

Winter Driving Safety

Collision Prevention

- Clean snow and ice off your vehicle's windows, side view mirrors, headlights, taillights, and license plate.
- Slow down, as posted speed limits are intended for ideal road conditions.
- Keep your headlights on so drivers behind you can see your taillights don't rely on daytime running lights.
- When changing lanes, signal early to let other drivers anticipate and react.
- Allow at least three times the normal following distance when driving on slick roads.
- Know your braking system and how it reacts to ice. Be gentle with braking pressure on slick roads.

If You Are Involved in a Collision

When should I report a traffic collision?

A collision must be reported to the Calgary police when there are any injuries, damage exceeds \$5,000, or you are the victim of a hit and run.

How do I report a traffic collision?

Collisions resulting in injuries, or where one or more of the vehicles is not drivable can be reported by calling 403-266-1234 (non-emergency) or 9-1-1 (emergency).

Significantly Expanding Calgary's Urban Canopy

Calgary's urban canopy will receive a major boost thanks to a nearly \$61 million funding agreement between The City of Calgary and the Government of Canada as part of their 2 Billion Trees (2BT) program. The funding will result in 930,000 new trees planted in the city, helping to maximize canopy expansion and provide equitable access for all Calgarians.

The 2BT program, which is part of the Government of Canada's commitment to plant two billion trees through a broader approach to nature-based climate solutions, aims to help motivate and support new tree planting projects across Canada.





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

Calgary Police Service – Facebook Marketplace Crime Prevention

As the temperature drops, it's important to stay safe and avoid becoming a target for theft or fraud when selling valuable items like high-end jackets on platforms such as Facebook Marketplace.

Follow these tips:

- Always meet in a well-lit, busy public place such as a coffee shop, mall, or police service district office. Avoid inviting strangers to your home or going to theirs, especially for high-value items. The CPS offers parking lot space outside district offices that are monitored by security cameras, providing a safer environment for transactions.
- If possible, bring a friend or family member with you to the transaction.
- Ask for the buyer's profile information ahead of time to verify their identity. Ensure they have a legitimate profile with a visible photo and history on the platform. Be cautious of incomplete or new profiles.
- When dealing with high-value items, avoid cash where possible. Use more traceable forms of payment, such as e-transfer or online payment services, which offer better records in case of disputes.

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Celebrate the Holidays with Homemade Eggnog

As the holiday season approaches, there's nothing quite like a glass of rich, creamy eggnog to bring warmth and cheer. This classic drink is perfect for festive gatherings, cozy nights by the fire, or simply indulging in a little holiday spirit.

Ingredients

- 4 large eggs
- 1/3 cup granulated sugar
- 2 cups whole milk
- 1 cup heavy cream
- 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Instructions

- Start by whisking the eggs in a mixing bowl until they are light and frothy. Gradually add the sugar, continuing to whisk until well combined.
- In a saucepan over medium heat, combine the whole milk, heavy cream, and ground nutmeg. Heat the mixture until it's just steaming—be careful not to let it boil, as this can alter the flavour and texture.
- Slowly pour the warm milk mixture into the egg mixture while whisking constantly.
- Return the combined mixture to the saucepan and cook over low heat, stirring constantly. You'll want to heat it until it thickens slightly, about 5 to 7 minutes. The eggnog should be thick enough to coat the back of a spoon.
- Once thickened, remove the saucepan from the heat and stir in the vanilla extract. Allow the eggnog to cool to room temperature, then refrigerate until chilled.

WHAT WE HEARD HIGH-LEVEL THEMES



Pedestrian and wheeling accessibility

- The need for improved crossing at the Sarcee Trail S.W. /Bow Trail S.W. intersection.
- Suggestions for a protected crossing such as an overpass or underpass at Sarcee Trail/Bow Trail intersection.

Environmental and green space conservation



- The importance of maintaining public green spaces in the study area and minimizing impacts on Edworthy Park Off-leash Area.
- Requests for sound barriers and tree planting along Bow Trail S.W. and Sarcee Trail S.W.

Traffic flow and intersection safety

- Support for an interchange or other infrastructure changes to improve traffic flow and safety in the study area.
- Recommendations to adjust the timing of traffic signals and extend turning lanes.
- Suggestions to improve turn angles and merge lanes for safer vehicle flow.

Pathway and sidewalk connectivity

- The desire to improve to safety and connectivity along Bow Trail S.W. and Sarcee Trail S.W.
- Requests for accessible curb ramps, pathway connections, and sidewalk improvements.

Community impact and infrastructure



- Support to keep the temporary access road open (Strathcona Hill S.W.) due to concerns about the closure creating increased traffic in school zones and negatively impacting local businesses within the neighbourhood.
- Questions about utility infrastructure costs, property expropriation, and community impacts.
