

#### **CRIME PREVENTION AND SAFETY**

#### We've Been Robbed!

It had been a wonderful time at the family dinner party the night before. The summer weekend disappeared all too quickly and Monday mornings always came too soon. Arriving in the kitchen for the morning's first cup of coffee, Rick Smith noticed the kitchen door leading to the garage was open. Confused, he wondered if they had forgotten to close it after arriving home last night. At that moment, Jane arrived at his side. Rick asked his wife, "Did you leave the door to the garage open last night?" Jane was sure she had closed it. Together—at the same time, they noticed the bright light streaming in from the garage. What? Oh no! Then they saw it the large garage door was open and the place where their truck normally sat parked, was now empty! And the car—their daughter's car that had stayed parked outside the garage for the night, was gone too! Disbelief, quickly followed by panic, had now set in! How? When?

#### What Now?

#### Stay Calm. Call the Police.

If there's an immediate threat to life, safety, or property, or when a crime is in progress, call 9-1-1. When the crime has already occurred and no one is in immediate danger, call the nonemergency line at 403-266-1234.

When you call, the police dispatcher will come on the line and ask a few questions. First, "are you (and your family) safe?" Personal safety is always a priority! You'll be asked to stay on the line with the dispatcher until the police arrive. Listen and obey any instructions given to you. It is very important to avoid touching or moving anything until the police arrive, so you do not destroy any evidence such as fingerprints. If the thieves have left anything behind, point it out to the police but do not touch it.

Once the police arrive, they will gather information about the incident from the victim(s), neighbours, and any potential witnesses. Be ready with a list of any items stolen or damaged. They will need relevant information like serial numbers, unusual markings, anything that would help to identify stolen items. If you have security cameras, let the police know as they will want to look at the footage. The Forensic Crime Scenes Unit (FCSU)

may be called in to collect any physical evidence, such as fingerprints, fibers, or other items that could be relevant to the investigation.

After the police have finished investigating the crime scene, the attending officers will leave a formal record of the investigation, called a police report. It includes details about the crime, evidence collected, and any suspects involved.

Once the police have left, take photos and make a list of all missing or damaged items. Then contact your insurance company to report the incident.

#### The Lesson

Rick and Jane questioned; how did this happen? The police officers were very professional and kind in answering. They explained that entry to the garage most likely came from the garage door opener left overnight in their daughter's car. Once in the garage, thieves simply entered the kitchen through the unlocked door that connects the garage to the house. The thieves then retrieved both sets of vehicle keys hanging by the kitchen door. It took but a minute to load the two e-bikes and chain saw into the back of the truck. These were professional criminals. Quickly and quietly, before anyone knew of the intrusion, the thieves made their getaway.

The officers then went on to explain the 9PM routine to them. A routine that had this family followed nightly, may have prevented this crime of opportunity from happening. As he listened, Rick remembered how he recently noticed the 9PM Routine article in their community newsletter but didn't read it. If only...

#### In the End

The e-bikes, registered with the Bike Index, were eventually recovered and returned. A few weeks later, the stolen car was found wrecked in a ditch. The truck, found the next day, had been used for other criminal activities before it was dumped. This story is all too common, however, the bright light in this tragedy, was a lesson was learned. Now, the Smiths faithfully do the 9PM Routine and continue to share their story encouraging family, friends, and neighbours to follow the 9PM Routine.

Keep Kingsland safe, help to prevent a crime—follow the 9PM Routine.



#### **Heat Related Illness**

EMS would like to remind everyone to stay safe in the heat and sun this season. While children and the elderly may be more susceptible to the effects of heat and sun, basic prevention measures should be taken by all to avoid a heat related illness during periods of hot and humid weather.

#### **Heat Exhaustion**

- · Heat exhaustion can occur due to excessive fluid loss during periods of prolonged sweating in a hot and/or humid environment (indoors or outdoors).
- · Patients may suffer headaches, weakness, fatigue, nausea/vomiting, thirst, chills, and profuse sweating.
- The patient is usually cold and damp to the touch and the skin may appear pale or dusky gray.

#### **Heat Stroke**

- Heat stroke is a medical emergency which, without prompt treatment, could be fatal.
- It occurs when the body can't cool itself naturally (e.g., perspiration). The body's temperature will continue to rise to dangerous levels.
- · Due to severe dehydration and the inability to sweat, the patient may appear flushed, and skin may be hot and dry to the touch.


#### **First Aid**

- First aid for all heat related illness begins with removing or sheltering the patient from the hot environment.
- Remove excess, or tight-fitting clothing, and allow them to rest in a cool environment.
- If the patient is conscious and alert, provide suitable fluids such as water, juice, or a sports drink.
- If you are concerned, seek medical attention.

#### Prevention

- Stay well-hydrated by drinking plenty of water at all
- · Be aware that excessive alcohol consumption will promote dehydration.
- Always wear a broad brimmed hat to keep the sun off your face and neck.
- Apply a broad spectrum, waterproof sunscreen with a minimum SPF of 30+, especially for children. The sun's UV rays peak between 11:00 am and 3:00 pm, even on cloudy days.

