My Low Maintenance Garden

I am by no means a knowledgeable gardener, but the best thing I learned about gardening is that it is forgiving and a "try, try again" venture.

A couple of years ago, I decided on a "sweat equity" project for the spring and summer. I ended up removing my struggling lawn in my north-facing front yard and replacing it with a perennial/pollinator garden. I wanted a low maintenance, drought resistant garden, and plants that attracted bees, birds, and butterflies.

After bringing in soil and mulch (mulch is a friend of water), the choice of plants was amazingly fun. I planted various types of Thyme, Hardy Fuchsia (really spreads), Bee Balm, Day Lillies, Red-twigged Dogwood, and some other bushes. I coupled this with some spring bulbs (those that survived the squirrels) and a dappling



of annuals for colour. The birds helped out by supplying a few errant sunflowers that the bees loved.

I had so much fun! — I am going to plant some Clover and Thyme in a section of my yard (isolated due to spread). Clover is great for bees, has great ground cover, stays green, is drought resistant, and doesn't need to be mowed (depends on variety planted).

My tips besides my general advice of try and enjoy:

- Watch your sun patterns when choosing plants my front yard gets more sun than I thought.
- Watch where trees are so you can choose plants that can compete for water.
- When planting, remember to leave space plants grow over the seasons and bare spots fill in.
- Plants can be moved it doesn't have to be perfect; it just has to be a start (that is coming this year).

A breeding bird monitoring survey in Nose Hill Park recorded a total of 70 species. Of 44 species tested, 22 were nesting and 22 were only visitors. Another 26 were random observations (not part of the survey). Birds flying over and not using the habitat were excluded from analysis. To assess how populations have changed over time, when a previous study was compared, a few species occurred in one year but not in both. However, the overall decline was in nesting grassland birds. The recent test recorded all birds observed during the breeding season (early June to early July) for ten minutes between sunrise and 10:00 am. A total of 23 circular plots surveyed on eight occasions were recorded with GPS technology and mapped. The habitats described and photographed were mostly tall or low shrub and woodland. The result was the disappearance of four (and decline of three) nesting grassland bird species. Here are some of the causes: human disturbance, loss of native grassland by non-native plants, lack of grazing, climate change, bird species outside Calgary, and off-leash dogs on the escarpment (slopes), especially during the breeding season. For effective conservation and management strategies, City Parks must continue to monitor breeding birds. World Migratory Bird Day was created in 1993 and celebrates a migratory bird's spectacular migration; it is dedicated to raising awareness about the need to conserve migratory birds and their habitat. Aligning with the cyclic nature of bird migration in different hemispheres, it is officially celebrated on the second Saturday of May in Canada and the U.S, so on Saturday, 11 May in 2024. The official theme will focus on the topic of insects and their importance for migratory birds. For more information and resources, visit www.birdday.ca.

Off the Bookshelf

According to the article "Anishinabe N'Oon Da Gaaziiwin: An Indigenous Peacemaking and Mediation Nexus," UNDERIP or the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, reaffirms their right to identity and culture and their right to "dispute resolution processes that understand their culture". This article also points out that several TRC calls to action call for cultural competency and skills-based training in conflict resolution.

Furthermore, while traditional peacemaking processes varied, they all contained the common elements of "spiritual laws, traditional medicines, ceremonies, teachings and songs, and the circle." The article then describes a hybrid approach to decision making and conflict resolution, drawing on both Indigenous traditional and western approaches.

This provides a context for our last selection in the Settlers Book Club:

Akak'stiman: A Blackfoot Framework for Decision Making and Mediation, co-authored by Reg Crowshoe and Sybille Manneschmidt.

Reg Crowshoe, from north Piikani in southern Alberta, grew up immersed in the Blackfoot language, ceremonies, and culture, although he also attended residential school at times. He runs the Sun Dance, Thunder Bundle, and other ceremonies, and is committed to the preservation and teaching of Blackfoot ways of knowing to Blackfoot youth and non-Indigenous institutions.

Sybille Manneschnidt has worked with the Piikani for over twenty years. She is a psychologist, health consultant, and a sessional instructor at the University of Lethbridge.

