



A Few Words on Birds: Aren't We Glad to See You!

The sound of a Robin singing fills a Canadian heart with gladness. Its song is a beautiful up and down warbling and it also means spring has arrived! Every time I hear them, I feel like they are doing a solo and have the stage, everyone is listening. Perhaps they are louder than other birds? In the spring they sing to claim their territory and attract a mate. A bird that can sing that loudly is obviously in good health and thus a good nest builder and provider.

In our house, whoever sees the first Robin of spring gets to choose what we have for dinner. I am the undefeated champion since I made up this competition 10 years ago. This says more about our varied levels of caring about birds than my eagle eyes. Sometimes my kids will notice one by about June, and I'll let them have it.

This year, birders in the south of California are in a tizzy because they have had flocks of Robins for the first time in 30 years! Usually, they are rare in that area and this year, for mysterious reasons, there are thousands of them in huge flocks. The rain could have pushed them south, or perhaps habitat loss from the fires, or maybe they've finally clued in that the weather is warmer down south.

Diane tells me that a birding trip leader down in San Diego counted 2,000 in one day! Like a good birder, they entered it into eBird (Cornell's bird logging app) and then someone from eBird reached out to tell them it wasn't possible. The eBird person went to see for themselves and counted 2,000+! Counting that large a flock is tricky. These Robins were taking off in flight, so they may have used the "birds passing per interval method." It's amazing they came up with similar numbers.

Apparently, in the Northern states, they still have strong Robin populations, so it seems that there are just more Robins in general. Perhaps this spring we should prepare for Robin Armageddon as they come north, maybe we will see hundreds of thousands of Robins here in Calgary! Large flocks of them will blacken the sky and the sound of them singing will be deafening! Worm populations are trembling in their casings. Birds will become the number one topic of conversation, I can't wait.

Robins are prolific nest builders and can have three broods a season. In the city they might choose your drainpipe as a good location, as they have done at our house for the past three years. They build a quintessential nest with a cup center. One year the sparrows took it over and made a mess of it by mixing garbage into it, they even used dental floss which was trailing down our house. It is a good spot because the roof is close overhead, and I don't think a Magpie or Crow can get at it. Unfortunately, the Corvids wait it out in the trees and often visit to check things out, which brings us to the fact that only 40% of Robin nests produce young birds. Instead of considering this sad information, let us ponder the beautiful colour of their eggs. Robin's egg blue is the colour of the sky on a bright spring day and is a marvel of nature.

The Robin is the largest of the Thrush family. This bird family is composed of plump, soft feathered songbirds. If you are lucky, you may have seen the Robin's shy cousin, the Varied Thrush in the woods, they look like a Robin with cooler markings and a mask.

The Robins in the U.K. and Europe are not part of the Thrush family. They aren't related to the North American Robin at all. These Robins are super cute and look like a little reddish puff ball on long legs. Don't look them up, they make our Robins look like little trolls in comparison. The U.K. Robin is on my bird bucket list, and I'll hunt one down the next time I'm over there!

So, batten down the hatches and prepare for the Robin population explosion! Or nothing unusual might happen. I predict either of those two scenarios.

2022 Glenbrook Hall Solar Production



The Glenbrook Hall solar project was installed at a cost of \$35,000, given to Glenbrook through the Enmax Community Solar Fund. It was commissioned and went into production in late April 2022. Between April and December 2022, the system had an electrical production of 10,430 kWh, for a value of \$1,480 towards our electric bill. We look forward to seeing this continue into 2023.

Dear Neighbours,

Alberta's government presented Budget 2023: Securing Alberta's Future.

With a forecast surplus of \$2.4 billion, and an economy poised to lead the country in economic growth, Budget 2023 is an opportunity for the government to invest in Alberta's future. Alberta's responsible fiscal management over the last three years made this possible – growing the economy, creating good paying jobs, strengthening health care and education, and keeping communities safe.

Alberta's government is setting new records for spending in health care. Our province has the best front-line health-care workers in the world and Budget 2023 provides the right supports to ensure Albertans get the care they need when and where they need it. An additional \$965 million in operating expense this year will help build a stronger healthcare system and ensure that government can do what's needed to improve wait times for ambulance services, emergency rooms, and surgeries. The budget also includes \$158 million this year to attract, recruit, and train more doctors and nurses, with a focus on family physicians for rural areas.

Your government is growing and diversifying Alberta's economy. According to a recent report from the Canadian Venture Capital and Private Equity Association, Alberta smashed its venture capital investment record for the fourth year in a row, attracting \$729 million in investment in 2022 – a 30% increase over 2021. The increase in year-over-year values stands in stark contrast to Canada as a whole, which saw a near 30% decline in venture capital dollars invested in 2022.

Alberta is attracting big names in the technology world and undoubtedly, 2023 will be another big year for our technology and innovation sector. That means more high-paying jobs for Albertans. Calgary Herald business writer Chris Varcoe recently wrote that "despite a global slowdown and layoffs in the [technology] sector, Alberta technology companies continue to attract the interest of investors." And Alberta Enterprise Corporation President and CEO Kristina Williams said, "Alberta's tech sector has become a force to reckon with in Canada and bevond."

Government is also setting up Indigenous communities for success. Fourteen Indigenous community-owned businesses are receiving an economic boost through the Aboriginal Business Investment Fund. Five million dollars in grants will be distributed through the fund, supporting the growth of Indigenous communities, community-led job creation, and economic development. Grants will go toward capital costs like equipment purchases and infrastructure builds.
