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

How to Be a Great Communicator


Just because we speak and understand the same language doesn't necessarily mean we are good communicators. One of the most common reasons couples seek my services is to learn better ways to communicate. The list below is for anyone who would like to hone their own skills.

Let's Start with Some Bad Habits in Communication:

- 1. Interrupting This can make it seem like you don't care what the other person is saying. Yes, sometimes I get excited and blurt things out but it's important to acknowledge the other and be respectful to allow them to continue. This can also be an issue if you are neurodivergent, and the speaker doesn't know this.
- **2. Story-Topping** This can shift the conversation from connection to competition.
- **3. Bright-Siding** Always encouraging others to be positive or look on the bright-side can be invalidating. Toxic positivity is a thing, allow others to feel what they are feeling.
- **4. Being Right** The conversation becomes a debate or about being right. Try to listen to understand the other's point of view... you might learn something new.
- **5. Being All-Knowing** Explaining information without being asked for your expertise. This can sometimes make you look like a know-it-all.
- **6. Advising** Sometimes people just want empathy or just to be heard. They didn't ask for your advice. Do not offer it unsolicited. This can also be seen a boundary violation.

Here Are Some Habits of Good Communicators:

- **1. They create conversational safety** free from judgement, fault finding, or rejection. Just be there to listen.
- **2.** They validate other people's feelings with statements like; that makes sense, of course, or I get that. It doesn't mean you have to feel the same way, but you are showing that how they feel is valid.
- 3. They follow their natural curiosity by asking



questions that show interest and seeking to know more. Nothing feels better than someone showing interest in what you have to say or wanting to get to know you better.

- **4. They listen with their whole body** by being fully present while listening; not looking around or looking at their phone and are giving non-verbal cues that they are fully engaged such as eye contact and facing the speaker.
- **5. They hear what's beneath the words** by reading the speaker's body language, tone of voice, and facial expressions. This is an art form of attuning to another.



SAFE AND SOUND

Sledding Safety

Emergency Medical Services (EMS) would like to remind parents and children about a few toboggan/sledding safety tips. Injuries may result from collisions with stationary objects on the hill, such as trees, poles, rocks, or even collisions with other people. Unprotected falls can also result in more serious injury if you lose control at high speeds. However, everyone can be safe and have fun on the toboggan hill by following these reminders.

Equipment

- Always ensure your toboggan, or sledding device, is in good repair. Inspect it for any damaged or missing parts before each use.
- Be certain the operator is fully capable of staying in control of the sled at all times.
- Wear a ski helmet, designed for use in cold weather and high speeds.

Hazards

- Avoid hills that are too steep or too icy.
- Choose hills free of all obstacles such as trees, rocks, utility poles, benches, or fences.
- Beware of loose scarves, or clothing containing drawstrings, which could present a strangulation hazard if they become caught or snagged.
- Look out for others. Move quickly to the side after finishing a run and stay to the side of the sliding path when walking up the hill.
- Children should be supervised by an adult; never toboggan alone.
- Sledding at night is not advised.

Plan Ahead

- Anticipate weather changes and plan accordingly.
- Wear warm, insulating layers closer to the body, and wind/waterproof layers on the outside.
- Consider bringing extra sets of gloves and toques to exchange wet garments for dry ones.
- Take breaks out of the cold to warm up.
- Even when properly protected from the elements, the fingertips, toes, ears, the tip of the nose, and other high points on the face such as the forehead and cheek bones can be affected by frostbite; therefore, attempt to cover up any exposed skin.

- If frostbite has occurred, treat it by first getting out of the cold environment, or at least sheltered from any wind chill.
- Gently warm the affected skin by placing a warm hand over it, or by placing the affected part in warm not hot water until re-warmed.






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Engagement Opportunity

Proposed Crossing Visibility Improvements – Woodfield Road at Woodpark Boulevard SW

After analyzing some visibility issues with the crossings at the intersection of Woodfield Road at Woodpark Boulevard SW (especially for pedestrians crossing Woodpark Boulevard SW), the City Mobility Department has proposed the following improvements to help make the crossings at this intersection safer for pedestrians:

Curb extensions on the south leg that would shorten the crossing distance for pedestrians. This will also involve moving the pedestrian sign on the newly installed curbs to improve the visibility. These curbs will also prohibit parking too close to the crosswalk.

On the west side, only one curb has been used on either side of the crosswalk to allow vehicles to stop in front of the mailbox while making sure that they can't park too close to the crosswalk.

