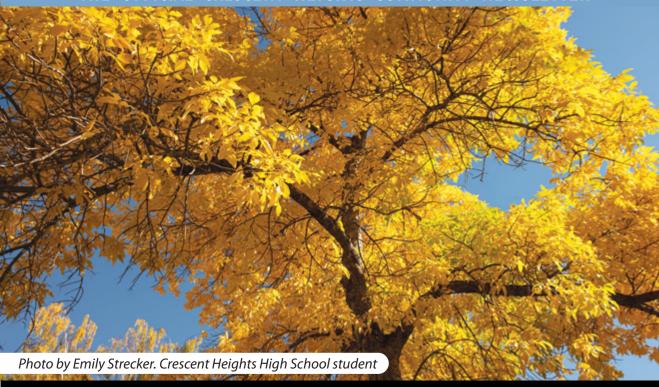

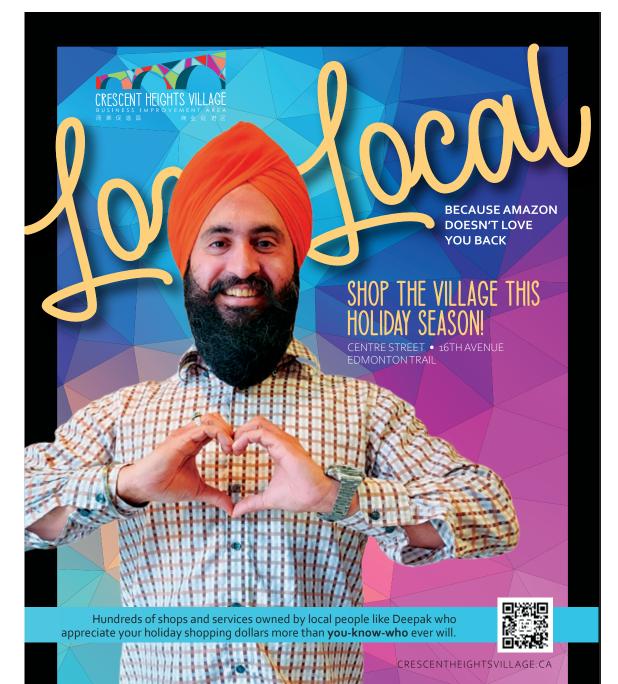

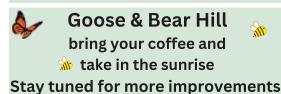

# Canadian Geographic's September Issue

To all our Crescent Heights community residents, the September issue of Canadian Geographic, with a readership of four million, made mention of our Pollinator Garden on Crescent Road. The article is titled City of Calgary's Biodiversity by Design, A Bees and Birds Tour of Calgary.

The Pollinator Garden evolved since 2017 from a four-stall parking lot to an area of planters filled with native plants. Jenna Cross, the City's Parks Ecologist, took plants from her garden and native plant seeds to put in the planters. They blossomed with beautiful flowers attracting pollinators, mainly bees. Did you know that Calgary is designated a Bee City in Canada?

For the last two years, the City of Calgary has held an education boothat the Pollinator Garden on the importance of bees. The most recent was held on September 27, and those who attended received wildflower seed packets to take home for their garden.

The Pollinator Garden will help conserve our pollinators by providing them with a place to stop, rest, feed, and refuel, and teach others to protect pollinators. Without bees pollinating our plants that are critical for food production, plants would no longer be able to survive.

More than 70 percent of wild bees build their nests in the ground. The nests are shallow and not well protected during our long, cold winters. You can assist bees and other pollinators by not raking up all the leaves and not cleaning up all the dead plants in your garden. Support our native pollinators! Put a few new plants in the ground instead of taking things out. Help the bees and save your back. Leave the leaves!

Thank you to everyone a part of the success of the Pollinator Garden. Appreciation goes to the City's plant ecologists, Jenna Cross and Mitchell Addison, the Mormon Church for allowing the use of their water, and resident volunteer Mike Macdonald for the care of the plants.

# **Yielding to Emergency Vehicles**

For everyone's safety, it is important motorists understand how to correctly yield right-of-way to emergency vehicles with their lights and sirens activated. You can help EMS, police, and fire get to the scene quickly and safely by following these rules of the road.

# When an emergency vehicle approaches with lights and siren activated:

- If you're in the middle of an intersection when an emergency vehicle approaches with lights and siren activated, safely clear the intersection.
- On a one- or two-lane road, motorists should move to the right side of the road, slow down, and then stop, remaining parallel with the road. Remember to signal.
- Move right or left to the nearest curb on one-way streets.
- On a road with three or more lanes, motorists should move to the nearest side of the road and stop. If driving in the centre lane, move to the right side of the road and stop. Remember to signal.
- Come to a complete stop and wait for the emergency vehicle to pass. Shoulder check for more emergency vehicles before re-entering traffic flow. Remember to signal.

 Emergency vehicles might use any available road space to maneuver. This could include shoulders or turning lanes, etc., to pass other traffic.

