

President's Message



November 11 is Remembrance Day. It is the day we give special acknowledgement to the soldiers who made it their calling to fight for the freedom that Canadians enjoy. There are

several ceremonies throughout the city, one of which will be held at the Field of Crosses on Memorial Drive. The display of crosses, each emblazoned with the name of a veteran, is a very tangible reminder of those who made the ultimate sacrifice. Buy a poppy. Wear a poppy. Remember. Thank a veteran.

As you may recall, I introduced the concept of community asset mapping in October. The group has held its first walk around Edgemont and is planning more. The mapping initiative will extend over the next several months with the goal of uncovering neighbourhood strengths, getting to know each other better, and working together to make our community even stronger. You can get involved as a volunteer on our organizing committee, help identify neighbourhood gems through upcoming block walks, create your own mini map reflecting the favourite parts of your neighbourhood, or help build larger interactive maps that bring together the insights we'll gather. November seems to be the launching point of arts and crafts markets and in Edgemont, it's no exception. Our Winter Market will be held on November 16 from 10:00 am to 3:00 pm at the community centre. Admission is free for attendees with the hope that you will bring a donation to the Calgary Food Bank. More information is posted on the ECA website.

The ELM committee has plans in place for our winter displays to go in the plant pots around the neighbourhood. We like to get those displays up before we get too much frost. However, the frost locks the materials in place until the very early spring, so it has its role to play too. The committee tries to use as much natural materials as possible and considers the length of time that those materials hold their colour and shape. We try to keep the displays looking vibrant for as long as we can, and the committee gets many compliments from residents who enjoy a boost to the holiday season. MLA Julia Hayter has launched a program to collect diapers and feminine hygiene products for those who need them. ECA strongly supports this effort. We know from our work with the Calgary Food Bank how necessary these items are and how often they are set aside when a family must make tough decisions about its budget. You can support this program by dropping items off at either the Edgemont Community Centre or Julia's constituency office (202-1829 Ranchlands Blvd NW, Calgary, AB T3G 2A7). We accept both products and financial contributions to this cause.

It won't be long until we are setting up the outdoor rink for the season and we need some volunteers to give us a hand. Here's the task:

- Ice Makers and Junior Ice Makers (kids/youth): Assist with simple tasks when you come to play, e.g. throw snow over boards if some is piled inside, pick up garbage and shovels.
- Shifts are generally from 8:00 to 10:00 am.

At the time of writing, we are just days away from doing a final weed pull before volunteers will be planting native plants in the naturalization pilot project on October 8. Many thanks to the enthusiastic volunteers who kindly donated their time to help with this project.

Weather conditions and water restrictions forced us to be flexible this summer with regards to planned projects. Accordingly, pruning of the lilacs along Edenwold Drive and planting of additional lilacs to fill some gaps has been postponed until next year to make sure the shrubs will have the best survival chances.

However, weather permitting, Foothills will still be doing some aerating and fertilizing in a couple of our parks before the end of the season.

As you are taking stock of your own yard at the end of the season, please remember that ELM would very much appreciate donations of perennials in the spring for distribution throughout the community! Residents are required to dig up these perennials and our ELM coordinator, Shari Pitka, will arrange for pick-up of your ready-to-go donations. Please contact Shari at askElm@ edgemont.ab.ca.

Saving the best news for last: Foothills will be planting daffodils in about seven flower beds in Edgemont including at the entrance sign off John Laurie Boulevard and 53 Street NW. The bulbs will be planted behind rows of existing perennials to hide the daffodil foliage once

the daffodils are done flowering. Watch for these pops of beautiful yellow in the spring. Daffodils symbolize rebirth and new beginnings and the end of the long and sombre days of winter.

For two weeks in fall 2024 about 800 goats grazed a 58-hectare area of the Rubbing Stone Hill Natural Parkland Zone in Nose Hill Park. The number of goats has increased from past years because it allows the same amount to be done in half the time. Like elk and bison, the herd of livestock reduces overgrown vegetation, shrubs, and trees in grasslands. Parking was limited when the Nose Hill 64 Avenue NW parking lot partially closed to accommodate moving the goats in and out of the park. Program Ambassadors were on site at Nose Hill Rubbing Stone Hill north of the parking lot. As a precaution, parts of the park and pathways were temporarily fenced off to public access during this grazing period. Park users were asked to follow all posted signage and closures. They were not to approach the goats and were directed to avoid electric fences used to contain the animals. Cyclists should have slowed down near grazing areas. Visitor dogs had to be kept on leash for their safety because off-leash herding dogs were working in the park.

In 2016 City Council approved an amendment to the Parks and Pathways bylaw to permit targeted grazing and help recover rough fescue habitat. Depending on terrain, there have also been goats in Confluence Park, McHugh Bluff, and Ralph Klein Park, while sheep were used in an area of the Weaselhead. Goats are preferred for woody material and undergrowth, but sheep are considered better for pasture-like areas. Other methods of vegetation control combine mechanical (hand pulling) and chemical spraying. The use of grazing comes with value added for biodiversity which helps native seeds to germinate and grow. The City gains both citizen interest and engagement to promote public education.