Curb extension on the SE corner will include a portion of the southmost lane of Woodpark Bv that would force right turn movements from Woodfield Road to the northernmost lane. This curb extension has multiple benefits such as: reduced crossing distance for the pedestrians for both E-W and N-S directions, reduced turning speed of vehicles, and increased sightlines resulting in the increased visibility of pedestrians.

As there is a bus stop east of this intersection, turning templates must be checked as part of the design to make sure that bus operations will not be negatively impacted.



Before implementing the above improvements, the Mobility Department wanted to share these plans with the community to gauge support for these proposed changes as the changes will result in a partial lane closure for vehicles headed East on Woodpark Boulevard (South lane will be closed for a short stretch at the West end of Woodpark Boulevard).

Community Betterment Initiative Backgrounder

Objective: Enhance the Quality of Life for Residents of Woodcreek (Woodbine and Woodlands)

How: Develop and rollout a Community Betterment Program that encourages residents to get to know their neighbours and build relationships and trust through regular communication and information sharing.

What is Community Betterment? Actions and activities that makes living in your home, on your street, in Woodcreek feel better, more enjoyable, cleaner, tidier, more beautiful, and safer.

Examples of Community Betterment Activities:

- Building trust by taking time to get to know your neighbours and sharing contact information. Making it acceptable and normal for neighbours to be able to ask for help when needed.
- Open communication channels via email, Facebook, WhatsApp, cell numbers, or whatever system works best for neighbours on your street.
- Establishing communication groups via email, Facebook, or WhatsApp Groups restricted to people living on your street or cul-de-sac. This normally requires one or two volunteers to be the group monitor(s)/block captain(s).
- Share information in a communication group that makes living on your street better and safer including best practices about crime prevention and reporting. Share "eyes on the street" information, not just about crime but new or unusual things to be aware of.
- Organize neighbourhood activities such as a Neighbour Day BBQ and games, Christmas and Halloween related events, Park and Playground cleanup work bees, etc.

Communication Platform: WCA is contemplating establishing a Community Betterment Facebook Group that is closely monitored and restricted to confirmed

residents of the 7,000 homes in Woodcreek (Woodbine-Woodlands). Communication on this platform would be for broader community betterment information sharing. Street and cul-de-sac level micro-group platforms will be determined by each micro group and could be whatever works best for folks living in that defined area.

Expected Benefits: Research shows that a wide array of benefits accrues to neighbourhoods where residents know each other and are in regular communication. Examples include reduced anxiety and social isolation, lower rates of crime through better education on prevention and reporting, increased happiness through greater social engagement, better problem solving, and increased support from nearby neighbours when issues or concerns arise.

Exclusions: Commercial or political discussions, and/or any topics that could be considered potentially hurtful or controversial will not be allowed on Community Betterment Communication Platforms.

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Tortellini and Spinach Soup

Tortellini is an Italian bite-sized pasta which is stuffed with ricotta or parmesan cheese, pork, sausage, dried mushrooms, herbs, and vegetables.

This ring-shaped pasta is traditionally served in a broth, but tomato, mushroom, and meat sauces are also popular. Italy is recognized for its food culture and the work of rolling out the dough evenly and then cutting it into small squares, followed by the stuffing and shaping of the tiny tortellini which is an art in itself.

Tortellini and spinach soup is the perfect weeknight supper that can be enjoyed by every member of the family. It is delicious on its own or with a tossed salad and garlic or crusty bread.

Prep Time: 10 minutes

Cook Time: 15 minutes

Servings: 4 to 5

Ingredients:

- 1 package spinach or cheese stuffed tortellini (350 gm)
- 1 tbsp. olive oil
- 3 garlic cloves, finely chopped
- 1 small yellow onion, finely chopped
- 6 tbsp. tomato paste
- 3 cups fresh spinach leaves, stems removed
- 2 carrots, chopped
- 10 cups of low sodium chicken broth

- 1/2 tsp. ground black pepper
- Salt to taste
- 1 tsp. Italian seasoning
- 1 cup half and half cream

Garnish:

- Grated parmesan cheese
- · Parsley leaves
- Red chili flakes (optional)

Directions:

- Place the olive oil, onion, garlic, and carrots in a medium size pot or Dutch oven. Sauté the vegetables until the onions are translucent, approximately 4 to 5 minutes.
- Add the tomato paste, Italian seasoning, salt, and pepper, stirring frequently. Next add the broth and bring to a boil. Add tortellini and cook until the tortellini is al dente, about 5 minutes.
- Reduce heat to low and gently add the half and half cream and the spinach leaves and continue to simmer for a couple of minutes or until spinach leaves are wilted and then remove from heat.
- Ladle the soup into bowls and garnish with grated parmesan cheese, parsley leaves, and chili flakes (optional).

