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### Celebrating 50 Years of Fish Creek Provincial Park

The wind whispers through willow branches along the banks of the slowly melting creek. Flocks of geese fly overhead looking for their perfect nesting spot for the spring. A woodpecker drills into the side of a nearby fallen tree, while a yapping coyote can be heard in the distance. Alongside these idyllic nature scenes, you can also hear... bicycle bells and the distant rumble of Tsuut'ina Trail? While walking in Fish Creek Provincial Park can sometimes feel like a stroll through an isolated wilderness, this local treasure is situated well within the city of Calgary and is one of the largest urban parks in Canada.

Fish Creek Provincial Park wasn't always considered to be so urban. When the park was first established in 1975 (as Peter Lougheed's first act as Alberta's Premier), the grounds were on the very edge of Calgary. As the city grew, so too did interest in living near a large natural area, and soon Fish Creek Provincial Park was engulfed by the growing city. These days, Fish Creek Provincial Park has more than 350,000 people in sixteen communities live next to Fish Creek, along with an estimated three to four million visitors per year. It is a vital part of the fabric of Calgary, with 63 unique plant ecosystems, hundreds of species of wild animals, picnic areas, a lake for swimming, and over 100 kilometres of trails for people to explore.

2025 marks an incredible milestone for Fish Creek Provincial Park – its golden anniversary. This park has meant so much to so many people over the past 50 years, and we at the Friends of Fish Creek Provincial Park Society are eager to celebrate with you all! We invite you to mark your calendar for a special 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary party on June 7 at the Bow Valley Ranch day-use area. Join us and many community partners between 10:00 am to 3:00 pm for a party featuring family-friendly activities, free plant/seed giveaways, a 50/50 raffle, prize draws, food trucks, and much more!

In advance of the event, we are also asking community members to share their stories and photos of their experiences within Fish Creek Provincial Park over the last 50 years. 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### **Your Summer Garden Checklist**

Many people think of spring and fall as the busiest seasons for gardeners, with summer reserved for simply enjoying the fruits of their labour. While there's some truth to that, the reality is that maintaining a beautiful yard or garden takes effort all season long.

Here's a checklist of the most important summer tasks to keep your garden thriving:

#### **Early Summer**

**1. Mulch:** Ideally, mulching happens in spring, but summer is when plants need it most. Mulch helps retain moisture and reduces evaporation in the heat. Check your garden beds to ensure you have at least an inch of mulch and add more if needed.

**2. Watch For Pests:** Keep an eye out for slugs, aphids, ants, and red lily beetles. Spotting and dealing with a few pests early are much easier than tackling a full infestation later.

**3. Remove Excess Vegetation:** Overgrown areas can attract pests like voles. Though not dangerous, voles can damage your garden by chewing on roots and bark and creating unsightly tunnel systems in your lawn. If you have a compost pile, turn and water it regularly—untended piles can attract voles and mice.

If voles are already an issue, consider deterrents such as coyote urine spray, installing owl nesting boxes, live trapping (for smaller problems), or contacting pest control if the infestation is significant.

**4. Water Wisely:** In summer heat, deep and infrequent watering is best. It encourages healthy root systems and improves drought tolerance. Water in the morning whenever possible and aim to water at the base of the plants rather than from above.

**5. Weed Regularly:** Weeds thrive in summer and can quickly go to seed, so stay on top of them. It's easiest to weed when the soil is moist and weeds are young. For deep-rooted weeds like dandelions, a long garden knife works well. (A colleague of mine uses kitchen knives—but that wouldn't fly in my household!) Garden knives are usually more durable too.

**6. Mow Thoughtfully:** Consider leaving your grass a little longer—it helps shade the roots and retain moisture. When mowing, vary your pattern to prevent ruts or stripes from forming.

#### Midsummer

**7. Deadhead Flowers:** Remove faded or dried-up blooms regularly. Even if they look finished, they continue to draw energy away from new flower production. For herbs and other plants, you don't want to flower, pinch off the blooms to prevent them from becoming woody or bitter.

