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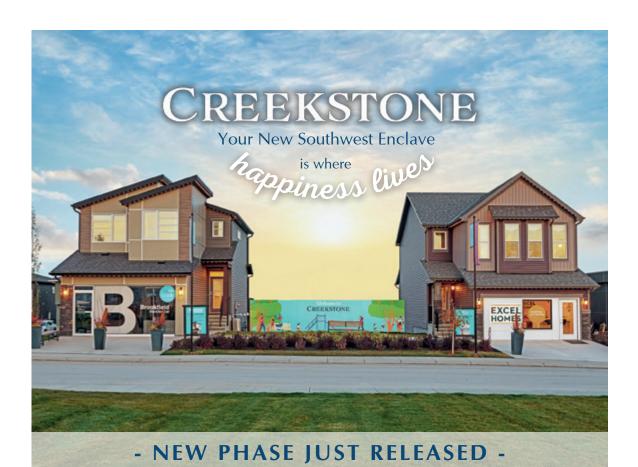

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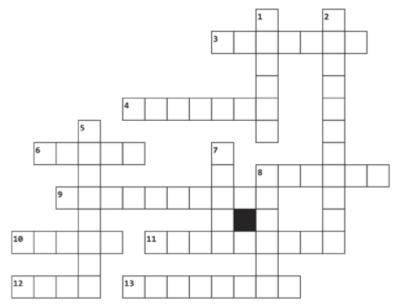

Learning About Palliative and End-of-Life Care

People can live for many years with a chronic disease. Palliative and end-of-life care gives extra support at all stages of a chronic illness, not just near the end-of-life. This type of care works with people's family doctor and specialist as they're being treated for chronic illness. It helps to give people the best quality of life possible so people and their families can live a more settled and peaceful life.

How Specialized Care Teams Help

Living with a chronic disease can be harder some days than others. People may need to be in the hospital for a short time, and it can be tough on people and their caregivers. Sometimes medicine can help treat a chronic disease, and sometimes other therapies are a better choice.

Palliative and end-of-life care focuses on people's comfort, no matter what health problems a disease may cause. Care teams work to:

- Treat symptoms using medicine and other therapies.
- Help people feel more positive.
- Help with fears and anxiety.
- Show what community supports are out there.
- Teach about care options.
- Make sure all caregivers know what the person wants and needs.
- Explain how the health care system works.

Care Options

In Alberta, you have many options for where to get palliative and end-of-life care – your home, a hospital, a continuing care centre, or a hospice. Talk to your family and your health care team about what's important to you and where you'd like to be at this time in your illness. Your choice may change as your illness changes, and you can get palliative and end-of-life care at any time.

Home

Many people choose to stay in their own homes to get palliative and end-of-life care from a home care program. Being in a familiar place, close to loved ones, can help you live as normally as possible. Home care programs offer nursing care and other home support services, such as:

- Volunteer services.
- · Community day programs for you.
- Care to manage your pain and symptoms.
- Teams to help with urgent needs 24/7.
- Interdisciplinary care such as support with finances and rehabilitation.

There's also a program that's helping to bring emergency care to people who get palliative and end-of-life care in their homes. The EMS Assess, Treat, Refer program has Emergency Medical Services, home care clinicians, doctors, and families working together to help people stay in their homes if that's what they wish.

Hospitals

In a hospital, care is often given by a team of doctors, nurses, and other health care providers. The team has access to expert palliative care consultants or palliative doctors. Some hospitals have palliative and end-of-life care units, and others set aside beds in different units.

Continuing Care Centres

You can get palliative and end-of-life care services in continuing care centres, like long-term care and supportive living facilities. The type of facility you choose depends on:

- The lifestyle you want.
- The care you need.
- · How much you can do for yourself.

If you're in one of these facilities and you need specialized palliative care services, you may need to stay in a hospital for a short time.

Hospices

Alberta has many hospices. These places are made to feel like home while giving specialized end-of-life care, 24/7. The care teams focus on your comfort and quality of life and can help you and your family cope with your feelings about serious illness. In a hospice, you're cared for by health care professionals. Availability of other professionals such as spiritual counsellors and other services such as volunteers may be different for each hospice.

