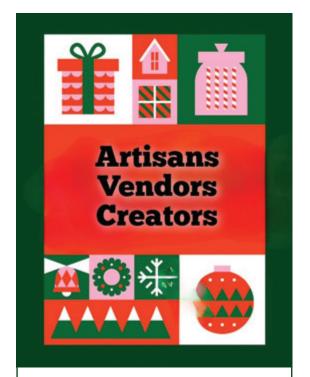

Not 100%. You have to understand that AI tools are programmed to try their best to answer your question or perform your task, but there are limitations. How recent is the data in the model? How much does the model leverage what's currently online? Does it use reasoning to question itself on the answer before giving it? Here are some things to consider when using AI in terms of its reliability.

Treat every Al answer as draft notes from an enthusiastic intern—helpful, but unvetted. Large language models are trained to sound fluent, not to guarantee factual accuracy. Do a quick gut-check. If a claim feels surprising, pause before accepting it. Demand citations—and open them. Missing or broken citations are an instant yellow flag; a citation that doesn't actually support the point is red. Check the sources and look for other ones. Probe the Al's uncertainty. "List reasons your answer might be wrong" or "Rate your confidence 0 to 100 %." When you do catch an error, feed the correction back to the Al and see how the answer changes. It turns fact-checking into an iterative conversation. Use a 'reasoning' model that simulates thought processes better and will question its own conclusions.

Four Analogies to Remember

Al as an improv actor—great at staying "in character," but will riff if it doesn't know its lines.

Al as an over-confident GPS—almost always on the right road, occasionally wants you to drive into a lake.

Al as a blender—it purées everything in its training data; your job is to strain out the pulp.

Al as a first-draft factory—speedy and tireless, but your editing is where accuracy is forged.

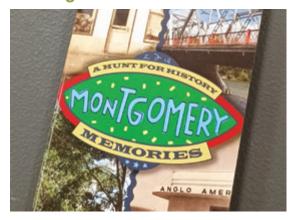

Montgomery Memories Part Eight - Education



Terrace Road Elementary school was built on 2.94 acres in 1952 and named after the road that ran adjacent to the property (now 46 Street). The original Terrace Road School was constructed from army buildings that originated at the Mewata Armory and later became Saint Bernard's Elementary School (part of the Catholic School Board). This school now exists as Shouldice Manor, a seniors' residence!

The current Terrace Road Elementary School (Terrace Road #2) has fourteen classrooms and a large creative playground built in 2002 through the efforts of parent volunteers.

Montgomery Junior High School was built in 1953 and is situated on ten acres. Originally a Senior High, Montgomery School was named after the town that it served. MacKay Road Elementary, to the south of Montgomery School, serviced students who lived in the

area from 46 Street to McKay Road. Originally it had no gymnasium and former students fondly recall taking music in place of physical education. Montgomery School was later physically connected to MacKay Road Elementary School, and the name was changed to Montgomery Junior High School.

Note: Montgomery Junior High School was closed in 2011 due to declining enrolment. The school was built for 750 students, but there were only 200 enrolled when the decision was made.

School provided many fun times. Names were drawn out of a hat for the Christmas gift exchange; the cost of the present was not to exceed \$1. Ron Kerns said his favourite presents were from one of the Omilusik kids, which was usually a beautiful handmade leather item made by their father, the town shoemaker.

Recess activities included tag, skipping, hopscotch, jacks, walking on stilts, throwing India-rubber balls to rhyming songs, and playing marbles. Marbles was outlawed when it was decided it resembled gambling! Each morning teachers would check hands for cleanliness, and "O Canada" and "God Save the Queen" were sung.

Barbara Hauck recalls with fondness Mrs. Smith, a teacher who also owned the Bow Theatre, who provided free movie passes to students on their birthdays. Muriel and Stanley Kaun's children, along with many others, started their education in the Small Fry Co-op Play School. Established in 1953, the Co-op involved a great amount of parent participation, and cost \$3 per month.

Learn how citizens fought to preserve Nose Hill, its history, how it unfolded. The Calgary Local Council of Women recommended that all development of Nose Hill be delayed, until after a major study by the Calgary Planning Commission of city growth. The only existing control was the absence of zoning approval for development and should be delayed, until such time as the City had sufficient funds. Calgary had never expended significant monies for parkland. In its natural state, the only cost for their proposal would be land acquisition, without any capital expenses, facilities, and maintenance.

They believed that Nose Hill is a beautiful natural area. We must preserve prime natural areas to offset urban sprawl and the concrete City Centre. Nose Hill is to Calgary what Citadel Hill is to Halifax; Battlefield's Park to Quebec City; Mount Royal to Montreal; Stanley Park to Vancouver; and Beacon Hill Park to Victoria. Calgary would become the first city in Western Canada to have a natural area of prairie vegetation. Tourists will visit the natural grassland of Nose Hill or view it from the Calgary Tower.

The group proposed that approximately 3,500 acres, bounded on the West by the Sarcee Trail right-of-way, South by the John Laurie Boulevard, East by the existing development adjacent to the escarpments of Nose Hill, and North by the highlands and escarpments of Nose Hill to and beyond 80 Avenue NW, be zoned as Natural Parkland in perpetuity.

The Hill is a dominant geographical feature in Calgary since its southern slopes can be seen from most locations, providing a constant reminder to citizens of the prairie landscape surrounding them which has played such an influential role in our economic and cultural development.

Back to School Safety

Alberta Health Services EMS would like to remind parents and students of some basic safety tips as the school year begins again this fall. Pedestrians and motorists both have an important role to play – road safety is a shared responsibility.

Motorists

- Distracted driving carries a \$300 fine and three demerit points in Alberta. Avoid the use of mobile devices or engaging in any other behavior that diverts your attention away from driving.
- Give right-of-way to pedestrians who have activated overhead crossing lights, or who are waiting to cross from a street corner.
- Other than parked cars, it is illegal to pass another vehicle in a school or playground zone during posted hours.

Around School Buses

- Flashing amber lights mean a bus is slowing down to stop motorists should do likewise.
- No matter which direction you are coming from, stop when approaching a school bus with activated flashing red lights unless the bus is on the opposite side of a divided highway from you.

 Driver courtesy goes a long way. By simply being alert and cautious when approaching a school bus, you are contributing to school bus safety.

Pedestrians

- Cross only at marked crosswalks, or street corners that have clear visibility from all directions.
- Make eye contact with all drivers before crossing the street and keep distractions to a minimum.
- When activating overhead crossing lights, pause before stepping off the curb to ensure motorists in both directions have come to a complete stop.
- Stay within the crosswalk lines.
- Obey pedestrian lights at intersections. Cross the street only when you see the 'walk' sign and only when all cars have come to a complete stop.
- If you are with young children or pets, hold your child's hand firmly and keep a solid grip on leashes when crossing.
- Remember: Children learn by observing. By demonstrating safe crossing habits, you can reduce the chances of your child being involved in a preventable auto/pedestrian collision.