Note:

- Leftover soup can be stored in an airtight container and refrigerated for up to three days.
- Vegetarians can substitute the chicken broth with vegetable broth.

Landlord and Tenant Law – Tenancy Termination and the RTDRS

This article will focus only on leases covered by Alberta's Residential Tenancies Act (RTA). This excludes tenants sharing living space with a landlord, supported living accommodations, and a few other scenarios. This piece is to help our community become more familiar with a few RTA topics at a time when both landlords and tenants are under stress and looking for ways to improve their circumstances.

Notice to End a Tenancy

If the parties pre-determine a duration for the lease (a fixed term tenancy), neither party can end the lease prematurely without the other's consent. Fixed term tenancies end naturally at the end of the contract duration, unless both parties express an intention to continue as either a periodic tenancy or with a fresh lease establishing a new fixed term tenancy.

The notice periods outlined in the RTA can only end periodic tenancies, and by the landlord only in specific circumstances. The landlord can terminate the lease if the landlord, a buyer, or a relative of either plans to move into the unit. In such a circumstance, the landlord is required to give three full months notice to end a monthly tenancy, or one full week to end a weekly tenancy. If the landlord intends to demolish or do significant renovations that require the rental unit to be vacated or intends to convert the rental unit into a condo unit, the landlord must give the tenant one year's notice!

Conversely, a tenant can always give notice (without offering reasons) to end a periodic tenancy. A tenant needs to give one full month's notice to end a monthly tenancy, and one full week to end a weekly tenancy.

Tenants can also be evicted with much less notice if they fail to pay rent, endanger the landlord or others in the rental premises, or damage property in the rental premises. The notice period is also significantly abbreviated for unauthorized tenants/guests.



Residential Tenancy Dispute Resolution Service (RTDRS)


The RTDRS is set up as a mini court that primarily hears cases based on the RTA. Landlords can apply to seek reimbursement of financial losses or costs, eviction, or re-possession of the rental unit. Tenants can apply to seek the return of a security deposit, termination of tenancy, compensation, or an abatement/reduction of rent. However, the RTDRS does not have an automatic enforcement mechanism, so practical collection of money or enforcement of an order is still up to the applicant.

Before filing in the RTDRS, an applicant should consider whether they have met their obligations under the RTA; if not, the other side may counter-claim. Next, applicants should consider what evidence (and perhaps witnesses) they can bring to support their claim.

There is a filing fee to apply to the RTDRS, but this can be waived by various organizations around the city that serve vulnerable clients. Lawyers do not typically attend the RTDRS; it is informal and intended to be accessible to members of the public without the assistance of a lawyer.

I hope that this brief helps community members to understand their rights and obligations in the context of a lease covered by the Residential Tenancies Act. I wish my neighbours amicable tenancies and peaceful enjoyment of their rental premises!

Protect Your Household Water Lines and Meter from Freezing

Every winter, some Calgarians will experience frozen water pipes, service lines, and water meters, resulting in a water outage. The City's Frozen Pipes Prevention Program works proactively with homes considered at higher risk due to factors such as location, depth, and configuration of water pipes and a history of freezing.

Recently we have noticed an increase in frozen pipes in homes that are typically at a lower risk, where taking some of the steps below could have prevented household pipes from freezing. Ways to avoid freezing include:

- Keep your thermostat at a minimum of 15°C, even if you're away from home.
- Eliminate any cold drafts in unheated areas where water supply lines are located. This can include basements, crawl spaces, attics, garages, and under bathroom and kitchen cabinets.
- Repair broken windows, check doors, and insulate areas that allow cold exterior air to enter.
- Insulate your hot and cold-water pipes located in cold areas.
- Open interior doors and cabinets in cold areas to allow heat from the house to warm unprotected pipes.
- Turn off, disconnect, and drain the water line to outside faucets, garden hoses, pools, or decorative water features.
- If your hot water tank is in a maintenance room outside of your home, make sure the area is adequately heated.
- Regularly run water in your pipes through everyday use.

Your property assessment reflects the market value of your property on July 1, 2024, and the characteristics and physical condition of the property on December 31, 2024.

To help you review your property assessment we offer general resources on calgary.ca/assessment and property specific tools through the secure logon feature of Assessment Search at calgary.ca/assessmentsearch. By logging onto your property specific account on Assessment Search, you can:

- Check the property details used to determine the assessed value of your property.
- Update your residential property details. It's important you keep your information current, as incorrect property details may result in assessments that do not accurately reflect the value of your property.
- Compare your property's assessed value to other similar properties in your area to ensure fairness.
- Review real estate market trends and learn how your property was assessed.