Breakfast Ouesadilla

Eggs are tasty, filling, and good for your health as a whole; eggs contain a little bit of every nutrient you need. Cheap and easy to prepare, they are an inexpensive source of high-quality lean protein.

Blue, green, brown, or white eggs may have different colours but there is no difference in taste or nutrition between them. An average hen lays 300 to 325 eggs per year. The colour of the yolk depends on the hen's diet and age, and typically as hens age, their eggs become larger.

An extremely versatile ingredient, eggs are not just for eating but are used to make beauty products such as face masks, compost, and garden fertilizer. In many cultures, the egg is a symbol of new life, fertility, and rebirth.

Eggs are also a breakfast/brunch mainstay, and scrambled, poached, baked, or fried are some of the ways to consume eggs. Quick and simple to cook, eggs can also be used in burritos or quesadillas as shown in the recipe for breakfast quesadillas below.

Prep Time: 20 minutes Cook Time: 20 minutes

Servings: 2 **Ingredients:**

- 2 large tortillas
- 1 1/2 tsp. olive oil
- 1 chorizo sausage, cooked and casing removed
- 3 eggs lightly beaten
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1 tbsp. butter

- 1 cup shredded Mexican cheese
- 2 cups kale washed, stemmed, and coarsely chopped
- 1 cup sliced button mushrooms
- ¼ cup chopped green onion
- ½ cup chopped red bell pepper
- ½ jalapeno, seeds removed and chopped (optional)
- Cooking spray

Directions:

- · Heat olive oil in a pan or nonstick skillet on medium heat. Add onions and sauté for about two minutes. Next add red peppers and mushrooms and sauté for another two minutes and then add kale, jalapeno pepper, and chorizo sausage. Cook until veggies are tender and then remove from heat and keep warm.
- In a skillet, melt butter on medium heat and pour in the egg mixture with a ¼ tsp. of salt. Cook eggs while stirring until they start to firm up then scramble until they are cooked through and remove from heat.
- · Coat a large skillet or fry pan with cooking spray and heat on medium heat. Place a tortilla in the pan and sprinkle a ¼ cup of cheese on one half of the tortilla followed by half the veggie mixture and half the scrambled egg. Top with a ¼ cup of cheese and fold tortilla in half over filling. Cook for a few minutes until tortilla is golden brown, turning once.
- Transfer quesadilla to a cutting board and repeat the process with the second tortilla.
- Slice each guesadilla into two or three slices and serve with your favourite hot salsa, guacamole, or sour cream.

Provincial Funding

The Calgary Catholic School District (CCSD) serves approximately 64,000 students in 118 schools and is the largest Catholic school district in Alberta. We are unique in that we represent the interests of over five municipalities which include rural, urban, and metro areas in Airdrie, Calgary, Chestermere, Cochrane, and Rocky View County. Since 2021, our district has experienced consistent and significant student growth. During this time, we have seen a 12 percent increase, approximately 6,800 students. In addition, CCSD has seen the number of students with complex needs grow significantly over the past few years. Approximately 20 percent of our students are English as an Additional Language (EAL) learners and approximately 20 percent of our students have significant diverse learning needs. These complex needs may include autism, significant dysregulation, cognitive disabilities, medical diagnoses, and mental health challenges. Since 2018, the district's fixed costs have also increased more than 50 percent. Fixed costs include utilities, maintenance, insurance, carbon taxes, internet fees, etc., all of which are necessary to student learning.

In the face of these challenges, provincial funding per student has not increased since 2018. It is crucial that we receive appropriate and sustainable funding to accommodate rising costs. Without significant additional funding in Budget 2025, our district will be forced to make difficult decisions which will negatively impact the educational success of our students.

Did You Know?

- Alberta spends the least on its students. In 2023-2024, Alberta Education spent the lowest per student, roughly \$10,000 compared to the Canadian provincial average of approximately \$12,000.
- In the 2024-2025 operating budget, the CCSD's operating costs will exceed \$700 million. Due to the increase in costs, the budget forecasts an operating deficit of \$21.5 million.
- The deficit in the approved 2024-2025 operating budget was funded using \$18.6 million of the CCSD's reserves. The \$18.6 million is equivalent to 215 teachers.

