Come Join the Ranchlands Outdoor Rink Volunteer Team

As the days are getting chillier, we are fast approaching that time of year when the Ranchlands Community Association gets the outdoor rink ready to roll. Our community organized outdoor rink is one of just a few in the city and is such an important part of our community. Whether you are out walking or playing, it is so nice to hear the swoosh of skates, crack of slapshots, and sounds of laughter and fun, as people of all ages from our community enjoy the ice in our community rink.

Become a Volunteer Tax Preparer!

Ranchlands Community Association (RCA) is in the process of planning to host tax preparation sessions for Ranchlanders in 2025. Through the Community Volunteer Income Tax Program, RCA will be able to host free tax clinics where volunteers can complete tax returns for people with a modest income and a simple tax situation. We plan to host these sessions in the spring and will have more details to share in the coming months.

To make this idea a reality we will need volunteers. Community Volunteer Income Tax Program volunteers can take on many different roles. Whether you prepare tax returns or provide support, you will be helping people who are unable to do their taxes on their own. Although it's helpful, you don't need experience doing tax returns to volunteer. All volunteers are offered web-based training on how to do taxes, using tax software, and determining their responsibilities. Online training can be supplemented with inperson training or virtual training sessions. We will need volunteers to host and review documents as well as prepare. And it is also possible to do the tax preparation online.

SAFE AND SOUND

Cold Weather Safety

Emergency Medical Services (EMS) paramedics respond to a number of cold weather-related emergencies every winter. However, by taking appropriate measures to dress properly, anticipate sudden weather changes and preparing to be out in the cold, may reduce your risk of sustaining a cold weather illness/injury. It's also advised you store an emergency kit in your vehicle at all times containing extra clothing, blankets and other road-side supplies.

Frostnip

- Frost-nipped skin is extremely cold, but not yet frozen skin;
- It commonly affects the ears, nose, cheeks, fingers and toes;
- •The skin may look red and possibly feel numb to the touch;

- When treated promptly, frostnip usually heals without complication;
- Move to a warm environment and immediately, but gently, re-warm the affected area through skin to skin contact (i.e. hand covering tips of ears).

Frostbite

- Frostbite occurs when skin becomes so cold, the skin and underlying tissues freeze;
- Affected skin may look white and waxy and will feel hard to the touch;
- Move to a warm environment immediately and place the affected area in warm, not hot, water until fully re-warmed;
- Call 9-1-1 or seek further medical attention as required.

Hypothermia

- Hypothermia is abnormally low body temperature, less than 34°C (as compared to normal body temperature of about 37°C);
- Early hypothermia may manifest as profound shivering; moderate hypothermic patients may act inappropriately: stumbling, mumbling, and fumbling, as their body temperature continues to drop resulting in severe hypothermia (<30°C);
- Left untreated, severe hypothermia may progress to unconsciousness or death;
- Early recognition and prompt medical attention is key. Call 9-1-1. Don't forget to protect yourself from the factors that originally lead to the patient's situation;
- Initiate gentle re-warming as quickly as possible. Remove any wet or constrictive clothing; cover with blankets or sleeping bags. Protect from further heat loss: eliminate contact with cold surfaces, and shield from wind and moisture.

Phase 3 of the Connect: Calgary's Parks Plan is underway, and the draft plan was shared with the public and partners before Council's expected approval in early 2025. You can send questions or comments directly to the project team by emailing parksplan@ calgary.ca. Please note that these will not be included in the final Phase 3 What We Heard Report. A Park is a space set aside for enjoyment, recreation, education, cultural or aesthetic use, or for the protection of wildlife or natural habitats. An urban forest includes trees and shrubs intentionally planted, naturally occurring, or accidentally seeded within city limits. This means all trees in parks, river valleys, streets, roadways, natural areas, and commercial and private lands.

A Natural Area is a City-owned park or open space where the primary role is protection of a (relatively) undisturbed parcel or with a natural/native plant community. Natural areas are categorized to provide guidance for management and permitted uses according to habitat sensitivity and conservation needs. Habitat is the environment where the life cycle of a species is found and characteristics of the place (climate or suitable food and shelter). A Habitat Management Plan means a ten-year operational plan on how we manage natural areas that help maintain or improve the health and function of a park. Calgary's natural ecosystems are categorized by their habitat type (e.g., grassland, forest, wetland). There are also categories for classifying parks with natural environments: Special Protection or Major; Supporting (may be buffers), and other naturalized parks. Naturalization means improving management or repairing some function. For Environmentally Significant Areas, some key natural components recognized by the City of Calgary are Water Quality and Quantity; Rare, Intact, or Biologically Diverse content; and Habitat for Native Species of Interest. A Refugia Garden is Coming to Our Community!

Have you heard of refugia gardening? Refugia are small, protected areas where plants, animals, and other organisms can survive and adapt to changes caused by climate change and other environmental disruptions.

Refugia gardening helps protect local biodiversity by creating spaces where native plants and animals can thrive, even in human-dominated landscapes. It also inspires a sense of care and hope, as people connect with and support nature right in their community.

St. James Anglican Church is excited to announce a new project to transform its traditional British-style gardens with lawns and trees into a Refugia Garden. This redesigned garden will be a beautiful, ecologically healthy space, providing refuge for local wildlife and promoting resilience in the face of environmental challenges.

