Homeowners' Association (NDHA) News



At the time of writing, spring has fully arrived in Discovery Ridge! It is great to see new vegetation springing up and our neighbourhood waking up from winter. You may have noticed an increased presence of our landscaping crews from ULS doing their annual spring cleanup of our parks, medians, and green spaces. Work on this cleanup is weather dependent so it may still be on the way. NDHA and ULS work hard to take care of all the landscaped spaces in Discovery Ridge. Our neighbourhood is a big area and sometimes spots get missed. If you see something you think needs to be taken care of, reach out to us and we will get it dealt with.

Symbolic Tree Program

Did you know that Calgary residents can commemorate a birthday, wedding, anniversary or any other special day by planting a tree in one of Calgary's many parks. You would work with a Parks Urban Forestry representative to determine a species and location for your symbolic tree. You can both celebrate a highlight in your life and help the environment by increasing Calgary's urban forest. Costs depend on the size of tree chosen. NDHA Annual General Meeting 2025

The Board of Directors will hold the in-person meeting on Tuesday, June 10 at Westside Kings Church (3939 69 St SW). NDHA members will be notified of the AGM details by email or post mail and will also see signage placed at the entrance to the community. As always, at the AGM we will elect the new Board of Directors and provide updates on NDHA business and greenspace-related matters. We will also be ready to answer any questions or concerns you may want to raise. We look forward to seeing you there! If you cannot attend the

AGM, we ask that you send us your proxy vote so the required quorum is realized, and the meeting can occur.

Street Sweeping

Discovery Ridge is scheduled for sweeping on Friday, May 2 (weather dependent). Please watch for signs that will be posted in the community to notify you in advance or visit the City of Calgary website for updates. Vehicles must be moved from the street during this operation or be subject to fines or towing. Remove your vehicle and trash/compost/recycle bins from the road so that the gravel and grime of winter can be swept away!

Drainage Swales

We have already seen some spring rains, and more are on their way. All of us need to prepare our properties. For owners with a concrete drainage swale in your yard, City of Calgary bylaws require you to ensure the swale is kept clear of debris. Rain and runoff need to easily drain into the storm sewer system via the swale. Please have a look to ensure yours is clean and unobstructed. You do not want to be responsible for flood damage caused by a backup on your property.

Want To Help?

The work of the NDHA is currently managed by seven volunteers, all of whom are your neighbours. This volunteer-oriented management of NDHA's mandate saves over \$100,000 per year of your fee money to keep Discovery Ridge one of the most beautifully landscaped communities in Calgary. If there are not enough volunteers to oversee the landscaping, snow removal, holiday lights, and other services NDHA provides, we would likely need to bring in a professional management company. Our current structure has allowed us to install unique landscaping in our medians, dog waste bag dispensers, graphic wraps to beautify our trash bins, and seasonal planter foliage displays by the roundabout. It also allows us to maintain and operate the waterfall when water restrictions permit.

To continue to have an energetic Board that will ensure NDHA's work is sustained, we are looking for both new Board Members and non-board member volunteers who can help make this all happen. This is an excellent way to give back to your community, interact with a great group of current volunteers, and maybe even learn something new. The only thing required of you is a willingness to give a couple of hours per month for a beautiful Discovery Ridge. Please consider volunteering this year. Contact us anytime!

Thank you to the many community volunteers who have stepped up over the years as NDHA Board Members and committee helpers! Your time and effort have collectively saved the NDHA membership well over a million dollars. SAFE AND SOUND

Window and Balcony Safety

With the return of warmer weather, Emergency Medical Services (EMS) would like to remind parents and caregivers of an often-overlooked hazard in the home – access to open windows. Every year, paramedics respond to emergencies where a child has fallen from an open window, often from the second floor. These can be avoided by following safety measures. Take the time to assess potential hazards in your home before a preventable fall occurs.

Windows and Screens

- Prevent access to windows by moving furniture such as cribs, beds, stools, and change tables out from under them.
- Keep drapery cords out of children's' reach. Wrap excess cord around cleats or tie-downs to avoid a choking hazard.
- Remember, screens are not safety devices. They are designed to keep bugs out, not children in.

Balconies

- Do not underestimate a child's ability to climb. Furniture and other items stored on balconies and decks can be used to climb resulting in falls over the railing.
- Ensure that your balcony railings are not more than 10 cm (4 inch) apart. This will eliminate access between the vertical bars of a balcony or deck.

Further Prevention Tips

- Toddlers and preschoolers are at highest risk of falling from a window or balcony, but it may happen at any age.
- Direct supervision of children is the single most effective way to prevent falls from windows and balconies.
- Install safety devices which limit the distance in which a window be can open to a maximum of 10 cm (4 inches).
- Ensure the safety device can be released quickly, so the window can be used for escape in case of emergency.
- Consider purchasing a portable air conditioner, which will enable windows to stay closed and secure.

