New Membership Portal

There is a new online membership portal at www.cliffbungalowmission.com. It has more capabilities than the previous system and it will require less volunteer time to manage.

The Annual General Meeting was held on Wednesday, November 19. The theme of our AGMs is celebrating our community. As usual, we have lots to celebrate.

Celebrating 47 Years

The community association was incorporated as a registered Society on November 29, 1978. So, we celebrated 47 years of community service in November 2025. Many volunteers over the years helped do all the things we have done and accomplished during the last 47 years. Thanks to all who have contributed.

FYI - In September 1988, we took over a portion of Cliff Bungalow School which serves as our Community Centre. So, we have had a Community Centre for

37 years, just ten years after the incorporation of CBMCA. We share the building with Montessori School of Calgary.

St. Mary's High School Celebrating 140 years

On December 9, there was a Global News report on the 140th anniversary of St. Mary's High School. Cliff Bungalow – Mission is home of two high schools with St Mary's being one of them. St Mary's was the first Catholic school formed in the province (then Northwest Territories) and was the forerunner to the formation of a Catholic school district. In fact, that was one of the objectives of Father Lacombe when he got the land grant which is now the Mission district (east of 4th Street SW). So, congratulations to St Mary's High School.

Casino 2025 – Net Proceeds

We had a two-day casino event on August 29 and 30. On November 17, just before the AGM, we received our share of the pooled net proceeds of the third quarter casinos, \$90,925.60. Our previous casino was held in January 2024 and the net proceeds from that casino was \$79,907.30. So, this year's casino net proceeds were over \$11,000 higher. Our next casino will take place in the second quarter of 2027. Thank you to the volunteers who made this possible. This is the largest fundraiser available to us.

Great Potluck on December 7

One of our ongoing community events is potlucks. Attendance is up from a year ago. The food is great and conversations are interesting. Potlucks are a great way to meet and get to know others who attend.

The potluck held on December 7 was definitely great. In addition to the great food, we had a sing along led by Eilis and Murray Hiebert. They do this every December potluck. We sadly said goodbye to the Warby family, Frank, Rosie, and their daughter Tilly. They are moving to Tasmania, Australia. They promised to come back and visit.

Changes To Our Hall Rentals

Our community hall was created from two classrooms. There is a folding door that can divide the hall back into two rooms. For many years the Montessori School of Calgary has been renting our hall space and using the west half as a classroom on school days. We have concurrently been renting the whole hall after 5:00 pm. In most cases that has meant the

school would remove their things (on wheels). This has caused various concerns for the school. Over several months, we had discussions with Montessori on how we might address these concerns.

At our June 2025 board meeting, our board decided we would stop renting the whole hall to outside groups starting September 1. We will still use the whole hall for CBMCA events such as Jazz and Potlucks. We will still rent out the east hall for small events like Condo AGMs.

Curtis Keding

Curtis Keding has lived in Cliff Bungalow-Mission for 18 years and worked for 20 years as a Registered Nurse at the Rockyview Hospital's emergency department until his recent retirement.



Curtis has been involved with the Mission Community Garden for about as long as he has lived here in the neighbourhood. He is an avid gardener but says that it has been the connection with the friends he has made through the garden that has been the most rewarding aspect of his volunteer experience. Curtis has collaborated with Georgina Jameson and Ian Miller—a recipient of the Community Hero Award last year—with general garden maintenance as well as contributing many of the plants that people see in the beautiful planting beds surrounding the community garden.

Curtis dove into volunteering almost immediately after moving to our community and has spent almost two decades maintaining Calgary's best community garden and beautifying William Aberhart Park for the enjoyment all who either use the park or simply pass by.

Kris Morin

Kris Morin suggested we adopt a new online membership system, one that would issue an electronic receipt/membership and keep a membership list. Kris did the research and provided three options to the board. One option was Communal, a local organization which we approved to adopt. Kris volunteered taking on implementing this option. The family will be moving to Tasmania, Australia in January. We will miss them but before they go, we want to recognize them as Community Heroes.