#### When operating a vehicle:

- Motorists must reduce speed to 60 km/h or the posted speed, whichever is lower, when passing emergency vehicles or tow trucks that are stopped with their lights flashing. This law applies to the lane(s) immediately next to the stopped vehicles. If you're not in the lane next to the stopped vehicles, it is recommended to reduce speed and leave lots of space between yourself and emergency personnel.
- Do not break the rules of the road in order to give right of way to an emergency vehicle. This could include proceeding through a red light or making an illegal turn. Actions such as these jeopardize all motorists in the area.
- Drivers must place their full attention on the roadway and toward the safe operation of their vehicle at all times. The fine for distracted driving in Alberta is \$300 and three demerit points.
- Do not drive within 150 meters of an emergency vehicle with its siren and/or flashing lights on. For reference, 150 m is nearly 1.5 times the length of a football field.

# Explore Mexico's Day of the Dead in Rotary Park

Explore the cultural richness and diversity of Xantolo (pronounced shantolow), one of Mexico's most important celebrations, through an exhibit by the Mexican Women Artists (MWA) Collective in Rotary Park's Mini Galleries this November and December.

On Saturday, November 11 at 1:00 pm, take part in a performance of *un canto a la vida de nuestros difuntos* (a hymn to the lives of our deceased), as part of the exhibit opening. A ritual procession will start at gallery #1, near the parking lot off 7 Ave NE, with candles and traditional Mexican songs.

"Immerse yourself in the rich tapestry of these age-old traditions that honor our ancestors and celebrate the journey of life and death," says MWA member Almendra Vergara. "For the Indigenous people of the Huasteca region in central Mexico, this festivity is more important than Christmas. It is observed to honour the dead and goes all the way back to Miccailhuitl – the great Feast of the Dead from pre-Columbian times."

The artists pay homage to their heritage and this important celebration of life and death through the exhibit, which also explores the merging of their Indigenous roots and Catholic traditions, through a contemporary lens.

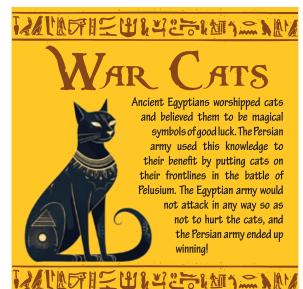
MWA's participating artists are Almendra Vergara, Maya Corona, Jessica Chiapa, Christiane Olguín, Claudia Chagoya, and Kitty Rain.

"Each artist will approach the topic according to their own experiences with the celebration," says Almendra. "Some of the disciplines we use include painting, sculpture, embroidery, installation, and theatre. The unifying element for this exhibition will be the skull, a symbol with a wide range of meanings within the celebrations of Xantolo and Mexican culture."

*Xantolo* will be in Rotary Park Mini Galleries from November 1, 2023, to January 3, 2024. The Mini Galleries are outdoors and are wheelchair accessible on paved pathways.

# Off the Shelf

## BOOK REVIEW BY JUDITH UMBACH

The Dictionary of Lost Words by Pip Williams

All dictionaries are governed by editors' decisions. Even the 69-year project that created the Oxford English Dictionary had rules about the worthiness of words. In *The Dictionary of Lost Words*, author Pip Williams puts Esme literally in the midst of the editors and assistants. As a motherless five-year-old, she sits under her father's worktable in the Scriptorium, domain of the prestigious main editor, James Murray.

A slip is written for each word's definitions, all supported by citations from credible sources. Academics and members of the public mail in words; assistants conduct research to verify each suggestion; editors make the final decisions.

Gradually, Esme understands that not only will she never be properly employed in the venture, but also that many of the words describing the female realm are considered unimportant or unsuitable. From the discards, she begins to collect the slips of paper that record lower-class and female expressions. She hides them in a wooden chest. Dr. Murray does eventually hire her, in admiration of her research skills, but of course her salary is minute compared to the professional (male) salaries.

As she matures, Esme begins to write slips for the wider variety of language she hears on the street. However, for all her knowledge of words, her worldly knowledge is woefully inadequate, which is why her first intimate friendship ends in pregnancy. More unrecorded words.

The world changes. Suffragists and Suffragettes demand to enter society and to vote. More unrecorded words. Citations on her slips are the names of people who cannot read and who have never seen their names written. WWI looms and then breaks out, releasing a torrent of both new words and words used in new ways.

The Dictionary of Lost Words is fictional, but it is set in a real environment, filled in part with the real people who pursued the astonishing dream of recording every (reasonable) word in the English language. Helpfully, Pip Williams provides appendices placing the dictionary project in its historical context.

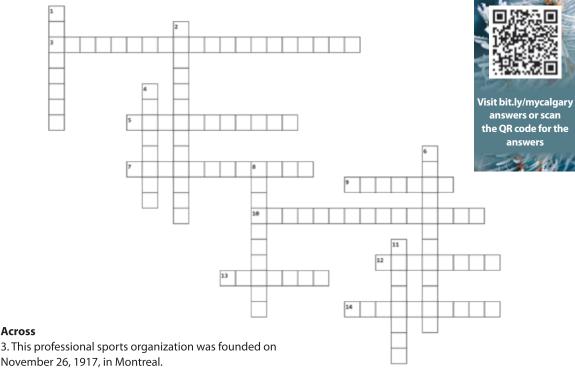