Griffith Woods Park: Springing into the Season

Griffith Woods is one of the premiere nature locations in the Calgary Parks system. Settled between Discovery Ridge and the Elbow River. Griffith Woods is 93 hectares of wilderness waiting be explored. The Elbow River flows along the park unimpeded development, by

a rare "wild river" within a major city. The park also borders the Tsuut'ina Nation, and we do ask all our park users to respect our park boundaries and not trespass on the lands of Tsuut'ina Nation.

Spring is an exciting time in Griffith Woods as it is renowned for orchids that create a beautiful understory. While amazing, these flowers and the surrounding mosses are very fragile and can be easily damaged. We ask guests to the park to always stay on designated pathways and keep your pets on leash and on pathways as well.

While we're on the topic of pets, few things take away from the beauty of a park more than stepping on the poop left behind by someone's dog, so please be sure to clean up after your dog and leave their waste in the appropriate container. Help parks by being a responsible pet owner and keep our parks great.

Spring in Calgary also means the return of many birds and other wildlife to our parks who, like many residents here in Calgary, took the snowbird route to warmer climates for winter. Merlin's, Trumpeter Swans, Blue Jays, and the American Robin, among many others, have all been seen in the last few weeks throughout the park.

It's not just birds returning to our city. Our more grounded wildlife makes appearances. Young deer (fawns) may be seen, ground squirrels wake up from their hibernation, and with the warming weather a black bear wandering into the park looking for an early year snack becomes a possibility. So, remember that we all need to make sure we are not accidently leaving out food for bears or other wildlife. Garbage should be properly stored and outdoor cooking areas like BBQs are cleaned.

Speaking of cooking, this is a good time to mention that we are not allowed to have cooking or campfires in our parks. In fact, there are fines for starting a campfire in any of our parks outside of designated firepits. Calgary Bylaw works with our partners in Tsuut'ina Nation to respond to calls about illegal fire pits in this area and follow up on reports of their use. When you are having fires in your own yard, be sure they are controlled in a proper fire pit. We must be careful about the wood we use as well, as firewood can bring unwanted pests with it, so be sure to only use locally harvested firewood.





Griffith Woods occupies an interesting balance for wildfire risk mitigation and ecological resilience within Calgary parks. On the one hand, we want to avoid the devastating fires that we have seen in and around Canadian communities in the last several years, so fuel loads, such as a build-up of dead wood

do need to be managed. That fuel load can also be a valuable housing resource for many animals, think of a standing dead tree housing woodpeckers, which in turn creates homes for wood ducks, tree squirrels, and all other sorts of animals. Finding that balance is an important part of the work our ecologist team does within our parks system.

RECIPE



Thai Curry Chicken

Thai food is a blend of four cuisines – Indian, Chinese, Malay, and Thai.

Thai curry can be mild or spicy and contain meat, chicken, seafood, or vegetables, and is typically served with rice or noodles.

The "reddish" colour and flavour of the curry comes from the red chillies used to make the paste which would also include lemongrass, shrimp paste, ginger and garlic, turmeric, coriander, and cumin seeds.

Full fat coconut milk has been used in the Thai curry chicken recipe as it helps to offset the heat and give it a creamy consistency. The curry is actually quite mild, but you can increase the heat by stirring in the garnish of fresh, sliced red Thai chillies prior to serving.

Prep Time: 20 minutes **Cook Time:** 35 minutes

Servings: 4 to 6

Ingredients:

- · 3 lbs. boneless, skinless chicken breasts
- 1 medium size onion, finely sliced

- 3 garlic cloves, finely chopped
- 4 tbsp. vegetable oil
- 4 to 5 tbsp. Thai curry paste
- 3 tsp. fish sauce
- 1 tsp. sugar
- 2 1/2 cups full fat coconut milk

Garnish:

- 3 Thai red chillies, deseeded and thinly sliced
- 10 to 12 fresh mint leaves or Thai basil leaves

Directions:

- 1. Cut the chicken breasts into small pieces.
- Heat oil in a large pan or skillet (which has a lid), add the sliced onion and garlic and sauté for 2 to 3 minutes.
- 3. Add the chicken pieces to the pan and fry until they change colour and are no longer pink.
- 4. Add Thai curry paste, followed by the sugar, salt, and fish sauce, and blend in with the chicken.
- 5. Pour in the coconut milk and simmer on low heat until the chicken is tender, about 20 minutes.
- 6. Garnish with 2 to 3 thinly sliced Thai red chillies with seeds removed and fresh mint or basil leaves.
- Serve with Jasmine or Basmati rice or rice noodles if desired.

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
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