Akak'stiman begins with a brief overview of Blackfoot history up through the early twentieth century, and then briefly describes the social structure of the Blackfoot, starting with the family and extended family, discussing relations between men and women and adults and children. Traditionally, families came together in different hunting and gathering bands based on kinship, and when the bands gathered in

the summer, they formed the tribe. Many Blackfoot also became members of tribal societies dedicated to purposes such as warfare and internal policing.

Summer gatherings were important for settling disputes, arranging marriages, and engaging in ceremonies to restore balance among people and with nature and ensure the survival of the tribe. Central to these ceremonies were ceremonial bundles such as the Sun Dance Bundle, the Beaver Bundle, and the Thunder Pipe Bundle. There were society bundles and individual or personal bundles. Ceremonial bundles were always held by both male and female bundle keepers who were held in high regard within the tribe. Bundles consisted not only of the sacred objects they contained but the teachings and songs that accompanied them. The origin stories associated with these bundles are shared and bundle items are described.

The book moves on to describe the Blackfoot circle structure used in these different ceremonies, accompanied by diagrams showing the position of circle participants. It explains how the circle structure can be adapted for use with western health, child welfare, and business systems, often based on different worldviews and values. Blackfoot circle structure emphasizes the involvement of the community in decision making and the use of the talking stick to maintain non-hierarchal relationships. The goal of the circle structure was to reach solutions agreed upon by all participants. Western systems for child welfare, health, and business are often hierarchical in nature, excluding the community and relying on outside experts.

While short, *Akak'stiman* offers insight into Blackfoot ways of knowing, being, and decision making, enhancing our appreciation of the culture of the people on whose lands we live, work, and play. The book contains many photos as well as diagrams, and describes how the Indian Act transformed traditional leadership, and how traditional methods of ensuring health, well-being and childcare were supplanted by Western systems. Although published in 2002, It also demonstrates how Reconciliation can be enacted in a meaningful way.

Gardening Tips for Drought Conditions

- Rainwater is ideal for garden watering use a rain barrel to store rainwater and direct the downspouts on the house eavestroughs to run into the garden, rather than the driveway or path.
- Check your garden's dryness before watering stick your finger into the soil and if it is dry to the first knuckle, water. If not, no need to water.
- Water the garden at ground level rather than up high. The foliage does not need to get wet!
- Water the garden in the cool of the morning, not the heat of the day, to prevent excess evaporation.
- Mulch applied around the plants will help with moisture retention and will discourage weeds from taking over.
- When choosing plants for your flowerbeds, select drought tolerant varieties. Often the plants with silver leaves are drought tolerant.
- Watering by hand uses less water than watering with a sprinkler. Lawns can get by without additional water.
 Prioritize your veggies and flowers rather than lawn.
- Soil that has had organic matter added to it (compost for example) will be healthier and will retain moisture better.

How Much Is Too Much?

As we conclude another tax season, many Canadians are asking where all their tax money is going. Canadians work hard to pay their taxes and they rightfully expect it to be spent wisely.

The reality is the current government has been spending money at a much higher rate than it collects taxes to pay for it and so our debt keeps increasing. Our national debt has more than doubled since 2015 and now sits at a whopping \$2.2 trillion (\$2,200,000,000,000).

The problem with a debt so large is that it requires us to pay more in 'debt servicing' charges. In 2023/24, we paid \$46.5 billion which is 36% higher than the year before.

In fact, we will spend more to carry this massive debt each year than we do on healthcare. We spend \$16 billion more on carrying this debt than we do on childcare benefits. Imagine what we could afford if we were not spending that money each year just to carry debt.

Most concerning is the fact that interest payments are up 36%, but revenues are up by just 3%. Canada cannot afford to keep paying out more than it collects – something has to give.

Recent Nanos polling shows 63% of Canadians want the government to lower its expenses. Interestingly, 38% of respondents want the money that would be saved to go toward repaying government debt, while 25% want tax cuts. Only 9% want higher spending and most of this group want higher taxes to pay for it. Only 2% want increased spending through more borrowing.

Canada cannot afford more debt. Nothing will put our precious social programs more at risk than to have them based on a weak fiscal foundation. If Canadians want to ensure our social programs and benefits programs are there when we need them, we need to get our spending under control.