- Government funding accounts for 95 percent of the district's revenue and is based on student enrolment.
 Just over 80 percent of the district's costs relate directly to student learning.
- Per provincial government requirements, the CCSD must maintain an accumulated operating surplus to cover any potential funding shortfalls. However, in recent years, the district has elected to use our savings to fund budget shortfalls. This approach is not sustainable as our savings are at the minimum level required by the government.

We are grateful for the support of the Alberta government. As trustees, we are actively working to inform and educate the government about the district's financial pressures and the challenges that our students are facing. It is crucial that they are made aware that adequate and sustainable funding is needed to fully address our financial challenges and to ensure the long-term success and well-being of our students. Your Board of Trustees has been working diligently to advocate and shine a light on the areas in which our schools require additional support. Here's one of our favourites you can try at home!

Oatmeal Cookie Smoothie

Single Serving

Ingredients:

- 1/4 cup old-fashioned oats
- 1 cup unsweetened coconut or almond milk
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 tablespoon honey (to taste)
- ½ teaspoon ground cinnamon
- ¼ teaspoon ground ginger
- Pinch of nutmeg
- Pinch of salt
- 1 frozen banana (peeled)

Directions:

- 1. Add oats to the blender and pulse until finely ground.
- 2. Add milk, vanilla, honey, and spices.
- 3 Add the frozen banana
- 4. Blend until smooth.

In addition to making smoothies, kids also get the chance to practice leadership, teamwork, and communication by running their own business meetings. These skills are key for personal growth and work well in any area of life.

The Art of Finding Work: Hiring Is a Process of Elimination

Job seekers owe it to themselves to understand and accept; fundamentally, hiring is a process of elimination. Regardless of how many applications an employer receives, the ratio revolves around several applicants versus one job opening, necessitating elimination.

Essentially, job gatekeepers (recruiters, HR, and hiring managers) are paid to find reasons and faults to reject candidates to find the candidate most suitable for the job and the company.

Nowadays, employers are inundated with applications, which forces them to double down on reasons to eliminate. It's no surprise that many job seekers believe that "isms" contribute to their failure to get interviews, let alone get hired. Employers have a large pool of highly qualified candidates to select from. Job seekers attempt to absolve themselves of the consequences of actions and inactions by blaming employers, the government, or the economy rather than trying to increase their chances of getting hired by not giving employers reasons to eliminate them because of:

Typos, Grammatical Errors, Poor Writing Skills

"Communication, the human connection, is the key to personal and career success." - Paul J. Meyer.

The most vital skill you can offer an employer is above-average communication skills. Your resume, LinkedIn profile, cover letters, and social media posts should be well-written and error-free.

Failure to Communicate the Results You Achieved for Your Previous Employers

If you can't quantify (e.g. \$2.5 million in sales, \$300,000 in savings, lowered average delivery time by six hours, answered 45 to 75 calls daily with an average handle time of three and a half minutes), then it's your opinion. Employers care more about your results than your opinion.

An Incomplete LinkedIn Profile

Before scheduling an interview, the employer will review your LinkedIn profile to determine if you're interview-worthy. I eliminate any candidate who doesn't have a complete LinkedIn profile, including a profile picture, banner, start and end dates, or just a surname initial; anything that suggests the candidate is hiding something.

Having a Digital Footprint That's a Turnoff

If an employer is considering your candidacy, you'll be Googled. If you're not getting interviews, before you assert the unfounded, overused excuse, "The hiring system is broken!" look at your digital footprint. Employers are reading your comments, viewing your pictures, etc. Ask yourself, is your digital behaviour acceptable to employers, or can it be a distraction from their brand image and reputation? On the other hand, not having a robust digital footprint is also a red flag, particularly among Gen Y and Gen Z hiring managers. Not participating on LinkedIn, social media platforms, or having a blog or website can hurt your job search.

Not Appearing Confident When Interviewing

Confidence = fewer annoying questions and a can-do attitude.

