

Mom's Day was a blast, I took my 90-year-old on a road trip south to Millarville for the Spring Market for some blackberry wine, subtly different honeys, and fresh veg. Lunch after at a place I used to drop in to when I rode more than drove, the quesadillas were still the best.

Dad's Day is different for me. I lost my pops in '99, a rare disease took him far too soon. I miss him at the most random of times, but Father's Day hits hard. Like it probably does for a lot of *Messenger* readers who have also already said farewell to their fathers.

Mine was a regular mentor and occasional tormentor, as all decent dads are. He pitched Major Men's in Vancouver, it must have killed him inside to watch me strike out those hundreds of times, and yet he still believed in me. Teaching me to skate, use a stick, control a puck, and getting kicked out of games for yelling at the ref on my behalf. Me teaching him to downhill ski, we had a cabin at Panorama before there were condos or chairlifts. Yes, those three-hour blinding blizzard Friday and Sunday night drives in his Buick were my 15-year old's driving instruction school. He was an early director at Redwood Meadows; we used to go out and

clear trees from the roughs so the paid crews could focus on creating the greens. He built confidence and awareness in me through so many life opportunities to meet and network with people I have had in my life for decades.

I came home from thumbing around the Med and Middle East to find he had somehow picked up one of the four Apple dealerships in Alberta in 1983. Months before the Mac was first released, for perspective. I was lost, I had dropped out of my civil engineering program, but there he was, with the most amazing of opportunities waiting for me. I traded my beat up Canadian flagged backpack for a briefcase, and entrenched myself in a young industry notorious for products going obsolete before their manuals were printed. It would blossom into a couple decades of more travel, importing containers of hard drives and coprocessor chips, setting up offices in San Diego and Brisbane, and eventually leading into a career designing and implementing large project fibre optic and copper networks. I loved working with the man. Grade 9 educated, a salesman's salesman, he taught me about questioning deeply, pausing, and listening for the answers, customer service, transparency, empathy, and personal ethics.

I will say hello and goodbye again this June 15, an annual pilgrimage to where we placed his ashes. Yes, I miss him ... a lot. All I can ask of you, the reader, is that if your father is still with us, do reach out, hear his voice, his passions, share time and space. He will be gone one day, and it is far better to look back at memories and life changing moments shared, than just thought about "maybe one day" doing. And don't wait for next year's Father's Day for a card manufacturer to remind you to reach out. Any day is Father's Day... Call your dad...

Montgomery Memories Part Five



Montgomery is located at the bottom of the present-day flood plain of the Bow River. From its beginnings as a settlement for First Nations People, then later ranch land, to the neighbourhood it is today, Montgomery has seen many physical changes. However, the surrounding environment has always played a large role in residents' lives!

Bowmont Natural Environment Park was known as the "Cliffs". This was a wonderful environment for exploration, with a wild river, dangerous cliffs, and some fantastic wildlife. Wildlife sightings, including deer, bear, moose, lynx, coyotes, and cougars, were more common prior to changes in the landscape, such as the removal of trees and bushes and the tops of the slope. Children were often forbidden from playing along the Cliffs due to concerns for safety, but despite (or because of) this precaution many children spent a lot of time there - unknown to their parents!

Ron Kerns remembers that many species of birds inhabited the woods near Bowmont Natural Environment Park. Great horned owls frequented particular trees. Red-tailed hawks were even more common, nesting in the highest trees on the prairie

hills. Many species of fish (suckers, mountain whitefish, and species of trout such as rainbow, brown, brook, bull, and even lake trout) were caught in the system before the dams were constructed.

Before the Bears paw Dam was constructed to maintain the flow of the Bow River at a consistent level, flooding in both the Bowness and Montgomery areas was a yearly concern. Nellie Marschand pointed out that when it rained, it was so muddy, sticky, and gooey it was impossible to stand up straight while attempting to walk in it. Before the roads were paved the community was fondly known as 'Mudgometry'. The clay base of the roads caused children to become stuck in the mud after a heavy rain. They often needed to be pulled free by a caring adult passing by!

Before Montgomery was fully developed, snowstorms were a threat to lives because it was easy for people to become lost. The Pauls remember one wicked hailstorm that left dead seagulls scattered around. A storm with golf-ball sized hail broke the kitchen windows and forced the Barr family to hide under their kitchen table. Many community members recall the 1981 hailstorm that damaged roofs and vehicles and destroyed gardens.