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Caring for an Aging Parent: Strategies for When the Going Gets Tough

Emotional Strategies (Inner Work and Regulation)

1. Acknowledge Complex Feelings

Allow yourself to feel grief, anger, guilt, resentment, or sadness—without judgment. Write or talk about your emotions rather than suppressing them. “It’s okay to love my parent and still feel hurt by them.”

2. Release the Hope for Transformation

Accept that your parent may never change, apologize, or become kind. Focus on who you want to be in this relationship—not who you wish they were. Acceptance is not approval—it’s choosing peace over constant disappointment.

3. Separate Compassion from Tolerance

Compassion = understanding their limitations and pain. Tolerance = letting them mistreat you. You can have empathy while maintaining strong boundaries.

4. Name and Limit Emotional Triggers

Identify patterns that consistently lead to hurt (e.g., criticism, manipulation, guilt trips). Develop calm exit strategies when tension rises (“I need to step out for a minute,” or “Let’s talk later.”)

5. Practice Grounding Techniques

Use breathing exercises, mindfulness, or sensory grounding before and after visits. Create “emotional decompression rituals”—e.g., a walk, journaling, or music after caregiving tasks.

6. Reframe Your Role

Instead of “being the good child,” think of yourself as a care coordinator—doing what’s necessary, not what’s emotionally reciprocal. This mental shift reduces guilt and over-responsibility.

7. Find Validation Outside the Relationship

Seek empathy and support from friends, therapy, or caregiver groups. Don’t expect emotional reciprocity from your parent; that’s not where healing will come from.

Situational Strategies (Practical Boundaries and Care Structures)

1. Clarify What You Can and Cannot Do

Define your caregiving “job description.” Example: “I manage their medication and groceries, but I can’t

handle daily visits." Say it out loud, write it down, and share with other family members if needed.

2. Establish Firm Communication Boundaries

Limit exposure to verbal abuse or manipulation. End conversations that become cruel or degrading: "I'm not willing to be spoken to that way. I'll come back when you're ready to talk respectfully."

3. Use Neutral, Brief Responses

When provoked, respond with calm neutrality ("I hear you," "That's your opinion," "Okay"). Avoid arguing, explaining, or defending—it fuels conflict.

4. Set Structured Routines

Predictability helps both you and your parent. Schedule visits or calls at consistent times to minimize last-minute demands.

5. Engage Outside Help When Possible

Look into: Home care aides or respite programs, adult day centers, geriatric care managers, volunteer respite programs or faith-based support. Even a few hours of relief can help you sustain caregiving long-term.

6. Protect Your Physical Space

If your parent lives with you, designate "off-limits" areas or private times. If you live separately, establish boundaries around unannounced visits or excessive calls.

7. Use Written Communication for Sensitive Topics

For logistics (medications, finances, appointments), use texts or emails—it reduces emotional escalation and provides a record.

8. Plan for Respite and Breaks

Schedule non-negotiable downtime—a full day or weekend off every few weeks. Even short breaks prevent burnout and resentment.

9. Involve Professionals for Tough Conversations

Use a doctor, social worker, or counselor to mediate when your parent refuses help or denies issues. Hearing it from a professional, lands better than hearing it from a child.

10. Prepare for Emotional Pushback

Difficult parents often use guilt, martyrdom, or control when they feel powerless. Recognize it as fear, not truth. "They're scared of losing control—that's not mine to fix."

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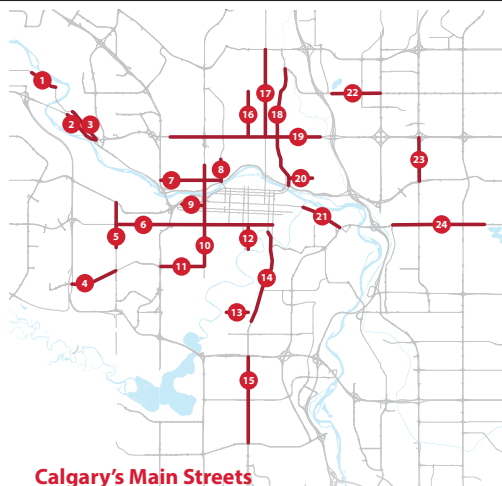
