The Ranchlands Edible Forest: Growing Roots and Community



What began as an ambitious vision in 2021 has now taken firm root—quite literally. The Ranchlands Edible Forest, nestled just south of the basketball court beside the community hall, is now entering an exciting stage: the trees are growing strong and beginning to show signs of fruitfulness.

Planted over the past two years, this community-led project includes 17 fruit trees—apple, cherry, plum, and pear—offering the promise of fresh, free produce for Ranchlanders. Designed as a long-term community resource, we hope the Edible Forest will eventually support our food pantry initiative and eventually make fresh fruit available to anyone who visits.

But this forest is more than just food - it's a space to educate, connect, and inspire - a space that invites rest, reflection, and connection with nature. The benches are a good spot for seniors or a young parent to take a seat. We continue to partner with the elementary school in Ranchlands so students can visit the site and learn about pollinators, plant life, and where food comes from. As the project grows, we're eager to collaborate with Indigenous knowledge keepers and elders to help shape the space using traditional plants and teachings that reflect the cultural heritage of Indigenous community members.

While the trees are thriving, we still need helping hands. We're currently seeking volunteers to support the next stage of growth and to work with our RCA Vice President on expansion planning. We're also hoping to install informational signs to share the story of the Edible Forest with all who visit.

This is a living legacy—one that feeds bodies, minds, and community spirit. Join us in nurturing it.

Long ago, what we know as Alberta was underwater, covered by the ocean and surrounded by tropical forests. As many as 20 major glacial advances and retreats reshaped the landscape, including the continuous plateau of Nose Hill and Lake Calgary. Nose Hill provides spectacular views of the Bow River Valley and the uplands across the valley. Their geological history began in the floodplain of the Bow River which flowed at the top level of the present Hill where the river deposited gravel, sand, and mud. These are relatively thin on the steeper slopes. Nose Hill is bounded by the overflow spillway system, now Beddington and Nose Creek. Big Hill Springs Coulee is what remains.

Erratics are stones, boulders, or big blocks picked up and moved from one place to another during the last ice age. There are many in Nose Hill Park traced to a landslide from Mount Edith Cavell in Jasper National Park; they are part of a series across the Foothills region of Alberta. The Foothills Erratics Train runs from near Hinton, Alberta, to the Montana border. Some large boulders, such as the Nose Hill Buffalo Rubbing Stone, were used centuries ago. You can hike up to the Nose Hill 64 Avenue Glacial Erratic from the parking lot off 14 Street NW. At the top of Nose Hill Park there are several scattered glacial erratics of different sizes grouped close together. The Nose Hill Brisebois Glacial Erratic is between the south Nose Hill Parking Lot at Brisebois Drive and John Laurie Blvd. The Nose Hill Tower Glacial Erratic is on the top of the hill near transmission poles and a small building. Access is by an uphill hike from the North Hill SE Parking Lot along an old access road.





Swap Shop

Stocking Community: How Our Pantry Is Meeting Growing Needs

As of July 10, the Ranchlands Community Food Pantry has received 113 hamper requests, just shy of the 120 total requests recorded for all of 2024. Typically, households requesting hampers consist of two adults, one child aged 12 to 18, and two children under 12.

The pantry is operated by 18 dedicated volunteers, with support from the Ranchlands Facility Coordinator and the Office Administrator. It is organized and managed entirely within the community and relies on continued local involvement to support neighbours in need.

Over the years, the program has expanded and sustained itself largely through donation drives led by local businesses, the Ranchlands School, and St. James Anglican Church. Thanks to partnerships with YYC Leftovers, Cobs Bread, Community Natural Foods, Paris Bakery, and MLA Julia Hayter's Period Products Drive, the pantry has been able to supplement its nonperishable offerings with fresh food and toiletries.

The year-over-year increase in requests is likely due to two key factors. First, the rising cost of living means that, for many, a dollar simply doesn't stretch as far as it used to. Second, the pantry's improved outreach means more residents in need are now aware of and accessing the program.

With demand rising, the focus has shifted to long-term sustainability. The pantry is now working to increase its base of monthly donors to help regularly stock staple items like rice, beans, and canned soups; items that are frequently in short supply. Community members interested in supporting the program can become monthly donors at http://ranchlandscommunity.com/ donate or by calling the community office at 403-241-0335. Monthly giving is simple, secure, tax-deductible, and any amount helps toward the goal of raising an additional \$80 per month for non-perishable goods.

Residents seeking food assistance can request a hamper through the Programs section of the community website.

It remains my honour to represent you at the House of Commons as your Member of Parliament.



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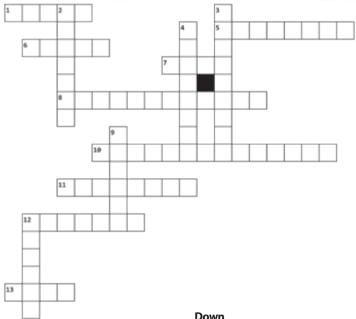
