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

Our Community Cleanup day was a roaring success.

Our winter craft market attracted over 400 shoppers.

Our collaborations with organizations within Ranchlands are improving and expanding, including our two elementary schools (Ranchlands and St. Rita's), St. James Church, the Islamic Society of NW Calgary, Rise Calgary, along with support and donations from local businesses.

Our AGM was well attended and supported some improvements to our Bylaws.

Our casino event, supported by many volunteers, contributed \$85,000 to our budget.

Thank You for an Amazing Winter Craft Market!





Did You Know?


The Ranchlands Community Centre has grown right alongside our neighbourhood.

News from the Friends of Nose Hill

On the Park's northern boundary, Alberta Government Telephone, in 1982, and Canadian Western Natural Gas, in 1990, had access rights. Carma Developments put waste in the MacEwan Glen ravine. Construction sites attracted four-by-fours and dirt bikes. Nose Hill Trail condition and use were studied between July 20 and September 20, 1993. Volunteers working in pairs came from the Nose Hill Park Users Group, Nose Hill Communities Board, and Calgary Field Naturalists Society. Their goal was to measure trail type and surface, width, and depth. An aerial photo mosaic marked the survey areas. Data was collected for the glacial moraine (the Hill plateau and side slopes), ravines (Many Owls and Porcupine Valley), and disturbed land. The time of day was morning (7:00 am to noon), afternoon (noon to 6:00 pm), and evening (6:00 pm to dark). During both the week and weekend, Hill use was greatest in the afternoon and evenings. On the weekend, people spent time in the ravines. However, during the week more were recorded on the plateau and side slopes. Pathway routes were widened by braiding but less rutted than trails. The greatest use was in disturbed sites, rather than on the moraine. All pathways and trails were used by cyclists, who preferred gravel pathways to grass trails. Walkers without dogs used pathways, unlike dog walkers in the ravines. A review revealed that areas damaged by vehicles, horse and cattle grazing, and gravel extraction were slowly regenerating, including severely damaged areas. Although some trails were rutted (and may remain so for a time) others had high grass growing in them without horse and vehicle traffic. Ravine trails were overgrown by tall grasses, thistles and nettles, so many people no longer used them.

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Important Updates for AISH and Alberta Disability Assistance Program

For those of us living in our community, we are very fortunate to have Rise Calgary offering free support to residents right in our community. Over the last several months, volunteers and staff have been fielding inquiries from residents, family members, and friends about the proposed changes to the Alberta's disability program. Committed to ensuring Ranchlanders understand how these changes could affect our community residents, Salimah Kassam, Rise Calgary Executive Director shared the following insights about how the proposed policy changes could affect people with disabilities living in our community.

Alberta's Transition from AISH to ADAP

The Government of Alberta is introducing the Alberta Disability Assistance Program (ADAP), which will replace AISH for many recipients starting July 1, 2026. Key changes include:

- **Automatic Transfer:** Current AISH recipients will be moved to ADAP unless they reapply and are approved to remain on AISH.
- **Reduced Benefits:** ADAP provides \$200 per month less than AISH, resulting in a \$2,400 annual income loss.
- **Employment Expectations:** ADAP introduces mandatory work-related criteria, regardless of disability severity.
- **No Appeal Process:** Decisions made by a government-appointed panel will be final.
- **Rent Increases:** AISH recipients in community housing may see rent increases of up to \$220 per month.

Canada Disability Benefit (CDB)

The Canada Disability Benefit launched in 2025, offering up to \$200 per month to eligible working-age adults with disabilities. However:

- Alberta is clawing back the CDB from AISH payments, meaning recipients may not see any financial gain.
- AISH recipients are required to apply for the CDB, even if they won't benefit due to the clawback.
- Applying for the required Disability Tax Credit (DTC) can cost up to \$300, creating additional barriers.

Inclusion Alberta's Response

Inclusion Alberta has voiced strong opposition to both the ADAP transition and the CDB clawback. Their concerns include:

- The changes will increase poverty and reduce autonomy for people with disabilities.
- ADAP's employment expectations are unrealistic and discriminatory, especially without inclusive supports.
- The loss of appeal rights is unjust and undermines dignity.
- Alberta is the only province clawing back the CDB, which Inclusion Alberta calls punitive and mean-spirited.
- The DTC application process adds financial and administrative burdens for those already facing hardship.

Inclusion Alberta continues to advocate for:

- Full exemption of the CDB from income calculations.
- Preservation of AISH as a stable, unconditional support.
- Voluntary, inclusive employment supports tailored to individual needs.

Ranchlands Food Pantry: Community Support and Heartfelt Impact

The Ranchlands Food Pantry is a shining example of what happens when neighbours come together with kindness and generosity. Staying Safe on Winter Walks in Ranchlands



If you're a winter walker, Ranchlands is one of the best places to be. We've got so many communities within our community, lots of green turned snowy white spaces, tranquil wooded areas, and hills that make the neighbourhood feel like its own mini adventure park. But once

January rolls in—with its short days, long nights, and temperatures that make your cheeks rosy - it helps for us all to add a few extra habits to keep those walks safe and enjoyable.

First things first: visibility. January daylight feels like it is waning in the early afternoon, so even a late-afternoon walk can turn into dusk before you know it. Light coloured clothing helps you stand out, and anything reflective is a bonus. If you're walking a dog, a lighted collar or clip-on tag is magic—your pup becomes a tiny, glowing satellite orbiting happily beside you.

Then there's the temperature. Ranchlands gets that crisp, dry cold that sneaks up on you. Layer up, cover your fingers and ears, and don't be shy about wearing the warm stuff – hats and scarfs are a must. Winter walking is about comfort, not fashion (but if your fashion includes a puffy jacket, even better).

One thing that makes winter walks safer for everyone? Clear sidewalks. A quick shovel after a snowfall or a

sprinkle of ice-melt can make a world of difference for neighbours, delivery folks, dog-walkers, and anyone just trying to get from A to B without doing the accidental winter tumble. It's a simple way we all help keep Ranchlands moving.

On the practical side: cross at the crosswalks. Drivers want to see you—truly—especially when the roads get slippery. And if you're behind the wheel, take an extra moment at intersections. With lots of residents heading out to enjoy some fresh winter air, it is not always easy to spot people at the intersections. And if you are walking, press the button at any of our lighted crosswalks before stepping into the intersection.

Finally, enjoy it. Winter walks in Ranchlands allow us to see our community and the views, including the snowy mountains in the distance in a different light.

Here's to staying warm, staying visible, and embracing the magic of winter in our neighbourhood.