It's important for employers to feel that their new hire is confident in their abilities. Managing an employee who lacks initiative, is unwilling to try new things, or needs constant reassurance is frustrating.

Job searching is a competition; you're always up against someone younger, hungrier, and more skilled than you.

Besides being a process of elimination, hiring is also about mitigating risk. Therefore, being seen as "a risk" is the most common reason candidates are eliminated, with the list of "too risky" being lengthy, from age (will be hard to manage, won't be around long) to lengthy employment gaps (raises concerns about your abilities and ambition) to inappropriate social media postings (lack of judgement).

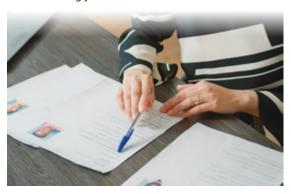
Envision you're a hiring manager hiring for an inside sales manager role. In the absence of "all things being equal," who's the least risky candidate, the one who:

- Offers empirical evidence of their sales results for previous employers, or the candidate who "talks a good talk"?
- Is energetic, or the candidate who's subdued?

- Asks pointed questions indicating they're concerned about what they can offer the employer or the candidate who seems only concerned about what the employer can offer them.
- Posts on social media platforms, political opinions, or the candidate who doesn't share their political views?
- •On LinkedIn and other platforms, criticizes how employers hire or the candidate who offers constructive suggestions?
- Has lengthy employment gaps, short job tenure, or a steadily employed candidate?
- Lives ten minutes from the office or 45 minutes away?
- Has a resume/LinkedIn profile that shows a relevant linear career or the candidate with a non-linear career?
- Dressed professionally for the interview, or the candidate who dressed "casually"?

An experienced hiring manager will lean towards candidates they feel pose the least risk. Hence, presenting yourself as a low-risk candidate is crucial to job search success. It is worth noting, the employer determines their level of risk tolerance, not the job seeker, who doesn't own the business—no skin in the game—and has no insight into the challenges the employer has experienced due to bad hires and are trying to avoid similar mistakes.

"Taking a chance" on a candidate isn't in an employer's best interest. What's in an employer's best interest is to hire candidates who can hit the ground running, fit in culturally, and are easy to manage. You can reduce the odds (no guarantee) of being eliminated by demonstrating you're such a candidate.

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SAFE AND SOUND

Burns and Scalds

Each year Emergency Medical Services respond to emergencies involving young children who have sustained severe burns or scalds. These incidents often occur inside the child's own home. Common causes include a child accidentally tipping hot liquids onto themselves, touching hot surfaces such as stoves, or making contact with electrical outlets. Fortunately, incidents such as these can be avoided by taking preventative measures.

Degrees of Burn

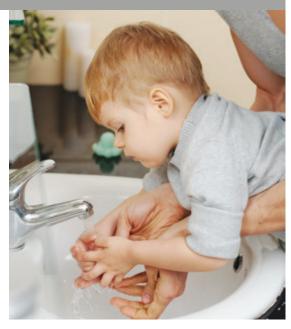
- 1°: Affects only the top layers of the skin; appears red like a sun burn; discomfort is generally tolerable.
- 2°: Deeper and much more painful than 1° burns; broken skin or blisters commonly develop.
- 3°: Severe. The deepest layers of skin and tissue are injured; may appear charred or leathery.

First Aid for Burns

- Skin may continue to burn if not cooled. Immediately douse burns with large amounts of cold water.
- Cover the burn with a sterile dressing, or at least clean material to protect infection.
- Over-the-counter medications may be used for pain. Adhere to directions given on the label.
- Seek further medical attention, as required.

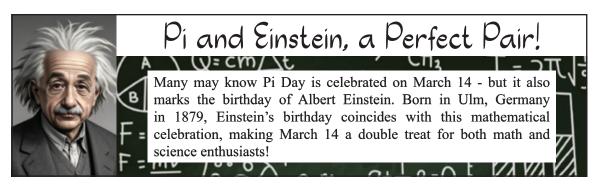
Prevention of Burns

• Check the temperature of your hot water tank. Temperatures as high as 60°C / 140°F will scald a child in just seconds.