The top of the hill is an excellent viewpoint to watch the weather come in from the west! Marg E. Brown remembers that during the big thunderstorms she would drive her car up to the Shouldice Home and watch the storm move across the valley from the hilltop. Only one of her children would be allowed to join her each time, so that whoever made it to the car first would be the lucky storm watcher for the evening.

May the Fourth Be With You!

Early May, we had a new addition to our hard-working volunteer force tending and cajoling and coaxing our MCA Community Garden to bloom and produce green gifts. It looks a little like R2-D2 on a crash diet but has a more focused function than ensuring universal peace for all.

Let us introduce you to Monty. It is about 3 m tall and consists of a hail sensor and an all-in-one weather station that measures temperature, humidity, pressure, wind speed/direction, and rainfall. Monty is fully autonomous (i.e., solar powered), and its important data is shared over a cellular network.

The Northern Hail Project, which is part of the Canadian Severe Storms Laboratory out of Western University (<https://uwo.ca/nhp/>), was deployed in 2023 with 18 stations and continues to grow (20 now!). This network forms part of an initiative to understand the incidence of hail in Calgary, identify vulnerable areas, and ultimately make us more resilient against the dark and evil forces of damaging hail. Monty's smart cookie grandfather is Dr. Connell Miller who is the Director of the Northern Mesonet Project.

Monty likes to chatter. Kinda dry, a one-track mind, yet rather interesting too. The data from the stations are posted every ten minutes in near real time at <https://meso.cssl.ca/>. Zoom in to Calgary to see similar stations across the city. You can click on any station and the data for user-selectable variables can be plotted. Archived data can now be downloaded. It will be upgraded to a five-minute update soon. You can read more about the network at <https://www.uwo.ca/nmp/index.html>.



If you don't want to zoom in to our community's location every time, you can zoom in to a desired field of view and then select the icon on the far top right. Clicking that will create a unique web address that you can bookmark to navigate directly to the selected view. Our station is labelled "Montgomery".

The station should help with our frost seasons. Light winds, clear skies, and dewpoints near (or below) 0°C the afternoon or evening before usually mean frost is likely.

We are excited to see what Monty will share with us! Many thanks go to Dr. Julian C. Brimelow, who is the Director of the Northern Hail Project.

Reflections!

“You are the architect of your own destiny”. This is a proverb using the term “architecture” metaphorically. But, in fact, the architecture of our chosen physical environments speaks to our goals, aspirations, priorities, and influences as well. The design of our lived spaces sends messages about us.

Montgomery is an interesting community in which to make some fun reflections about space, design, priorities and, yes, design fads! Today, we have heritage dwellings coexisting with the most recent fashions in housing. Those, due in part to their mostly monumental structure, are the most salient to our eye when, in fact, Montgomery began with the noble bungalow back in the mid-20th century when the Shouldice Ranch was subdivided into lots.

These early bungalows were individually designed and hand-crafted. They still predominate, particularly on 20, 21, and 22 Avenues. The term bungalow derives from the word Bengal, referring originally to a structure type from that part of the world. The original design features seemingly have disappeared, and the term refers now to a (usually) single-storied dwelling.

Most heritage bungalows in Montgomery are solid, and many have been beautifully maintained since their original construction, retaining their 1950s decorative features, like the porches. Look also for the original bungalows that have been renovated, upgraded, and “modernized”. Note that we have three log bungalows in Montgomery that are significant character buildings in the “hood”! We even have two (or maybe more) brand new bungalows in place of the pre-existing original ones, but with the latest materials and design features. It’s clear: I love the bungalows. But why?

Montgomery bungalows are apartment-sized houses with huge yards and gardens. These provide a (fast

disappearing) habitat for our birds and bees, wildlife, and overall biological diversity. We all benefit from the nature that surrounds the bungalows on our avenues. As I write, these yards are filled with trees in full blossom! This is a great moment to appreciate our arboreal diversity! Oh yes, and kids and pets (and wildlife) have ample and safe spaces to play and interact with the environment. What, we may ask, of the people who live in and love their compact living space? Inside, by necessity, the space is used efficiently and effectively, while material possessions are kept to a reasonable number. The members of the household share many spaces and interact mutually. The small size of the house translates into an environmentally friendly lifestyle. Think heating and greenhouse gases.