Over the coming years, St. James will be adding:

- Moisture-absorbent and moisture-retaining soils
- Nitrogen-generating, resilient plants
- Drought-resistant species
- · Soil and plants that can withstand heavy rain
- Reduced lawn care inputs



The goal is to create a peaceful community space that serves as a sanctuary for both wildlife and people. In the long term, the Refugia Garden will offer a natural setting where community members can sit, walk, and relax—a space for reflection, conversation, and connection.

Work will begin in earnest next year, with regular updates to follow. Stay tuned for more news on this exciting transformation!

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Easy Turkey Chili

Turkey is a large bird which is rich in protein and other nutrients such as iron, zinc, and selenium. It provides many of the same calories as chicken and most people are easily able to digest it.

Ground turkey is an inexpensive way to consume turkey and over the years has grown in popularity as a substitute for ground chicken. Rich in vitamins and minerals it can contribute to a healthy diet as it is low in fat. Dark meat is more flavourful but has more calories than white meat without the skin.

Turkey can be added to soups, salads, sandwiches, burgers, or Chili as shown in this Easy Turkey Chili recipe below.

Prep Time: 15 minutes **Cook Time:** 1 hour

Servings: 6

Ingredients:

- 1 lb lean ground turkey
- 2 tbsps. olive or vegetable oil
- 3 garlic cloves finely chopped
- 1 medium yellow onion chopped
- 1 red bell pepper finely chopped
- 1 900 ml carton (low sodium) chicken broth
- 1 28 oz can diced tomatoes
- 1 small can corn niblets drained and rinsed
- 1 540 ml can black beans drained and rinsed
- 1 540 ml can red kidney beans drained and rinsed
- ½ tsp Chili powder
- 2 tsps. ground cumin
- 1 tsp dried oregano
- 1 tsp salt
- ½ tsp ground black pepper

Directions:

 In a large pot add olive or vegetable oil, chopped onion, garlic, and red pepper. Sauté the vegetables for 3 to 4 minutes until onions are softened and then add the ground turkey. Sauté the turkey for 4 to 5 minutes until cooked through.

- Add the Chili powder, ground cumin, oregano, salt and black pepper and continue to cook for a couple of minutes.
- Add the black beans, kidney beans, corn, and diced tomatoes and blend in with the turkey.
- Add the chicken stock and bring to a boil and then reduce heat and allow the Chili to simmer for approximately 45 minutes, stirring occasionally.
- Garnish the Turkey Chili with sour cream, shredded cheddar cheese and chopped coriander leaves or taco chips and sliced avocado if preferred.

Ranchlands Food Pantry: A Year in Review

As we wrap up another year at the Ranchlands Food Pantry, we are filled with immense gratitude for the incredible support from our community. Your generosity has made a significant impact, and we want to take a moment to thank each and every one of you.

Our heartfelt thanks go out to the community members who have contributed so generously, both through items donated and money raised at our AGM silent auction and other fundraisers put on by the community association throughout the year at various events. Those funds help us stock the pantry throughout the year with staples when donations run low. We also extend our gratitude to our amazing partners: YYC Leftovers, Cobs Bread, Community Natural Foods (Crowfoot), and Paris Baquette (Beacon Hill). Your contributions of fresh food and baked goods have been invaluable in rounding out our hampers and go to supporting some of our other community programs like Free Bread Fridays, Perishable Giveaway Day, and other weekly gatherings at the hall that are open to everyone in the community. Additionally, we thank the families, staff, and School Council at Ranchlands School for their routine food collections at school events (such as the Halloween Dance) that help keep our pantry stocked, with a special shoutout to Principal Mr. Wigglesworth, who has always been such a champion for our program.

We also want to thank the local businesses who have generously donated supplies, like toothbrushes and toothpaste from Ranchlands Dental Clinic, plus Stavros Pizza & Sports Bar and CerTech Automotive Repair who have set up donation boxes in their lobbies to facilitate ongoing collection of non-perishable items for us.

A special thank you goes out to our MLA Julia Hayter and her team for their generous contribution of menstrual products following their Period Products drive. We are incredibly grateful to everyone who donated to that drive.

Three years ago, our program was run by a single volunteer with a lot of support from the Ranchlands Community Association then president, Anita. Today,

we are proud to have grown into a robust support service with 17 volunteers in ten different roles with support from two staff members. The amazing people who give their time to running this program include Sheila and Reg, Lynn, Jo Anne, Caroline, Judy, Zen, Crystal, Sue, Sharon, Paul, Arthur, Kim, Teena and Kody, Merle, Koen, Anita, and Jen. This growth has enabled us to offer more comprehensive assistance to our neighbours in need.

In 2024 alone, we have filled 120 hampers for roughly 55 different households in Ranchlands, with 60% of these households having children under the age of 12. Our food pantry serves neighbours from all walks of life, from seniors to students. If any Ranchlanders need food assistance, hampers can be requested through our website under the programs section. Hampers are filled and ready for distribution on Monday evenings between 4:30 and 5:30 pm, unless it's a statutory holiday, in which case distribution is moved to Tuesdays.

In addition to food, we have expanded our offerings to include small gift items for those celebrating special occasions like birthdays and anniversaries. These items are all donated, and we welcome contributions of new toys as well as items suitable for adults.

We are always in need of donations like cereal, rice, canned soups, and vegetables. Unused and unopened toiletries such as deodorant, toothbrushes, and toothpaste are also greatly appreciated.

Thank you once again for your unwavering support. Together, we create a wonderful community to be a part of.