**8. Fertilize:** By midsummer, many plants have depleted springtime nutrients. A top-up using natural fertilizers—like compost or worm castings—supports stronger, healthier growth than synthetic nitrogen.

**9. Remove Dead Plants:** If a plant dies due to pests, disease, or winterkill, remove it promptly to avoid spreading problems. Don't compost diseased or infested plants—dispose of them properly.

**10. Fill In Bare Spots:** If you've removed a dead plant or your spring blooms are fading, refresh the space with colourful annuals to keep your garden vibrant through summer.

**11. Pick Produce Promptly:** Harvest your fruits and vegetables as soon as they ripen. Doing so encourages continued production and higher yields by allowing the plant to focus energy on new growth.

**12. Try Succession Planting:** Once you've harvested crops like radishes or lettuce, consider planting another round. Many cool-weather crops—like spinach, lettuce, and kale—can still thrive in late summer or early fall.

**13. Divide Bearded Irises:** If you grow bearded irises, summer is the time to divide them. They go dormant in the heat and should be divided every three to four years to maintain their health and bloom quality.

I hope this checklist helps you prioritize your summer garden tasks and make the most of the season. Happy gardening!

The LCRA closely monitors the safety of the lake/lake ice for use; however, we cannot guarantee the lake/lake ice is free of all risks. Regardless of the status of the Safety Flag (details on status below), access is done at the sole risk of the member and their guests.

You can view the status of the Safety Flag by looking for the flags at the park, contacting the LCRA office at 403-254-4148, or by visiting our website at www.lakechap.ca.

Red Flag = Waterfront and lake ice is closed to all users. Green Flag = Waterfront and lake ice is open to all users.

June is here, bringing with it the official start of summer!

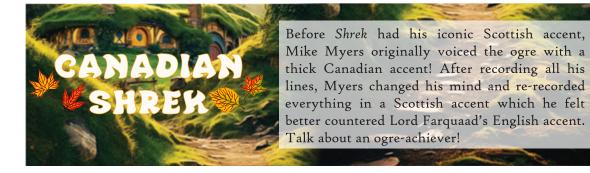

# **Stop Apologizing Already**

This is something that really took me some time and awareness to change. Maybe it's because I'm Canadian...sorry?! Over-apologizing can be rooted in people-pleasing, a fear of conflict, feeling like you're a burden, or that you don't have a place to express yourself freely. The good news is you can unlearn it by becoming more aware of when you say "sorry" and replacing it with more confident or accurate expressions.

Here's how to start:

#### **1. Notice Your Patterns**

Start paying attention to when you say "sorry." Is it when you:

- Ask a question?
- Express a need?
- Walk past someone?
- Take up space?

Awareness is the first step.

#### 2. Swap "Sorry" for More Empowering Phrases

a). When you're late

Instead of: "Sorry I'm late."

Try: "Thanks for your patience." or "I appreciate you waiting for me."

b). When you didn't respond right away

Instead of: "Sorry I didn't get back to you."

Try: "Thanks for your patience while I got back to you." or "I appreciate your patience."





c). When you need something

Instead of: "Sorry to bother you, but..."

Try: "Do you have a moment?" or "Can I ask you something?" or "Are you free for a consult?"

d). When you accidentally bump into someone

Instead of: "Sorry!"

Try: "Excuse me." or "Pardon me."

e). When you disagree

Instead of: "Sorry, but I think..."

Try: "I see it differently." or "Here's another perspective..." or just be curious and ask for more information on the topic.

f). When you're expressing emotion

Instead of: "Sorry I'm crying." or "I'm sorry I'm so angry."

Try: "Thanks for being here while I process this." or "I'm feeling a lot right now." or "Wow, this is overwhelming."

#### 3. Use Apologies Intentionally

Apologize when you genuinely hurt someone or made a mistake. That keeps apologies meaningful. For everything else, aim for assertiveness and gratitude.

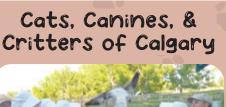


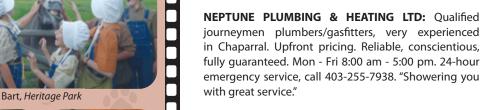
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
