COOK'S CORNER

One Pan Spaghetti and Meatballs



Ingredients

Meatballs:

- 1 pound ground beef
- 1½ teaspoons garlic powder
- 1/2 cup chopped fresh parsley
- ⅓ cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 egg, whisked
- ½ cup plain breadcrumbs
- 3 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil


Spaghetti:

- 1 pound dried spaghetti
- 3 cups marinara sauce (store-bought or homemade)
- 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese, plus more to taste
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley

Directions

- 1. Make the Meatballs: In a medium bowl, mix the beef with the garlic powder, parsley, and Parmesan to combine. Add the egg and breadcrumbs and mix to combine.
- 2. Form the mixture into balls, using about two tablespoons of meat per ball. In a large sauté pan, heat the olive oil over medium heat. Add the meatballs to the pan and cook until they are fully cooked and golden brown all over, three to five minutes.
- 3. Make the Spaghetti: Remove the meatballs from the pan and set them aside. Drain any grease from the pan, and then fill it with three inches of water and a few pinches of salt. Bring to a boil over high heat. Add the spaghetti in an even layer and boil until al dente, eight to nine minutes (or according to package directions).
- 4. Drain the spaghetti, then return it to the pan. Add the marinara sauce and meatballs; toss to coat. Garnish with Parmesan and parsley.

Serve warm, immediately.

Many of you have already noticed the exciting progress on our playground project, but for those who may have missed the news, I'm pleased to share that our community was selected to receive a fully accessible \$300,000 playground funded entirely by the city, thanks to additional grant funding! Construction is now underway and will continue throughout the summer. Please note that the playground will be closed until its completion. While this may cause inconvenience, it's all for a wonderful cause! Residents will also note that the crosswalks have finally been painted and the pedestrian signs have been installed by the playground. Please remember that there is a speed limit in Diamond Cove! 

It's hard to believe that we are at the end of summer already. As many of us gear up for the start of a new school year, I wanted to share some exciting news about our school system.

Alberta's population is booming and causing unprecedented growth in our education system, adding a historic number of new students across the province for the 2024-25 school year. Alberta's government recognizes and sympathizes with the challenges school authorities face with increasing enrolment, rising operational costs, and inflation. That is why it is investing an additional \$215 million to help alleviate these pressures, beginning in the 2024-25 school year. This will help alleviate these pressures, and ensure students have a comfortable place to learn with the support they need to succeed in the classroom.

Through this investment, up to 2,500 new spaces for students will be created in the 2024-25 school year, by building and installing up to 100 new modular classrooms. In addition to new modulars, the government is relocating up to 50 modular classrooms to some of Alberta's fastest growing communities in the Calgary Metropolitan Region and Edmonton, which will support up to 1,250 students. Calgary Board of Education will receive up to 31 new modular classrooms and have up to 14 relocated; Calgary Catholic School Division will receive up to 14 new modular classrooms and have up to six relocated.

School authorities can also use this additional funding to hire up to 1,000 additional teachers and classroom support staff which will help them manage class sizes, and tackle rising cost pressures without taking away from student learning.

The 2024-25 fiscal year is also promoting student success by providing a record \$9.3 billion into Alberta's education system, which is equal to \$47 million every day students are in school.
