eating ice cream purchased from nearby businesses, reading a book, visiting with friends, watching the activities, or contemplating the beauty of the day. The field itself is often busy with people of all ages playing soccer, football, volleyball, bocce, basketball, exercising, and doing yoga. A hang glider has also lifted off from the sloped western edge of Murdoch Park.

Occasionally, festivals are booked on the grounds. They add the vibrancy of music, dancing, and variety to the park. Murdoch Park is a happening place, where everyone is welcome. It is a fitting replacement for the great Calgary General Hospital that stood here for 88 years.

Green Cart Collection Update

by the City of Calgary

Starting in November, green cart collection will shift to an every-other-week schedule. This seasonal change helps match service to the lower volumes of yard waste we typically see once colder weather arrives.

Weekly green cart collection will return in April 2026, just in time for spring clean-up season when yard waste begins to pick up again.

We understand Calgary's weather can be unpredictable, and to keep the Green Cart program reliable and cost-effective, we set the schedule using long-term trends. This means collection times are based on when green cart volumes usually decline and when snowier conditions are more likely. By planning well in advance, the City ensures the right number of trucks, drivers, and resources are in place to keep the program running smoothly.

There are a few easy ways to stay on top of your collection days and keep things simple:

- Visit calgary.ca/cartschedule to check your cart pickup schedule or sign up for free reminders.
- Download the Calgary Garbage Day app to get automatic notifications about collection days and seasonal changes.

Yielding to Emergency Vehicles

For everyone's safety, it is important motorists understand how to correctly yield right-of-way to emergency vehicles when their lights and sirens are activated. You can help all first responders navigate roads quickly and safely by following these basic rules.

When an emergency vehicle approaches with lights and siren activated:

- If you're in the middle of an intersection when an emergency vehicle approaches with lights and siren activated, safely clear the intersection; be prepared to pull over.
- On a one- or two-lane road, motorists should move to the right side of the road, slow down, and then stop, remaining parallel with the road. Remember to signal.
- On one-way streets move to the nearest curb, either the right or left.
- On a road with three or more lanes, motorists should move to the nearest side of the road and stop. If driving in the centre lane, move to the right side of the road and stop. Remember to signal.
- Come to a complete stop and wait for the emergency vehicle to pass. Shoulder check for more emergency vehicles before re-entering traffic flow. Remember to signal.

• Emergency vehicles might use any available road space to maneuver. This could include shoulders or turning lanes, etc., in order to safely pass other traffic.

When operating a vehicle:

- Reduce speed to 60 km/h or the posted speed, whichever is lower, when passing any stopped roadside vehicle with flashing lights activated (emergency vehicles, tow trucks, maintenance trucks, etc.). This law applies to the lane immediately next to the stopped vehicles. If you're not in the lane next to the stopped vehicles, it is recommended to reduce speed and leave lots of space between yourself and emergency personnel.
- Do not break the rules of the road in order to give right of way to an emergency vehicle. This could include proceeding through a red light or making an illegal turn. Actions such as these jeopardize all motorists in the area.
- Drivers must place their full attention on the road and the safe operation of their vehicle at all times. The fine for distracted driving in Alberta is \$300 and three demerit points.
- Do not drive within 150 meters of an emergency vehicle with its siren and/or flashing lights on. For reference, 150 m is nearly 1.5 times the length of a football field.