Consider the following: I have middle-aged friends who recently bought an apartment in the East Village. It measures 570 ft², which may be smaller than even the smallest of our bungalows. They are overjoyed with their little home and need no more space than that! I confess, it strikes me as bungalow-like living, without the benefits: the privacy and freedom in the outside garden (and a basement)! In the end, what are we saying about ourselves (and our society) when we sacrifice natural spaces to pave them with indoor living spaces that measure 2,000, 3,000 or even 4,000 ft², displacing the flora and the fauna that provide us quality of life? Such a decision reflects options, decisions, and priorities that do reveal our goals, aspirations, priorities, and diverse influences, just as buying, building, or renovating a bungalow in Montgomery would.

So, I invite you to stroll through the neighbourhood appreciating the noble bungalows and admiring the landscapes. In the end, it’s fun to be involved in the spatial transformation of Montgomery as our community evolves, and as we continue to design our destinies, physically, as well as metaphysically!

Facility Tour - Kitchen and Bar

The Montgomery Community Centre boasts a fully AHS-approved kitchen facility large enough to accommodate catering for private weddings, corporate, family, and faith-group events. With an AHS permit you may rent the MCA kitchen to prepare food for resale and for events off-site from MCA.



Two coolers and an upright freezer are at the heart of our kitchen. The large cooler is ideal for stocking a bar, holding slab cakes, and large-volume food production.

The upright freezer can accommodate a large volume of bagged ice or frozen food product.

Ware washing is easy with a two-bay sprayer sink and an undercounter commercial Hobart dishwasher. The dishwashing cleaning agents are pre-loaded under-counter so there's no need to add detergents. Simply load the machine and press play!

12+ 20-amp circuits allow you to bring in your own cookers or rent our Hamilton-Beach electric roasters. Microwave ovens are also included!

The MCA kitchen is complete with a gas oven and four-burner range. It also includes a flat grill for burgers, grilled sandwiches, and pancakes! Commercial makeup air exhausts and replaces the air in the kitchen continuously.

An in-floor commercial grease trap keeps the greywater moving and prevents inconvenient backups.

There are limited utensils in-house. We recommend you bring your favourite 'tools of the trade' to make cooking at Montgomery a uniquely personal experience.

The bar service counter includes a sink and shutter window service to the Main Hall. It is located at the opposite end of the kitchen so that bar- and kitchen-traffic don't conflict.

The kitchen and bar are included with your Main Hall rental. You may rent the kitchen stand-alone for \$40 hourly.

Use Artificial Intelligence Safely

Generative AI tools like ChatGPT, etc. are getting noticed by more and more people and some of these people have begun using these tools in their day-to-day lives. They're writing better emails, building dynamic presentations, analyzing spreadsheets, and much more. The question is – is AI safe to use at work?

The answer is – it depends on what you are sharing with the AI model and which model you're using. For example, when you use Microsoft's Copilot in an enterprise, you may notice something in the Copilot window that you won't see at home. At the top right of your screen, you should see a little green shield with a check mark inside. That icon lets you know that this instance of Copilot is using Enterprise Data Protection. In simple terms, that means that anything you're saying at the prompt, and anything you upload for analysis, is not being used to train the AI model. I would still caution what you share with Copilot, but the data is being anonymized before being sent to the cloud by an extra layer of protection. At home, you'll notice that this shield icon is missing. This means that anything you share with the AI in your personal interactions is possibly being used to train future versions of that model. There's a lot more to this story, but the bottom line is that you should sterilize anything personal, sensitive, or confidential before sharing it with AI tools.

The other AI tools like ChatGPT, Claude, etc., even the paid subscriptions, do not shield your personal data. The bottom line is to treat your AI tool like a friend or colleague who can't keep a secret. So, any data you share with it – make sure it has been cleansed of anything sensitive or identifiable first before uploading it or talking about it with an AI tool. I'm hopeful that all the major AI providers eventually offer a feature that can instantly insulate interactions from the model when things are going to get sensitive.

Consider finding a course on AI in your area. Be safe out there!



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