- Use placemats instead of tablecloths. Tablecloths can be yanked downward causing hot drinks or food to spill on a child.
- Turn pot handles to the back of the stove and ensure cords from kettles, slow cookers, and other electrical appliances cannot be reached.
- Avoid picking up a child while holding any hot liquids.
- Ensure electrical outlets are made secure by installing commercially available safety devices which prohibit access.
- Keep children away from areas where appliances are in use (kettles, irons, hot stoves).

If you require immediate medical attention, call 911.



Celebrating Calgary 150 -Fort Calgary

Fur trading provided First Nations with manufactured goods and saw more people arriving from the east. John Palliser led a hunting/science expedition in 1857. He described Palliser's Triangle as an arid area surrounded by agricultural lands.

Calgary soon saw its earliest settlements. The first European to arrive was John Glenn (ca.1873), who established a farm where Fish Creek meets the Bow. Sandford Fleming meanwhile was surveying a route for Canadian Pacific Railway.

The second group were Francophones. In 1861, Father Lacombe founded a chapel in St. Albert, Alberta's oldest building. Father Doucet later established St. Mary's, Calgary's first mission.

Third, starting in 1869, former Métis HBC employees arrived on the Elbow River. One family, Antoine Godin and Susanne Bruneau, were likely Calgary's first permanent residents.

Illegal whisky from the U.S. was trading in the area, which led Ottawa to create the North-West Mounted Police. They began their March West in July 1874. They made slow progress and struggled to supply themselves. Eventually, they founded Fort Macleod and started arresting whisky traders. There, Lt.-Colonel James Macleod met with Chief Isapo-Muxika ("Crowfoot"), who wanted peace and security for his people.

Macleod then sent a detachment to establish a fort along the Old North Trail halfway between Forts Macleod and Edmonton. For millennia, the Trail was used as a food-rich and sheltered route between the harsher montane and prairie environments.

On August 25, 1875, George C. King became the first NWMP officer to cross the Bow River and arrive at its confluence with the Elbow. Macleod named it Fort Calgary, after his good memories from staying at Calgary House, Scotland.

More Métis arrived from Fort Edmonton. They constructed log cabins along the Elbow and HBC opened a post in 1876 called Hunt House, the oldest building in Calgary remaining on its original site.

Meanwhile, John Glenn and Sam Livingston become the first to cultivate cereal crops and use mechanized farm equipment. Livingston established Glenmore School, named after his Irish home village.

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Hello Calgary-Acadia,

This has been a roller-coaster of winter, both in the weather and in politics. The office has seen an increase in healthcare concerns with over 200 emails in the three months before this article was published. The restructuring, firing of health boards, non-scientific COVID report, removing funding for vital eye health checkups for seniors and children, and a general lack of planning for solving the primary care crisis have continued to concern Calgary-Acadians. I returned to the legislature at the end of February and with my colleagues in opposition, we continue to advocate for the health of all Albertans.

The Government has recently made changes to both the Child Care Subsidy and AISH without consultation or providing details. In my role as Shadow Minister, I am meeting with families and daycare providers affected by childcare funding changes. The announced changes will make childcare less affordable for some of our most vulnerable Albertans. This is cruel.

The constituency office received an overwhelming response to changes made to coal activity on the Eastern slopes. Many of you are concerned that Minister Jean's promise to uphold water and environmental standards is not a priority. This decision affects all of us and Calgary-Acadians made their voices heard. Thank you for this advocacy and continued engagement. Your voice is important.

I hosted a Healthcare town hall at the end of January with my neighbour in Calgary-Glenmore, MLA Nagwan Al-Guneid. Medical experts who are leaders in their profession answered many passionate questions from the audience and untangled some healthcare misinformation. The full event showed how engaged the folks in Calgary Acadia are. I will continue to find ways to engage with everyone in Calgary-Acadia whether in town-halls, Brews with Batten, or on your doorstep. Please let me know what you are concerned about.

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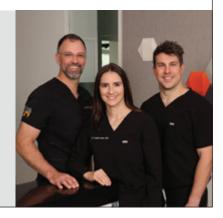
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