## What Is a Boundary Really? Understanding the Rules We Set for Ourselves

When most of us hear the word boundary, we tend to think of rules we place on other people: "Don't speak to me like that," or "You can't come over without asking first." But in truth, boundaries aren't rules for others—they're rules for ourselves. They define our comfort zone, and they guide our actions when someone crosses a line we've drawn.

"A boundary means you are responsible for what's in your yard, which would be your thoughts, your feelings, your actions, and your opinions," explains Dana Skaggs, therapist. "And your neighbours also have a right to their thoughts, their feelings, their opinions, and their actions." In other words, you tend your own garden—and you don't try to control what someone else grows in theirs.

This is one of the most empowering (and humbling) aspects of boundaries: they remind us that we don't get to control others. We can't force people to think like us, behave in ways we prefer, or rescue them from their own beliefs. What we can do is make choices about how we'll respond when someone acts in ways that don't feel good to us.

That's where the real work of boundaries begins. As therapist Laura Vladimirova puts it: "There's no boundary without internal consequence." It's not enough to say, "I don't want you to come over unannounced anymore." The assumption might be that the person will simply comply. But what if they don't? That's when the boundary is tested—not when it's spoken, but when it's ignored. Do we let them in anyway? Ask them to leave and come back later? Decide to spend less time with them moving forward? Our boundary is only as strong as the action we're willing to take when it's crossed.

An example of this could be for a romantic relationship. We have a list of behaviours that make us uncomfortable, and we would leave the relationship if those boundaries weren't respected. In practice, what they demonstrate is this core truth: a boundary includes a limit and a consequence. We are clear on what we would do if our boundaries weren't respected.



This principle applies just as much in parenting. Parents often think of boundaries as rules for their children: "Put your shoes on before going outside." But children test rules—that's what they do. The real boundary isn't whether the child follows the rule, but how the parent responds when they don't. Do you put the shoes on for them if they don't? That's the boundary in action: your response, not their behaviour.

Another common misunderstanding is that boundary violations should always result in cutting someone off. "Sometimes, with boundaries, we think the most severe consequence is what's always needed," says therapist Nedra Tawwab. However, if we ejected every person who crossed a line, we'd be left with very few relationships. Realistically, the first time someone violates a boundary, a reminder may be all that's needed. The second time, you might take space or limit contact. Only in cases of repeated violations or extreme harm do more permanent consequences become necessary.

Ultimately, boundaries are an act of personal responsibility. They require clarity, consistency, and courage—not control. They aren't about changing other people. They're about protecting our own wellbeing and honouring our own limits, even when others don't. And that's where true empowerment lies.



#### **BBQ Beef Patties on Buns**

Alfalfa can be termed a super food due to its remarkable antioxidant properties. Antioxidants are highly effective against inflammation and may help protect cells from damage.

Alfalfa sprouts are made from germinated alfalfa seeds. These small stringy sprouts are filled with nutrients and are a good source of protein, fibre, vitamins, and minerals.

Alfalfa, radish, broccoli, kohlrabi, or red and green cabbage sprouts are all healthy and can be added to a sandwich, salad, soup, smoothie, or an omelette.

Alfalfa sprouts not only add a crunchy texture to any dish but can also make a dish look "gourmet" as shown in the BBQ Beef Patties on Buns recipe below.

**Prep Time:** 20 minutes **Cook Time:** 10 minutes

Servings: 4

#### **Ingredients:**

- 1 lb lean ground beef
- ½ cup fine dry breadcrumbs
- ullet 1/2 tsp coarsely ground black pepper
- 1 egg
- ⅓ cup barbeque sauce
- 2 tsps. finely chopped parsley
- · 4 slices mozzarella cheese
- 4 hamburger buns

#### **Toppings:**

- Red onion
- Lettuce leaves
- Mavonnaise
- Mustard
- Alfalfa or radish sprouts

#### **Directions:**

- In a medium size bowl mix together ground beef, egg, breadcrumbs, barbeque sauce, chopped parsley and black pepper until mixture is smooth.
- 2. Divide the mixture into 4 equal size portions and form balls. Flatten the balls into  $\frac{3}{4}$  inch patties on a cutting board. Use your thumb to create a depression



in the centre of each patty which helps to keep them in shape while cooking.

- Oil the grilling grates and then grill the patties, covered, on medium high heat or until brown on the first side about 5 to 6 minutes.
- 4. Flip the patties and continue cooking for a few more minutes until desired doneness is reached. Use a meat thermometer to check the internal temperature of the patties aiming for at least 160 degrees Fahrenheit.
- 5. Top each patty with a slice of mozzarella cheese and allow cheese to melt.
- 6. Slice buns in half and toast on the grill if desired. Spread a little mayo and mustard followed by lettuce leaves, onion slices, and patties on one half of the buns then top with alfalfa sprouts and remaining half buns. Serve with French or sweet potato fries if desired.


